### Stars Assured of Tie Despite Beaver Loss

The Portland Beavers crossed up the Hollywood Stars in their bid for the Pacific Coast League pennant Tuesday night.

But the odds are very, very much in favor of the Stars capturing the bunting. They can do it by winning only one of their final seven games. They already have assured themselves at least a tie for first place.

The tie would be with second place Oakland—and only provided the Oaks won their final six games

and the Stars lost their last seven. Ironically, the winner of Portland's 10-3 triumph over Hollywood was Royce Lint, who was traded by the Stars to the Beavers. It was Lint's 10th straight win and his 12th victory this season. He gave up 11 hits to 16 off Joe Muir and Pinky Woods.

The Beavers had piled up a five-run lead at the end of the fifth and added five more in the sixth on four singles, a double and Granville Gladstone's triple.

**SPLIT**

Oakland won the first game of a twin bill from San Diego 3-0. Lost of the nightcap 4-1 was hard to take. It wiped out the last mathematical chance the A's had of passing the Stars.

Tragedy struck the Seattle club in the death of its general manager, Earl Sheely, who had been ill of a heart ailment, attended the early innings of the Rainiers' game with San Francisco but left early.

**NIP SEALS**

Seattle shaded the visitors 4-3, scoring the winning run in the fourth frame when Steve Nagy, a former Seal, singled in Leo Thomas.

Sacramento and Los Angeles traded triumphs, the Solons winning the first one 4-1 and dropping the second game 6-3. The Angel win snapped a five-game losing streak.

# Hepped-up Pels Drill for Roseburg

## Indians Feature Running

The Klamath Pelicans, one step along the football comeback trail, invade Roseburg Friday night for a clash with the Indians.

Judging by Roseburg's first game, the Indians aren't equipped for a scarping party and the Pelicans will probably go into the game favored to notch victory Number 2.

The Klamath eleven turned loose its climactic runner, Kenny Young, Saturday night for a 7-0 victory over the Grant Generals. The win put a few teeth in the argument of those who look for 1952 to be a return to power of the Red and White.

The Eugene Axemen—the Pelicans' foe here Oct. 3—were on the business end of the scarping Friday night in a 27-0 win over Roseburg.

**STAGEFRIGHT**

But Roseburg News-Review Sports Editor George Castillo opines the Eugene clobbering is no indication of Roseburg's capabilities.

Castillo lays most of it to "stagefright" and claims the Indians will be stronger for the Pelicans.

They probably will be but the same thing can be said for the Pelicans.

If Roseburg's pass defense is as important as it was against Eugene, Pelican Coach Bob Hendershot will likely give the throwing arms of Bill Salt and Jim Dougherty a busy night.

Most of the experience is in Roseburg's line which averages 170 offensively, 190 defensively. Castillo calls Ron Hicks "the best defensive high school end I've ever seen."

Seventeen lettermen are on the squad, most of them linemen. Roseburg is primarily a running team, sparked by 150-pound Roger Oiler, a climax runner. The other halfbacks who could give the Pel defense some trouble are Buzz Desbiens and Bob Brandt, district 880-yard track champion. The power running is supplied by Fullback Steve Dancho. Quarterback Bud Backen is described as an average passer.

**STIFFEN**

Although out-distanced and out first-downed, by Grant, the Pels showed a wealth of defensive talent when it was needed and gave Young a clear path for a 20-yard touchdown run.

Hendershot will probably open with the same eleven that took the field against Grant.

Salt is at the quarterback spot. Young and Cal Gilmore at the halfback posts and Dougherty at fullback.

The line will see George Hanson and Jack Horton on the wings, Doug Campbell and Vernon Pryor at tackles, Matt Del Fatti and Dick Lundsten at guards and George Maskell at center.

## Santa Rosa JC Needs Quarterback to Go

**SANTA ROSA (Special)**—When the Santa Rosa Junior College Bear Cubs open their fall football campaign against the Owls of Oregon Tech at historic Bailey Field Friday night, both team and bench will be one of the biggest question marks in recent football history in Santa Rosa.

The game will mark the debut of former California football star William (Wild Bill) Archer as head coach at SRJC.

Archer, who starred as a left-handed halfback on the Bear football team in 1937 and who was one of California's finest infielders in

PCC baseball, will lead a dark-horse eleven into the fray.

