

# AFL Secretary Tobin Biasts T-H Law

NEW YORK (AP) — Secretary of Labor Maurice J. Tobin told the American Federation of Labor today that the Taft-Hartley Law means slow death for the labor movement.

The law, he said in a prepared address at the AFL's 71st annual convention, has slowed organized labor's membership gains tremendously and has become "a matter of life or death for the American labor movement."

His speech was one of three major addresses scheduled during the day. The other two speakers also were administration officials. Mutual Security Administrator Averell Harriman attacked Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower sharply for the bold implication that he and the other leaders of his party have been so far-sighted that they never had any illusions about Soviet aggression.

As the 800 delegates represent eight million AFL members moved into their second day's session, they met against a background of pleas for labor unity from AFL President William Green and John L. Lewis.

Green appeared before the convention yesterday and urged that the CIO and Lewis' United Mine Workers (UMW) return to the fold of the AFL.

"Let it be one labor movement in America," he urged in what has become to be almost an annual plea.

Lewis soon answered from Washington, where he was meeting with the UMW National Policy Committee. The mine chief urged that all union labor leaders meet quickly to draw up a formula for immediate unity.

Green had no direct comment.

on Lewis' telegram. In his address he had accused Lewis of splitting the ranks of labor.

The speeches of Tobin, Harriman and Ewing were aimed at a convention getting ready to endorse a presidential candidate—and it appeared as though Democrat Adlai E. Stevenson had the inside rail.

Blasting at the Taft-Hartley Law, which Stevenson has said should be repealed, Tobin gave these figures:

In the five years before Taft-Hartley, the country's labor force grew by about 900,000 workers, while organized labor increased its ranks by five million. In the five years since, the force grew by 4 1/2 million but organized labor

added only about 800,000. "After 30 years of the fastest growth in its history, the American labor movement has slowed down in its tracks," he said. However, he said Taft-Hartley was not the only reason for a slowdown.

Hudspeth's bid, highest of three submitted, was \$30 a thousand for 19,500,000 feet of pine, \$10 a thousand for eight million feet of Douglas fir, and \$3 a thousand for the remaining White fir.

## Polio Patients To Portland

PORTLAND (AP) — Three polio victims, residents of the Pendleton area, were to be flown here Tuesday in a specially equipped Air Force plane for treatment in a Portland hospital.

They were identified by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, which arranged the trip.

Ronald Lewis, 23, a sheep rancher, his sister-in-law, Mrs. Gloria Lewis, and Madeline Eckles, 31.

They were stricken with the disease in August and now require physiotherapy, the Foundation said. Lewis and Miss Eckles are in respirators.

The plane is equipped to keep the respirators in operation during the flight.

## ABA Studies Wilson Case

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The board of governors of the American Bar Association had a major question of policy to consider at an executive session Monday, a question arising out of a two-year-old Washington state slaying.

The dispute was over whether a five-man group, known as the special committee on convictions and incarcerations of innocent persons, should investigate the background of the convictions of Utah and Tamm Wilson, of Vancouver, Wash., for the slaying of a young girl.

The two men have been sentenced to hang three times for the March, 1950, slaying of Jo Ann Dewey, but have won stays of execution and rehearings. Last month Gov. Lantieri of Washington granted a third stay, putting off their execution 90 days, and he then asked the Bar Association to investigate the case and advise what action it would take if it were in his place.

Among the leading opponents to permitting the committee to make such a study is Frank Holman of Seattle, a former president of the Bar Association. He has been quoted as saying his opposition was not based specifically upon the Wilson case but on the idea of any Bar Association committee performing such work in any state.

"We stick our necks out when the American Bar Association investigates the decision of courts anywhere," he said.

Members of the Vancouver, Wash., Bar Association recently voted down a resolution to ask the board of governors to refuse permission for the special committee to enter the Wilson case.

## India Calls For East-West Meet

BOMBAY, India (AP) — Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru's All-India Congress Party has called for the United States, Britain and France to meet with Russia and Communist China to settle East-West differences and start world disarmament.

The ruling party's policy-making congress committee, meeting at Indore, unanimously approved a resolution urging the Big Five conference. The proposal reportedly was drafted by Nehru.
