PORT LEAVENWORTH, Kans.—Lt. Col. Embert A. Fossum, 210 N. Rogers Street, Klamath Falls, is now attending the Command and General Staff College at Port Leavenworth, Kans.

He is one of 598 officers who began the 10-month course Sept. 3. Every branch of the U.S. Armed Forces and 29 foreign nations are represented.

Colonel Fossum entered the Army in 1942 and served in Europe from June 1944 to July 1945 and in Korea with the occupation forces from December 1946 to July 1948. His decorations include the Bronze Star Medal with "V" device for valor and Oak Leaf Cluster and the French Croix de Guerre with Gold Star.

In 1933 the colonel was graduated from the University of Oregon. Mrs. Oliver Riley, Klamath Falls, is the colonel's sister.

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Throng Sees Demo Picnic

Several hundred persons turned out at Moore Park for the annual Democratic picnic, probably the largest political gathering of its type here in several years.

Distinguished visitors were John G. Jones of La Grande, candidate for Congress for this district; Edith Green of Portland, who is candidate for secretary of state; and various members of congress, candidates for state treasurer.

All made short talks. For Jones it was about his tenth trip to the Klamath Country in his exhaustive campaign to replace Lowell Stockman as the 2nd District representative.

Local candidates for political office who made brief appearances on the rostrum were Senator Fred Britton, Assessor Otis Mettler who is seeking election as Klamath Falls police judge; Bob Elder, also a candidate for police judge; Tommy Hess, candidate for assessor; Marjorie Petersen, candidate for

commissioner; and Phillis Mahoney, candidate for county clerk. Bob McVay, KFJI radio announcer, acted as master of ceremonies, and entertainment was provided by the DAV band. The picnic was arranged by Dr. Robert A. Wood, Mrs. Blanche Petroff and Mrs. Dorothy Lowell.

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Duck Stamps In Good Supply

There are 5600 federal migratory water fowl stamps (duck stamps) in Klamath Falls postoffices, and Postmaster Chet Langalet has suggested local hunters "get them early" before last minute lines begin forming.

On hand this year are twice as many stamps as last year to prevent a shortage which caused sales to cease here between mail trains. The stamps are required for hunting migratory waterfowl, and a heavy influx of out-of-town hunters could crowd the postoffice windows. The stamps are available at the main postoffice, at Lee Hendricks Drugs and Schneider's Variety on S. 6th Street.

Just a few sheets of stamps have been sold to date, Langalet said.

