### Police Close Roman Church

ROME (AP)—The Church of Christ said Saturday Italian police have closed its Alessandria Church by force and ordered the Rome church to close immediately.

Church of Christ missionaries Clmer Paden of Brownfield, Texas, and Carl Mitchell of Los Angeles, Calif., reported police also said they would close the Cattansaro church within one month and indicated they planned to shut all 22 Churches of Christ in Italy, predominantly Roman Catholic Italy.

A legal of Christ spokesman said the church authorities cited by police were Law 1169 of June 24, 1929, and Law 289 of Feb. 26, 1930, passed during Benito Mussolini's Fascist regime. The laws in effect require any church and minister to have state recognition.

The incidents reported Saturday marked resumption of conflict between Italian officials and the Churches of Christ, going back to 1949. Several other Protestant churches, including the Baptist and Methodist, have operated in Italy since the last century.

### Portland Co. Moves East

BAKER (AP)—A Portland wood products firm is going to move its entire plant here from Swan Island and employ about 50 men, Anthony Brandthaler of the Chamber of Commerce industrial committee, said Friday.

The firm is the John L. Hudson company which makes pallets and ammunition boxes for the armed forces. It uses low-grade fir.

Brandthaler said the chamber committee was working on a project to have the Weyerhaeuser plant at Lewiston, Ind., ship wood waste here to be ground into paper chips then be returned to Lewiston. Early surveys also have been made looking to establishment of a lime plant.

### Bank Reports Fund Figures

In answer to the Sept. 5th call by the controller of the currency figures were released today for the three branches of the First National Bank of Portland in this area.

R. H. Tisdale, vice president and manager of the Klamath Falls Branch of First National, reported that deposits at the branch were \$15,889,396 and loans were \$12,571,994.

Manager Myron Shannon of the bank's South Sixth street branch announced that deposits were \$1,719,222 and loans were \$1,449,443.

At First National's Merrill Branch, Manager Rile Delap stated that deposits there totaled \$2,461,791 and loans were \$2,129,377.

Total figures for the statewide banking system of the First National Bank of Portland were: deposits, \$571,407,743; loans, \$299,000,079; and total resources—\$628,781,079.

Released at the same time were figures for the First National Bank group, consisting of the First National Bank of Portland and its 48 statewide banking offices and 19 affiliated bank total deposits for the group were \$707,108,720; loans, \$336,117,806; and total resources—\$772,315,905.
