KLAMATH FALLS LIVESTOCK
SLAUGHTER CATTLE — Receipts of all cattle and calves were 504 compared to 506 last week. Receipts of slaughter cows were in lesser supply than previous weeks and were from 1.00 to 2.00 under last week. A few Commercial cows went around 17.50 with Utility kinds from 15.20 to 16.80. Canners and cutters 11.50 to 15.00 with a few shelly kinds to 7.00. Slaughter steers were in heavier supply with several loads of good steers from 24.90 to 26.00. One lot topped at 26.30. Commercial kinds were down as much as 1.00 per hundredweight and sold around 22.50. Utility steers 17.10 to 20.00 with several cutter steers from 13.50 to 16.00. A limited supply of Commercial heifers were from 19.00 to 24.00. A few commercial and utility bulls from 19.00 to 23.00. Slaughter calves were 1.00 to 2.00 lower with a few choice kinds up to 26.00. Good calves from 20.00 to 23.00. Commercial kinds from 18.50 to 19.25.

STOCKERS AND FEEDERS
The supply of stockers and feeders was heaviest of the season. Most good quality cattle were in good demand. Several loads of good to choice 700 to 800 pound feeders went from 21.75 to 24.80 with medium kinds of the same weight from 18.30 to 20.00. Good to choice 500 to 700 pound feeders from 18.10 to 24.50 with plainer kinds to 17.00. 400 to 500 pound calves from 11.03 to 23.50. Several lots of good to choice feeder heifers from 20.10 to 24.00. Medium kinds to 16.00. Not enough stocker calves to establish a market. Several pairs of stock cows and calves went from 135.00 to 210.00. Baby bull calves from 10.00 to 18.00 per head and heifer calves from 20.00 to 32.00.

SHEEP — Receipts of sheep were 14 compared to 75 last week. Good to choice slaughter lambs around 22.00. A few utility slaughter ewes at 3.50.

HOGS — Receipts of hogs were 85 compared to 124 last week. Prices on butcher hogs were down .50 to .75 with choice number 1 and 2 butchers from 22.20 to 23.20. A few heavy sows at 14.00 and light sows up to 18.00. Some heavy feeder hogs at 20.00. Boars from 5.00 to 6.60 per hundredweight.

CHICAGO — Hog buyers found another reduced supply Thursday and jacked up their cash outlay by 25 to 50 cents a hundred pounds in clearing the run.

Cattle were mostly steady to firm except for bulls which were mostly 50 cents higher. Little was done in the sheep market.

Barrows and gilts mostly sold within a narrow 15-cent range at \$20.00 to \$20.15. These weighed from 190 to 250 pounds. Heavier weights were too scarce to matter while those weighing 160 to 180 pounds brought \$18.25 to \$19.85. Sows were \$16.00 to \$19.00 mostly a few going on to \$19.25.

Good to prime steers ruled \$27.00 to \$34.00 and good to average choice heifers and mixed yearlings were \$27.00 to \$32.00. Cows topped at \$21.00.

In early trading the only sales of sheep were confined to a deck of choice old-crop material at \$23.00 and a deck of good kinds at \$21.50.

Polio May Set Record

PORTLAND — Infantile paralysis cases may reach 50,000 in the United States this year, and that means a goal of 50 million dollars for the next March of Dimes.

A regional conference was held Thursday by Warren D. Coss, fund raising chairman for the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Coss, here from New York, spoke to about 100 persons from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Hawaii at the opening of a two-day session. He said that 4,032 cases were reported in the United States last week, an all-time high, and past experience indicates that at the year's total will be about 50,000.

The meeting here is to map plans for fund raising.
