

Voters To Decide Fate of McCarthy

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Wisconsin voters, perhaps one million strong, will decide today the political future of GOP Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy.

The prospect of warm weather was expected to boost the normal vote total by about 400,000 in this primary election which has generated bitterness and controversy across the nation.

The state's 3,224 polling places were due to open about 8 a. m., and some of them were to remain open as late as 5 p. m.

The issue at stake was the methods used by McCarthy in his drive against the Communists he claimed were in the Democratic administration. Some people saw this campaign as the highest type of "Americanism." Others a "smear" campaign recklessly tainting the characters of innocent people.

McCarthy's chief opponent was Leonard Schmitt, an upstate attorney who relied on marathon radio

talks to carry his anti-McCarthy message to the people of Wisconsin. Four other opponents weren't expected to be any real factor.

McCarthy was favored to win his second senatorial nomination. The unknown factor in the race was this:

How many Democrats had switched their vote to support the Wisconsin election laws permit anti-McCarthy Republicans? Such cross-voting because voters are not required to register by party affiliation.

A trend in the voting might not develop until after midnight due to a slow count resulting from long lists of candidates seeking local offices. In Milwaukee County alone there are 76 candidates running for the office of sheriff.

McCarthy was trying to get a big majority as a "vote of confidence" in his charges that subversive influences are at work in the Democratic administration. He charged Schmitt and others had used "Communist type" smear tactics against him.

In a radio broadcast last night, McCarthy said: "They are trying to prove they can make a scared political corpse of anyone who dares to expose Communists in government."

Schmitt countered with a statement saying:

"I believe I have brought the issue of McCarthy's deplorable record to the people of Wisconsin. . . . I believe with all my heart that McCarthy represents a great potential evil to Wisconsin and to the nation and I hope that every voter in Wisconsin will go to the polls Tuesday to express himself on this vital question."

On the Democratic side, Henry Reuss of Milwaukee was battling Thomas Fairchild of Verona, former state attorney general, for the Democratic senatorial nomination.

Reuss had the endorsement of the state CIO. But State CIO President Herman Steffen urged members of his union voting in the GOP primary to support Schmitt against McCarthy.

Steffen said: "Though we still are for Reuss in this coming campaign, we have to be realistic and realize that a lot of our people, for reasons of their own, are going to vote in the Republican primary."

Malin Sets Up Skywatch Post

The Malin ground observer corps started operations last week in the Malin fire hall. The hall was donated by the Malin Volunteer Fire Department.

The first hall is being used, however, only as a temporary headquarters. The corps skywatchers hope to establish a permanent observation point on the hill overlooking the Malin park.

At present, the corps works from 6 a. m. to 6 p. m., several days a week. The observers work in two-hour shifts. Chief Observer Ivan Ottomian says 25 additional volunteers are needed to make the corps complete. Ottomian added that the volunteers are asked to work only two hours per week.



Reds Withhold Food From Czechs Who Won't Work

VIENNA (AP)—If they don't want to work in factories and farms, Czechoslovak housewives without children may be denied food and clothes by the Communist government.

The country's few remaining housewives and small shopkeepers also have been denied food ration cards and soap.

A new directive says that food and clothes ration cards can be withdrawn "from those persons who refuse to do work they have been asked to do in the interest of the Czech economy," Czech newspapers report.

The hardships caused by the "no work—no food" order on women found their way to the newspaper Lidove Demokracie. A worker wrote:

"My wife is aged 50. She is now deprived of her ration book

because she could not go to the collective farm to help with the sugar beet crop. She could not because she is sick, has high blood pressure and takes care of two other members of my family."

The Communist editor ignored the plea and commented bureaucratically: "The local authority has the right to refuse a ration book to anyone who refuses to help on the farms."

The paper also disclosed that the Ministry of Interior has excluded from food and soap rations all housewives receiving more than 1,400 crowns (\$28) a month, and small businessmen employing anyone older than 18 years—even if they are members of his own family. Members of his family also are refused ration cards, if they are not "employed in the public sector."

The aim of the decree is to force the remnants of the middle class out of business. Denied official rations at low prices, they must go to the high-priced black market for their supplies.

In this way, they run the danger of arrest and jail for black marketing, and at the same time deplete their funds and their resistance to the Communist aim of bringing everyone "up" to the "worker" level.

A memorial fund to be called The Adams Memorial has been established by the local Boy Scouts of America office in memory of the late Dr. P. Cecil Adams, who participated in local scouting for almost 25 years.

The fund is being financed at least partially by friends of the family who wish to make contributions to it in place of sending floral tribute to the funeral. The fund is to be set up outside the general fund, according to Scout Executive Harold Shearer.

Contributions may be made directly to the Scout office here, he said.

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The four long-shot candidates in the McCarthy-Schmitt contest are Edward Finan of Bristol, Edmund Kerwer of Lake Geneva, Edward Jacobson of Kenosha and Perry Stearns of Milwaukee.

Three GOP incumbents are fighting to retain their seats in Congress. They are Rep. Glen R. Gardner Withrow (third); and Rep. Alvin E. O'Ronski (ninth). Three candidates are in the race for the seat left vacant by the late Rep. Reed Murray (seventh).

In the Fifth (Milwaukee) District, Democratic Rep. Clement Zablocki is seeking re-election.

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
