Owls Gird For HSC Opener

Five Oregon Tech football players were added to the casualty list this week—although none of the injuries are considered serious enough to keep them out of action in Saturday night's opener against Humboldt State—as the Owls begin to taper off for the first of a stiff 10-game campaign.

The five are in addition to Dean Weekley, who broke his ankle the second day of practice and will be on the sidelines for several weeks. Don McIntosh, defensive end, and Larry Jeter, linebacker and reserve fullback, suffered slight head concussions; George Clark, right halfback, is nursing a foot injury; Odie Canada, speedy back from Portland's Washington High, has a bruised shoulder; guard Floyd Prints is favoring a pulled groin muscle.

Coach Rex Hunsaker said yesterday that, barring aggravations to the injuries, all should be ready when the Owls face the Lumberjacks in Eureka's Albee Stadium. Last year, Humboldt State, coached by Phil Sarboe, ex-Washington State football great, spoiled Oretch's opening night with a 19-12 victory, principally via the air in a dazzling first-half passing attack that netted all the Lumberjacks' points.

The Owls went to work in the second half but couldn't catch up. Hunsaker yesterday named a tentative starting line-up that will have a complete letterman backfield—Quarterback Jack Brown, Halfbacks Don Foreman and Harry Thompson and Fullback Jim McIntosh.

Bill McLain, a guard from Amsterdam, O., will be the only non-letterman on the starting eleven if Hunsaker hangs tough with the offensive machine he named yesterday.

Dick Flanigan and Cecil Spencer would be at the end spots, Charlie Wagner and Leroy Wilding tackles, Prints would work with McLain at guard, and Ralph Vick would get the opening call at center.

LORINO MISSES NO. 24

The Western International League's longest pitcher broke his own league record for losses Tuesday night, while the loop's No. 1 hurler was turned back in a bid for his 24th win.

In other league action, Bob Greenwood pitched Tri-City to a three-hit 8-0 shutout over the Yakima Bears, at Kennewick, and Vancouver shined Spokane 2-1. The latter game was the shortest of the season at Vancouver. It was completed in an hour and 40 minutes.

California Favored So Pappy is Unhappy

LOS ANGELES (AP) — California, UCLA, Southern California and Washington State College dominate football hopes in the Pacific Coast Conference this year, and the first three weeks of the season doubtless will provide the answer to many questions.

California, despite the objections and pleadings of its judicious coach, Mr. Pappy Waldorf, has been generally picked as the team to beat.

Mr. Waldorf has his points. He lost an All-America linebacker, Les Richter, an All-conference center, Charley Harris, and the two teams which gave his Golden Bears a licking last year, UCLA and Southern Cal, are coming back potentially stronger.

The deciding vote on the California matter may have been cast by the schedule-makers.

The Bears' program looks the best, UCLA, Washington State and USC may be either beaten up or beaten out by the time they meet the Bears.

The Waldorf athletes start off with a light slate, and don't hit the strong stuff until the latter stages. That is, unless you consider College of the Pacific, Missouri, Minnesota, Oregon and Santa Clara real gridiron blockbusters.

CHICAGO (AP) — While other entrants struggled to break par in a 36-hole qualifying test, Defending Champion Frank Stranahan breezed around Exmoor's exacting course at ease and definitely established the man to beat in the 50th jubilee of the Western Amateur Golf Tournament.

Thirty-two match play twosomes teed off Wednesday.

Stranahan, seeking his fourth Western crown, was exempted from qualifying. But he played along with the record field of 23 Tuesday and carded a one under par 70.

Medalist honors were split between Don Cherry, the record-cutting crooner from New York who was a semi-finalist in the recent National Amateur, at Seattle, and Jack Coyle, bespectacled former collegiate star from L. S. U.

These two sped around Exmoor's compact acres in 141, one under par.