In meeting Oregon Tech and on the following weekend encountering John Muir in the Rose Bowl at Pasadena, Santa Rosa Jaycees will be sharpening its attack for the big seven conference season.

With its main offensive guns loaded with the talent of Jolting Joe Negri, 215-pound fullback from the Italian community of Occidental, Calif., Archer's crew promises to be strong on land offensively and has also shown in practice to date that its defensive line averaging 190 pounds will be one of the better units in Northern California JC ball.

For want of a quarterback, the same team season might be lost for last year's squad which won but three of 10 games has been

unable to contribute much in the way of signal-calling talent in the 16 veterans it has returned to the school for the 1952 season.

A quartet of quarterbacks—Don Curley, Don Frantz, Dick Blawett Jr., son of the SRJC athletic director, and Jimmy Underhill—were still battling early this week for the starting QB spot in the T-formation. At halfbacks, Santa Rosa is expected to embrace one of its finest arrays of talent in red-headed Bill Rahming, highly-touted prep star, and Bob Bergmain from Oakland and returning veteran Glenn Kissinger. Combined with the talent of Negri, the halfback threats are expected to prove a strong point in the Cub attack.

At ends, Santa Rosa will unveil Friday night the offensive and

defensive talents of big Bill Tarr, who is as vicious a wingman as can be encountered in a football bout. Running with the Terrible Tarr is the standout end from Santa Rosa High, George Alender, elongated brother of Tucker Alender, well-known jockey who recently was a top contender for saddle-smith honors at Longacres race track in Washington.

The center of the line will be bulwarked defensively by Bud Zedini, another highly-regarded prep performer. In practice to date, the tackle and guard positions have been wide open and may furnish the big problem for the genial Archer along with the quarterback situation.

While Santa Rosa is not expected to be as dominant in the Big Seven circuit, the coaching staff has been anything but optimistic over prospects for the upcoming season. In the over-all athletic picture on the West Coast, the Cardinal and Blue have long been a dominant power.

Archer himself, and aides Bud Van Feren, former University of California Rose Bowl end, and backfield coach Bob Martin, a Rose Bowl end at Stanford, have been unable to see any such success for the current edition of the Bear Cubs.

The club in practice to date has shown marked tendencies for a lot of snap and go. And if a winning quarterback can be developed, the team could be capable of tossing many a bombshell into the center ring before Santa Rosa's 10-game schedule is completed.

## Goldman Recalls Rock of 1948

GROESBETTER, N. Y. (P)—Charlie Goldman, the gnome-like little man who trains Rocky Marciano, was holding forth on his favorite topic while the heavyweight challenger took a sound afternoon snooze in the room above.

"He not only was crude when I first saw him in 1948," Goldman recalled, "but he also was about the rawest fighter I ever had laid my eyes on. He was old to be starting out on a professional career, too—nearly 24 he was at that time."

"But I saw that Rocky could punch and that he had a fine body for taking punches. He was an

awful slow puncher, though, and about all he had was a big, looping right. He's much faster now and he punches a lot shorter, but he still throws the looper now and then and it's all right with me. I told him as long as he gets results, that's all I want."

"Well, what Rocky lacked in experience he made up in being cooperative. He's the most co-operative fighter I ever trained or ever heard about. He wanted to learn and he wanted to work. He had never had more than \$20 in his pocket at one time in his life. Any time he had more than that, it went to help support his family."

"Rocky must be something like

this golfer Ben Hogan. I read how Hogan will shoot a fine score and then go out and practice for a couple of hours. Rocky's exactly that way. If I should get him on the phone the morning after he wins the championship from Joe Walcott and tell him something's on the line and I want him to start in training again, he would just say, 'Okay, Charlie,' and he would be there."

"It's the honest truth, he even sneaked off and trained some on his honeymoon. Sometimes he sneaked off on me. After a real hard workout he'll finish eating and tell me he thinks he'll go out for a little walk. I find out later he did eight or 10 miles."

## Bothersome Athletics Stand in Yanks' Way

**DETROIT (P)**—Cautious Casey Stengel can peek around the corner today and see the American League pennant waving just out of reach of his stretching fingers.

And he can see the pesky Philadelphia Athletics waiting to whack him on the wrists when he grabs for it.

