Longshoremen Back To Work

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Lined up almost solidly behind left-wing labor leader Harry Bridges, some 5,300 longshoremen returned to work Thursday after protesting the perjury conviction of Bridges in a day-long work stoppage.

The longshoremen gave the Australian-born chief of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union a rousing vote

of confidence Wednesday during a mass meeting at pier 18. They heard Bridges shout "If I have to go to jail, we will give a real demonstration of how to run a union from inside a jail."

"The courts and politicians can be wrong," Bridges told the throng, estimated by attending newsmen at 3,000, "and we would like to see them get after the crooks in this country instead of pushing unions around."

The crowd shouted approval of a resolution to form a committee to ask the U. S. attorney general to guarantee Bridges U. S. Supreme Court review of the conviction.

A federal appeals court last Saturday upheld the 1950 perjury conviction of Bridges that he lied at his naturalization hearing when he denied he ever was a Communist.

Reds Direct Five Wars

SEATTLE (AP)—Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas said Wednesday his six-weeks' tour of the Far East has convinced him the Kremlin directs activities "on the five fronts where the Communists are using force and violence to try and take over countries."

Back in the United States after visits in nine nations, Douglas said he had talked to "people all over the Far East," among them Huk prisoners in the Philippine Republic. The tour also took him to Malaya, Burma, Thailand, Indo China, Hong Kong, Formosa, Korea and Japan.

Douglas said he found good progress in the fight against Communism was being made politically as well as militarily in Burma, the Philippines and Malaya.

The justice and Bob Sandberg, a (Look) magazine photographer, left San Francisco July 28 for the Philippines. They were joined in Manila Aug. 3 by Elton Gilbert of Yakima. The three returned from Tokyo Wednesday on a Northwest Airlines Stratocruiser.

Douglas left here for Portland after clearing customs and immigration at the Seattle-Tacoma airport.

Knowland To Tour Oregon

BOISE (AP)—Sen. William Knowland (R-Calif.) left here Wednesday for a three-day tour of Eastern Oregon where he will campaign for Gen. Dwight Eisenhower.

He was to confer with party leaders at Ontario at noon and speak at a dinner meeting at La Grande at night.

Friday afternoon he will attend the Pendleton Roundup and on Saturday he will speak at John Day and Prineville.

Knowland told a press conference here that he opposed federal development of Western water resources unless states agree on a state compact basis.

"If the federal government gets control of water it will give it a stronghold over the economy of Western States," he said.

McCarthy's Wisconsin Victory Problem For Eisenhower Campaigning

NEW YORK (AP)—The landslide renomination victory of Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, Wisconsin Republican, posed a question today for Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's presidential campaign strategists.

It was how far to go in supporting McCarthy's re-election bid. The GOP presidential nominee has been lukewarm toward McCarthy, whose foes have accused him of "smearing" innocent persons in his efforts to uncover Communists in the government. McCarthy's supporters say his Communists - in - government charges are acts of patriotism.

"No comment," was all Eisenhower would say when reporters asked him at Idlewild Airport yesterday whether he would back the controversial senator.

Eisenhower was returning from a 6,300-mile Midwest swing that he said convinced him the voters want a change from the Democratic administration in Washington.

He declared in Indianapolis he would ask the voters to support the Republican ticket from top to bottom in the interest of party responsibility "in every state I visit."

The general will leave Sunday

on another Midwest campaign tour. The itinerary does not include Wisconsin.

He said at Denver on Aug. 22 that if McCarthy was renominated he would support him for re-election "as a member of the Republican organization." But he told newsmen he would not give blanket endorsement to anyone "who does anything I believe to be un-American in methods or procedures."

In Indianapolis on his latest tour, he gave his support to another senator to whom he had been cool. That was Sen. William E. Jenner of Indiana.

Like McCarthy, Jenner has bitterly attacked Gen. George C. Marshall, Eisenhower's wartime chief and mentor.

Eisenhower did not mention Jenner by name in his Indianapolis speech but called on Hoosier Republicans to "spare no effort" to send to Washington their candidates for senator (Jenner) and for the House of Representatives.

Still another factor entered into the Eisenhower camp's study of the McCarthy question.

Eisenhower intends to confer soon with Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio in an attempt to win active campaign support from the man he defeated for the GOP presidential nomination. Taft, who has

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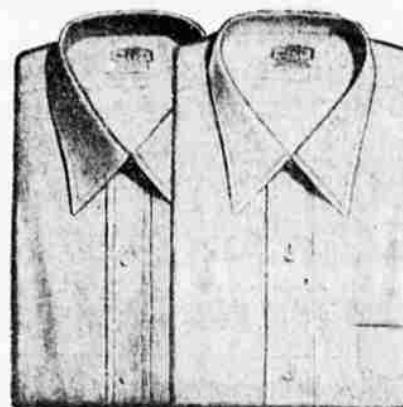
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U.S. Timber Sale Revealed

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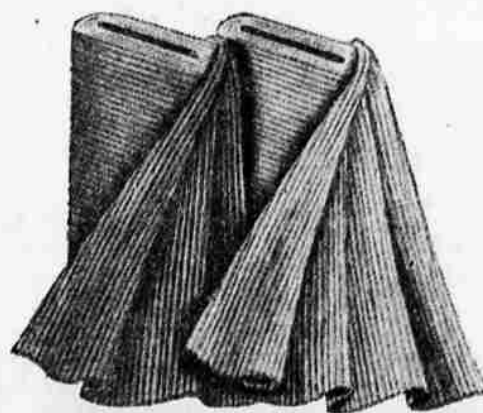
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
