Knife Fight Results Fatal

CORVALLIS 45—Frank Holloway, 42, Corvallis, was stabbed to death early Friday and Corvallis Police Sgt. Charles Adams said a 20-year-old youth was being held in connection with the killing.

Adams said the slaying occurred in front of the Western Oregon Packing Corp. plant here, where the victim's estranged wife was working. Mrs. Holloway, 35, was held as a material witness.

Held on an open charge was Milton Olsen, Corvallis. Adams said Olsen gave him this account:

He had gone to the cannery to take Mrs. Holloway home. She came out of the building and got in Olsen's car. Then Holloway appeared out of the darkness and started fighting with Olsen.

In the ensuing melee Holloway was stabbed. He died 20 minutes later in a hospital.

Adams said Mrs. Holloway had filed suit for divorce and had been living with Olsen's mother.

Lewis Calls Strategy Meet

WASHINGTON 18—John L. Lewis Friday summoned his mine workers' policy committee to meet here Monday to review contract negotiations and prepare for a possible strike of the coal miners on Sept. 22, a week later.

The United Mine Workers' contract with northern soft coal mines expires Sept. 20, a Saturday and a non-working day, and the men would be free to fall to show up for work on Monday, Sept. 22.

UMW President Lewis has been negotiating separately for new contract terms with northern and southern segments of the soft coal industry and with Pennsylvania's anthracite industry.

There are about 320,000 soft coal miners and about 65,000 hard coal or anthracite miners.

The three sets of talks have been progressing with some signs of progress but with no conclusions on any major issues.

The Lewis contracts with the southern and anthracite operators are to expire Sept. 30.

Lewis is reported to be seeking higher wages and greater welfare benefits for northern mine workers.

The miners now have a \$16.35 basic daily wage. The royalty paid by mine owners into the union's welfare fund to pay for miner pensions and other benefits is now 20 cents a ton.

In hard coal, Lewis has demanded a 20 cent boost in the anthracite welfare fund, which is reported to have run out of money.

The separate bituminous welfare fund is well-heeled with a surplus of 100 million dollars.

Insurance Protest Rates

Klamath insurance people who attended the meeting of the Oregon Insurance Agents Association in Portland the first of the week reported that there's a grave concern among agents on the increasing premiums on auto insurance.

This increase comes from increased costs of auto repair and exorbitant judgments rendered by juries, they say.

Those attending the meeting were V. T. Johnson, Al and Debra Backes, C. Buz Larkin, Wyatt and Ruth Padgett, and Paul Landry of Klamath Falls, and Eva Bowman of Merrill.

Landry was president of the association in 1933 and 1934, and was one of the agents which founded the group in 1928.

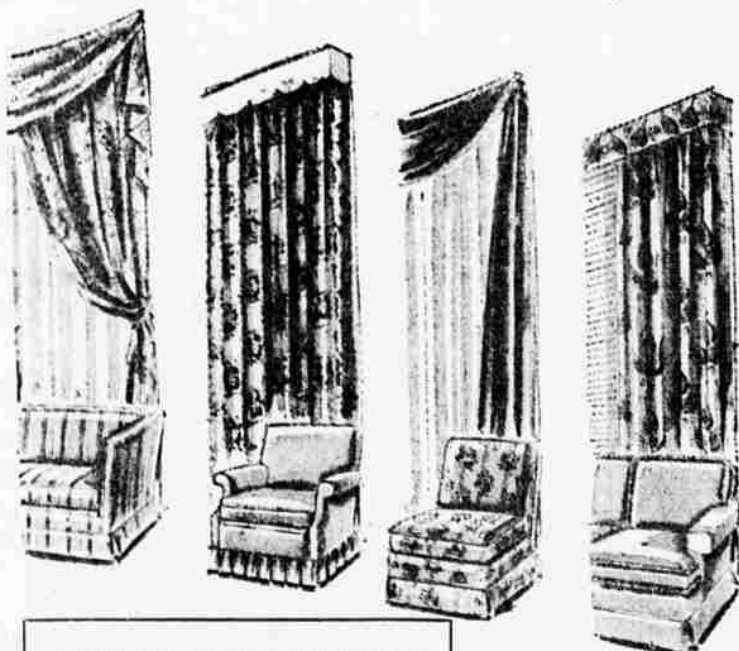