"Jimmy Dykes always gets that collection of old men going and they put on a heck of a September salary drive—at our expense," grumbled Stengel, manager of the New York Yankees.

To reach that pennant for the fourth straight year, Casey must master the Athletics in the twilight hours of the pennant battle.

Casey's club plays the Athletics in six of its remaining games. And the Yankees hold only a slim edge (.917 so far this year). Last year the A's kicked the Yanks around late in the season.

The Yankees won their fifth straight game 7-0 Tuesday from the Detroit Tigers and are 2½ games ahead of the second place Cleveland Indians.

"And while we're talking about the pennant race, those guys (the Indians) have to play these guys (the last place Tigers) a lot of games," said Stengel. "And you remember what happened last year. Those Tigers really fixed 'em. There's nobody the Tigers like to beat better than the Indians."

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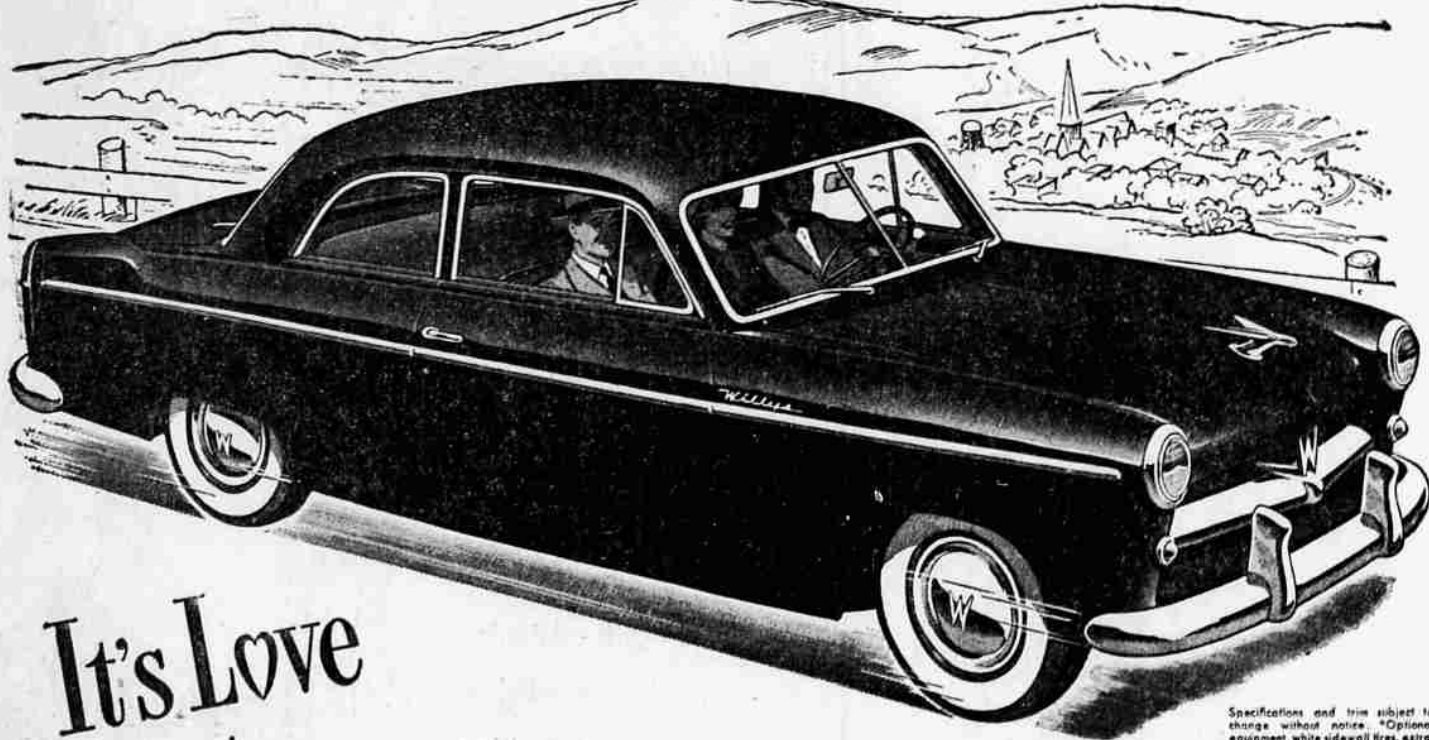
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
