There still will be two weeks to go after this last meeting of the top contenders but a victory in the big game could be the convincer. If the Yanks turn back the Indians in their home park, they'll be tough to catch. If Cleveland shows it can master New York in a payoff game, the Tribe may burst Casey Stengel's dreams of a fourth straight flag.
Billy Martin kept the Yanks out from Friday night by driving home three runs with a homer and a triple in a 6-4 win over the Chicago White Sox, protecting their one-half game margin. The Yanks have 13 to play, Cleveland 12.
Earl Wynn shut out the Red Sox with three hits, 5-0, to keep the Tribe hot on the Yank trail with a budding nine-game win streak and Wynn's 21st. It was the fifth shutout in the Cleveland string, two by Wynn and three by Garcia.
