ations don't seem slated now for full swing for several days yet. Eighteen cars, three by rail and 15 trucks, have been shipped to date, according to figures from the state department of agriculture.

The weather, which plays such an important part in spud production, has held good and while several weeks ago farmers were hoping for frost-free days through the middle of this month, and now they are making the best of what they are getting—more frost-free days.

As long as the weather holds, spuds will grow.

Potato prices were still looking good and holding strong, with a few more potatoes this year keeping the price lower than last. The San Francisco market reports show Washington russets selling at \$3.50, while Idaho's were reported going from \$3.85 to \$3.90.

The common formula used by farmers here to decide what they would like to get for their spud produce is to knock off \$1 from the San Francisco market prices. Transportation, expenses and other costs come out of that dollar.

Most reported prices here indicate \$4.25 to \$4.50 as the announced offers by buyers.

Alaska harvest has hit its pace and is estimated to be about 25 per cent complete, with price-tack hitting the 35 and 36-cent marks. The Klamath Basin this year is producing 40 per cent of the nation's Alaska crop, with some early yields hitting as high as 700 pounds per acre already reported.

Heavier yields in some sectors of second-year clover will probably go much higher.

Last year one Klamath field produced an average of more than 1,100 pounds of seed to the acre after it had been scalped and then reseeded at a local plant.
