Odell Fashions Husky Attack Around Heinrich's Magic Arm

SEATTLE (AP) — The "H" in Washington football this autumn is only as long as Don Heinrich's arm.

The 1950 All-America quarterback is throwing with all his old pinpoint accuracy. He seems to have lost nothing of the magician's touch with which he once ring-mastered the Washington Flying Circus.

With Hugh McElhenney gone from the backfield, Coach Howie Odell is basing his attack — and the team hopes — on the Heinrich wizardry.

Last year everything was geared to the running of McElhenney. All-America fullback considered the greatest galloper ever to wear Washington's purple and gold. The opposition always knew what was coming.

TARGET
Although Heinrich will be Target

for today in every opponent's book, he'll be pitching to an assortment of ends and halfbacks who can't be disregarded by the defense. Spread formations will help keep the enemy off Heinrich's back. The good looking kid was a marked man two years ago but he fooled 'em then, piloting the Huskies to eight victories in a 10-game season.

He sat out the '51 schedule with a shoulder separation and the team won only three in ten. Small wonder there was a tremendous lift in morale when Heinrich returned to the fold.

HAPPY
Never a pessimist, Odell is nevertheless happy to have the pressure lifted. Last year his team was picked as the likely Pacific Coast Conference champion before the season started. Nobody is picking the Huskies to finish on top this time, but the coach feels the club is in many ways stronger.

Out of the 22 starters on the two platoons of 1951, there were 11 sophomores. A rookie has cracked the starting lineup this fall and the team opens its slate Saturday against Idaho with a solid background of experience.

modern ten-pin establishment under construction at So. Sixth and Arthur, said today.

The new lanes will be equipped with Tel-E-Fouls, automatic foul-detecting devices that keep a check on every bowler.

The bowling "stool pigeon" is an electric eye with a beam of light running across the foul line of the alley. When a bowler's toe crosses the line, the device automatically records the trespass by ringing a bell and illuminating a light on the masking unit over the pins.

The Tel-E-Foul will eliminate arguments, Moss said, since "it's pretty hard to convince anyone that an electric eye made a mistake."

Yankees, Indians Go Today

Can you figure this? The Yankees lead Cleveland by 2½ games while Brooklyn leads the Giants by three. The Yankees must play eight of their remaining 11 games on the road while the Dodgers have eight of their 11 at home.

Yet the experts—those who know baseball best—figure the Yankees a cinch to win the American League pennant and declare the National League race a toss-up between the Brooks and Giants.

Why?

"The Yankees have the confidence of champions," a veteran baseball man said. "They win the big ones. They don't scare easily. They have the solid men in Alie Reynolds, Vic Raschi, Ed Lopat, Yogi Berra and Phil Rizzuto."

The Indians may be a better all-around club. But they lack the confidence of champions.

And the Dodgers?

"If it were any team but the Dodgers," the learned baseball man replied, "I'd say I don't know how they could lose with a three-game edge."

CANT FORGET
"But the trouble with the Dodgers is they cannot forget last year. Especially when this race is following last year's script almost to the letter. Every time the Giants win and they lose, the Dodgers are reminded of last year's debacle. They know it can happen because it already has happened."

"The Dodgers are in trouble even with their big lead. Their pitching staff is in a bad way. If the Giants had the services of Larry Jansen to go along with Sal Maglie and Jim Hearn, they'd be sure to pull off another miracle. As it is, it's going to be another squeaker right down to the finish."

MIW
Neither manager—Leo Durocher of the Giants nor Charlie Dressen of the Dodgers—is doing any talking these days. Not even after yesterday's victories that left them still three games apart with 11 to go.

Brooklyn received another shoddy pitching performance—this time from Carl Erskine—but their big bats atoned for the pitcher's lapse. The Brooks pounded out an 11-5 triumph over the Cincinnati Reds. Jackie Robinson and Duke Snider hammered two homers apiece.

Sal Maglie looked like the Maglie of old as he pitched the Giants to a six-hit, 12-1 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals. A nine-run sixth inning—the biggest single inning of the season for the Giants—made it easy for the 35-year-old right-hander.

IDLE
The Indians and Yankees were idle yesterday. They renew warfare today with the world champions facing the Tigers in Detroit and the Indians taking on the Washington Senators in Cleveland.

The Dodgers play host to Pittsburgh in a night game and the Giants took on the Chicago Cubs in the Polo Grounds.

In yesterday's remaining two games — both in the American League—the Chicago White Sox downed the Boston Red Sox, 4-2, and the Detroit Tigers scored a 5-4 victory over the Washington Senators.

Scribes Pick Cal To Win

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Talent usually have to beat for the title. The popular choice of football experts in this area to win the championship of the Pacific Coast Conference this season.

Members of the Northern California Football Writers Association and guest coaches gave Lynn (Poppy) Waldorf's Golden Bears 19 first place votes in a poll taken at the initial meeting Monday.

The poll forecast order of finish: 1 — California; 2 — UCLA; 3 — Southern California; 4 — Washington State; 5 — Stanford; 6 — Washington; 7 — Oregon; 8 — Oregon State; and 9 — Idaho.

Some ring critics think Rocky has been washed up since those punishing brawls with the former Gary "Man of Steel." But they still respect his toughness and slugging ability. They think Rocky can knock out Davey if he can hit him.

"These little guys are all alike—they run but they can't hide," said Graziano. "I think Joe Louis first said that—but he was sure right."

Davey, one of the finest south-paws in years, realizes he must depend on his speed and cleverness to the limit.

"I don't think Rocky will be able to hit me with any of his wild, roundhouse swings," he said. "I'm in the best shape of my whole life and could go 20 rounds. Rocky will be swinging at the air all night."

Davey, 26, is unbeaten in 36 pro fights and never has been knocked off his feet. Weighing 149, he will sacrifice about 13 pounds at ring time to his 30-year-old opponent.

Graziano figures to weigh in at noon Wednesday at an official 158 then take enough nourishment to get to 162 by night.

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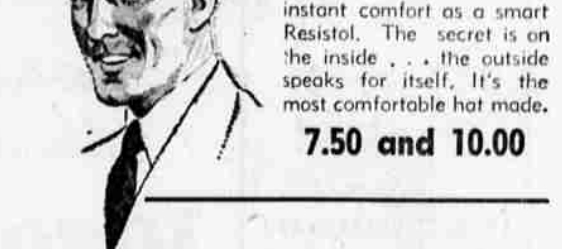
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
