At least a dozen field trial champions will be in a field of some 100 dogs when the Shasta-Cascade Retriever Club runs its three-day licensed trials opening tomorrow, 8 a.m., on the Lost River Ranch, Snake River, Dilly, the dog house's Cliff Bradford, secured to the open title in the spring trials here, won't be on hand. The retriever is running at Missoula, Mont., trials being held in conjunction with the local trials.

But there's a raft of top-drawers to bid for the top spot in the open, the main event where some 40 dogs will enter.

Duke Southern Conference Pick With Maryland, Clemson Decked

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)—The Southern Conference finds itself making football history this season before a single game has been played.

For two of its members—Maryland and Clemson—are expected to have teams which will rank among the best in the nation. Yet neither can win the conference championship.

Both Maryland and Clemson are on the conference blacklist. They placed there for playing in New Year's Day bowl games and were given one-year football suspensions.

CANT WIN

Virginia, another top-flight area outfit, can't win, either, for the Cavaliers aren't conference members.

Maryland has its eyes set on becoming the nation's No. 1 team. And the Terps have every reason to believe that's where they'll wind up.

They thrashed Tennessee, last year's top-ranked team, in the Sugar Bowl Jan. 1. And Coach Jim Tatum Hally admits the Terps will have their greatest running attack in Maryland history and a defense unit which will compare favorably to the 1951 defense which limited its foes to an average of 75.5 yards per game.

SCARBATH BACK

Tatum has Jack Scarbath, a great quarterback, around to direct his tricky split-T version. He has an abundance of other speedy backs in Chester Haskins, Ralph Felton, Ronnie Walker, Frey Layman, Joe Horning, Dick Nolan, Ed Fullerton, Ed Barritt, Bernie Faloney, Charley Boxold and Lynn Beightol.

Leading the Maryland line is Dick (Little Mo) Modzelewski, who along with Scarbath is being boomed for all-America honors. Fifteen other lettermen are sprinkled among the line candidates.

Clemson has a terrific triple-threat back in Billy Hair. Hair was sixth in the nation last year in total yards gained with a total of 1,579.

Virginia has a small squad of 33, but all of them have a lot of football savvy and were on last year's squad.

Duke's Blue Devils have become odds-on favorites to cop the conference crown with Maryland and Clemson safely out of the way for a year.