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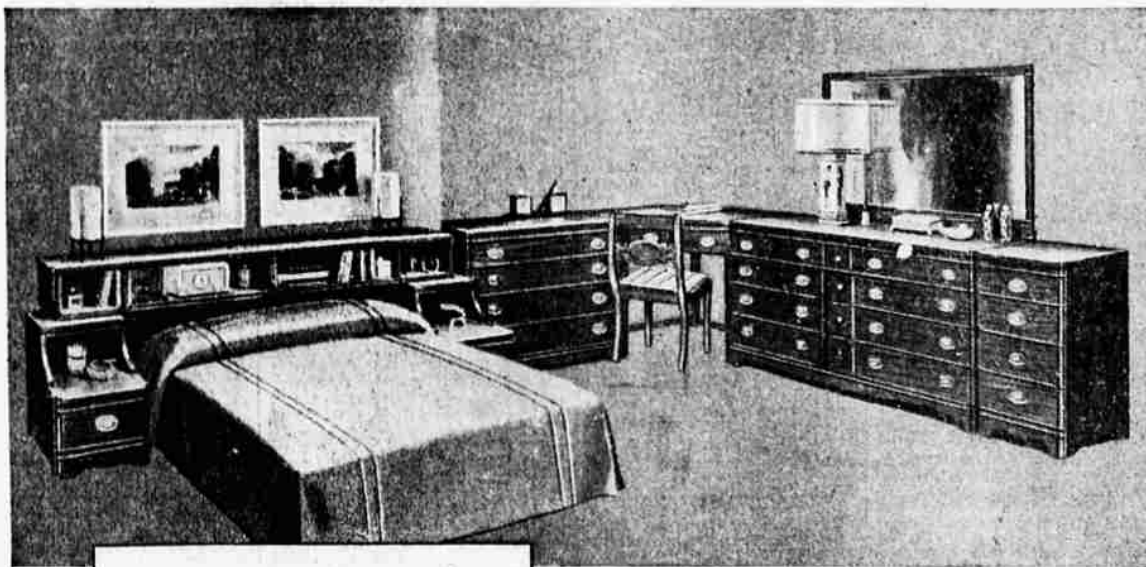
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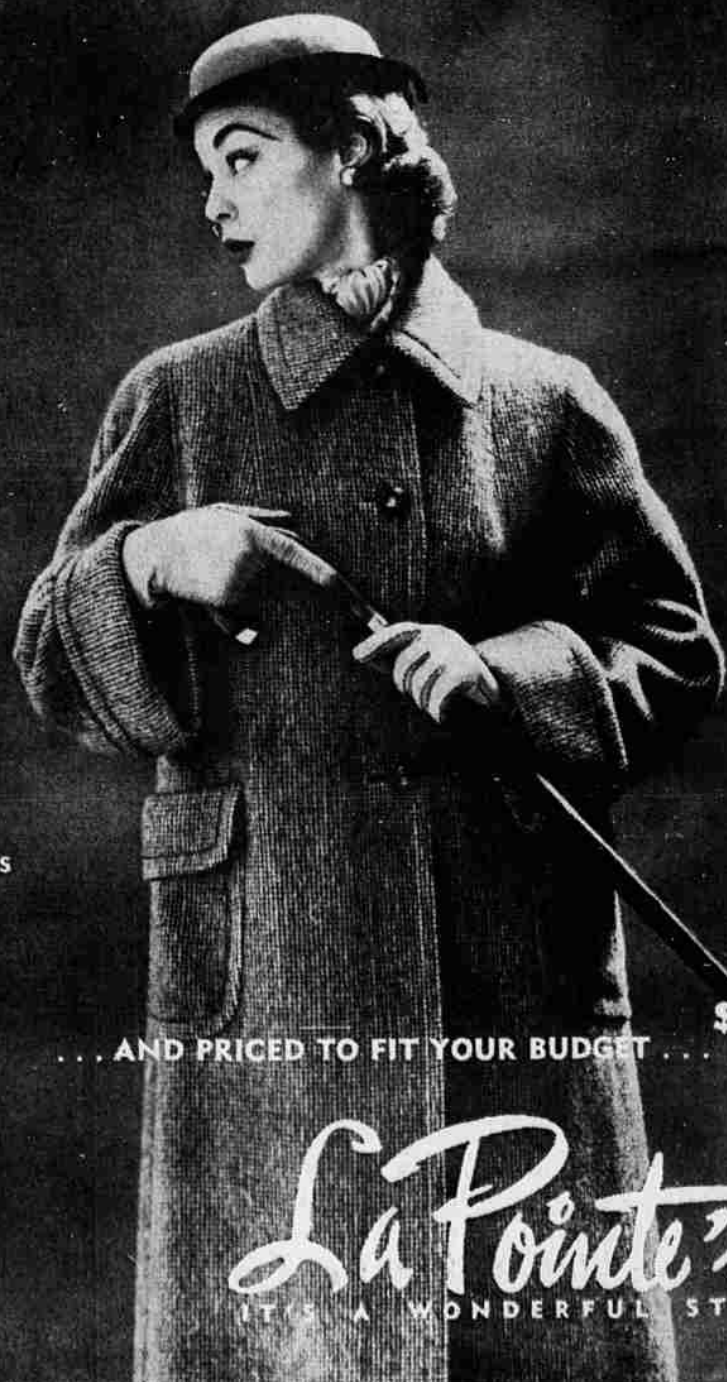
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
