Shrine Circus' Therons Work Wonders On Wheels
Circling, whirling, spinning movements characterize many of the marvelous deeds to be seen in the 1952 Shrine-Polack Bros. Circus, which comes to the Klamath Falls Shrine Club for performances at 2:15 and 8:15 Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 20-21, and at 3:45 and 8:15 Monday, Sept. 22.
Wide circling motion is the very essence of the cycling wizardry of the Therons. On two-wheelers and one-wheelers, sometimes with ballet grace and sometimes with broad comedy overtones, the numerous members of this astonishing family, alone and in concert, demonstrate the vast range of things that can be accomplished with that great human invention, the wheel.
The Four Whirlwinds live up to their name with a breathtaking performance on roller skates. Within the limited confines of a circular platform only nine feet in diameter, they create a veritable cyclone of fast gyrating action. Then, at the finish the girls spin individually by swiftly which the men support while whirling the entire foursome at terrific velocity.
Five horizontal bars pitched at two levels are the axis for sweeping, swirling, somersaulting gymnastics by Los Hermanos Ibarra. One of the brothers describes great arcs as he flies back and forth in a series of figure eights between the two topmost bars, and all three revolve majestically in giant swings at the conclusion of their act.
Circular is much of the motion in the circus, and round is the shape of many of the objects it involves—the wheels, for instance, which one of the Myron Duo revolves so lithely with his feet atop a perch balanced on the feet of his partner, and balls and hoops which Francis Brunn juggles with incredible agility.
The traditional symbol of the circus—the ring—circumscribes the maneuvers through which the Packs elephant prodigies are directed by the MacDonalds, the grills and formations of Jack Joyce's performing camels, and the horseback antics of the jockey dogs of Karlis Petersons.
The very words "circus" and "circle" are of common derivation.

Portland City Council Mulls Sport Arena Plan
PORTLAND (P)—The Portland City Council will look into a proposal that it build a huge sports center and livestock exhibition arena in exchange for property worth two and a quarter million dollars.
The property is the present Pacific International Livestock Exposition building in North Portland, and the downtown George A. White Servicemen's Center.
The proposed site is the area where Vanport existed before the 1948 flood wiped out that city. It is just south of the present P-I site.
City Commissioner Ormond R. Bean first made the matter public Wednesday when he asked the council to look into it and the council approved a committee study.
Then at the annual P-I press-radio dinner Wednesday night, R. L. Clark, P-I vice president, outlined the details.
He said the plan had been under study for some years and now has substantial backing from P-I stockholders and the servicemen's center directors. He said that as he visions it, the new development would house the P-I other exhibitions, basketball and other major sports events. Nearby a baseball stadium for the Portland Pacific Coast League club might be built. And all of it, he said, should be surrounded by a city park of 600 acres with boating lagoons, cycle paths and other recreational facilities.
Clark named no figures, but later Walter Holt, P-I manager, said the property to be offered the city is valued at two and a quarter million dollars.
The Air Force has been dicker-ing for the P-I building, presumably for storage space, and the structure already has been with-drawn from basketball rental use. As a result, the University of Port-land Wednesday arranged to play its games in the Ice Arena. It used the P-I building last year.

GRAIN MOVES
SALEM (P)— Movement of grain into Portland by river barges and trucks during August was the largest in history, the State De-partment of Agriculture said Thursday.
The movement totaled 1,900,000 bushels, of which about half went by barge.
Figures were not available on the amount shipped by rail.

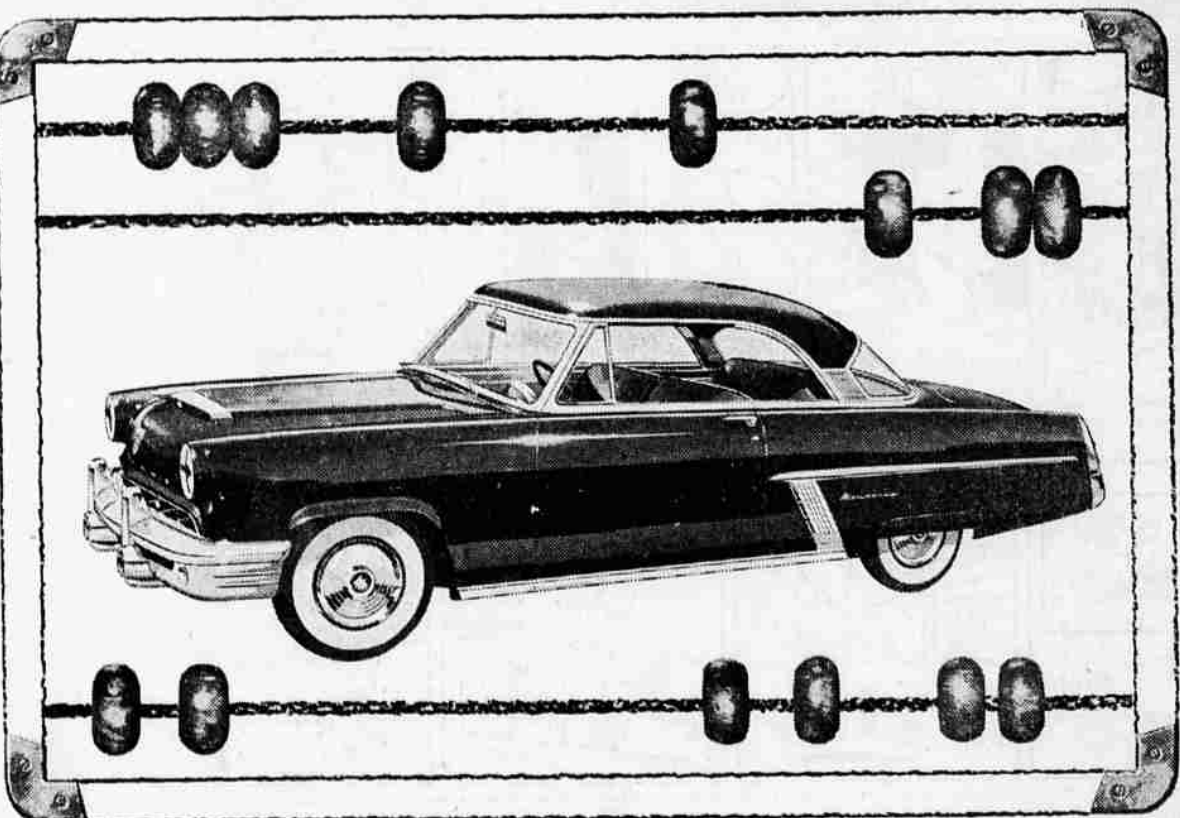
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Stewart New Board Member

SALEM (P)— Sam B. Stewart, 30, assistant attorney general, was named by the State Board of Control Thursday as a member of Oregon's three-man tax commis-sion.
He will succeed Commissioner Robert D. Maclean Oct. 15. Maclean resigned to enter the insurance business of State Treas-urer Walter J. Pearson.
Stewart has been attorney for the tax commission since April 15, 1951. He is a graduate of Willa-mette Law School and served in the Army in the South Pacific.
He will be head of the commis-sion's property tax division. Com-missioner Carl Chambers heads the utilities division, and Com-missioner Ray Smith runs the in-come tax division.

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
