The Merrill Huskies won the Sacred Heart Trojans last as the two Klamath County League teams squared off against King's-X football game yesterday.

Ray Rader, Huskies' quarterback, led the Tulelake Hawks, 31-12, last night under the winners' lights.

Jim Souza's Trojans dropped a 19-6 decision to the Wildcats of Klamath Union High yesterday afternoon on Modoc Field.

Fullback Johnny O'Neil scored three times for Merrill. He dashed 30 yards for the first score in the opening stanza, capping a 70-yard drive; O'Neil accounted for the second score in the first quarter on a three-yard plunge after the Huskies had recovered a fumble.

O'Neil added the fifth touchdown in the fourth quarter, barreling over from the two-yard line.

Tailback Jerry Wolfram danced 10 yards for the Huskies' third touchdown in the first chapter and Halfback Leroy Johnson rambled 15 yards on a reverse play in the second quarter.

Tulelake scored in the second and fourth quarters. Jerry King caught a pass for the fourth-quarter tally.

Don Dexter sparked the Wildcats with two touchdowns while George Arnold scored once as the KU team denied the Trojans with mostly straight-ahead power plays.

Phillip Collins, passed to Wayne Neubert for Sacred Heart's only score in the last quarter.

Santa Rosa Thrashes Oretech, 19-0

Fumbles Costly To Owls

SANTA ROSA (Special) — Santa Rosa Junior College upset highly-rated Oregon Tech in the opening game of the 1952-53 season, 38-6, before a crowd of 2,500 on historic Bailey Field here Friday night.

Recovering a total of six of seven Oregon Tech fumbles and converting three into touchdowns, the Bear Cubs took a 13-0 lead in the opening quarter and maintained command throughout over an impressive team that went into the contest rated Number 8 among the nation's junior colleges.

Despite the ground-burning advances of ace Owl Halfback Don Foreman who paced Tech to a total of 10 first downs to the same number for Santa Rosa, the losers were unable to put together a winning attack inside the enemy 30-yard lines.

Santa Rosa amassed a total of 34 net yards to 236 for Oregon Tech. The Owls' fumble and slight edge in passing, gaining 99 yards to 92 for Santa Rosa.

Net yardage tallied 192 for Santa Rosa and 137 for the visitors from the mile-high Klamath campus.

DISASTER
Disaster struck early against the Owls.

Odie Canada kicked off to SRJC safetyman Wally Williams on the 15 and the receiver sprinted to the 30-yard line.

On the next play, Tech's 27, Halfback Jim Seara, took a punt back for 77 and another score in the night's best run.

SG barely scored in each of the first two quarters. In the first 25 seconds on the clock when Fullback Leon Sellers went across from the one, clinching a 28-yard thrust which started with a recovered fumble.

Thirty seconds remained in the half when the Trojans would up a drive with Rudy Buchik passing to end Don Stillwell in the end zone.

But the third quarter was the big one. It was less than three minutes old when Paalits made his first scoring interception. Two minutes later, Seara threaded his way for 57 yards on the punt return, a gallop made possible by End Bill Hattig's key block in midfield.

Paalits' second interception came with only three minutes left.

Oddly SG made only 12 yards from scrimmage during the big quarter.

Trojans subs took over in the final period but that didn't detract from WS's lone drive. For the first time, the feared Bob Burkhardt—Ed Barker pass combination worked right. Combined with a well-designed ground offense, it brought a score after 76 yards in 18 plays.

FIRST DOWNS
Strictly off the statistics, SC wasn't so much better than the Northerners. The Trojans led in running yardage, 153-129, and in passing, 40-38. That made the net 192-167. Washington State led in first downs, 16-10.

The loss was made doubly tough for the Cougars by the loss of one of its star ends, Don Steinbrunner. He went out in the third period with a clipped bone in his elbow.

Trojan Halfback Bob Buckley suffered a broken collarbone and was lost for several weeks.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Southern California may or may not be a top contender for the Pacific Coast Conference football title this fall. But one thing seems certain Saturday—Washington State won't.

Until Friday night there was talk that this year's Cougars might be the toughest team to come out of Pullman in 20 years. But the dream vanished in a 35-7 setback from SG's Trojans in the season's opener in Memorial Coliseum before 26,208 fans.

Actually, Southern California's offensive margin didn't bear out the score. Each team put on one sustained touchdown drive. The other four Trojan scores can be credited to alert ball-hawking.

Halfback Jim Paalits accounted for two of them with pass interceptions, one for 56 yards, the other for 33. Halfback Jim Seara took a punt back for 77 and another score in the night's best run.

North Bend Upsets GP

North Bend registered the first upset of the 1952 Oregon High School football season when it dumped Grants Pass, last year's state champion, 24-7, Friday night.

The lightly-regarded team from the coast handed the Cavemen their first defeat since 1949, and did it on their home field, too.

Shantz, vest pocket portside, registered his fifth shutout of the season against the Yankees and stretched his string of scoreless innings against the champions to 29. Only four Yankees got safeties and six of them went down swinging at the little pitcher's jughandle curve.

Early Wynn's 22nd pitching victory and Larry Doby's 31st home run were the big factors in Cleveland's triumph over Detroit. Wynn hurled an eight-hitter in subduing the docile Tigers. Doby's home run came in the first inning to send the Indians off to a strong lead.

In other National League games, the St. Louis Cardinals downed the Chicago Cubs, 5-0, and Cincinnati topped Pittsburgh, 4-3.

The Washington Senators won the only other American League game when rookie Mike Fornieles throttled the Boston Red Sox, 5-3.

Ducks Eye UCLA Upset

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Bruins of UCLA were favored to defeat Oregon by three touchdowns in their Pacific Coast Conference football game in Memorial Coliseum Saturday.

Oregon, still in the rebuilding stage, banked on two star T-style quarterbacks, Hal Dunham and George Shaw, to pull an upset.

UCLA, blessed with more seasoned talent, relied mainly on diminutive Fred Narleson at the left half, or tailback, position in their single wing attack.

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Klamaths Spot TD, Then Roll

ROSEBURG (Special) — Fullback Jim Dougherty scored four touchdowns and kicked an extra point to lead the Klamath Falls Pelicans to a 38-6 inter-district victory at Roseburg Friday night.

With able assistance from Halfbacks Ken Young and Cal Gilmore and Quarterback Bill Salt, the Pels came from behind in the first quarter to completely outclass the Indians.

The Roseburg team shocked the visitors in the first three and a half minutes by moving 94 yards to a score, mostly on the passing of Quarterback Bud Backen.

The shock soon lifted, however. Closing their vaunted passing attack, the Pels rolled on the ground from their own 29 to the Roseburg line in the next four minutes.

Dougherty bulled over for his first score. He kicked the extra point to put his squad ahead for good.

Young got his chance midway in the period when he raced 47 yards for the second touchdown. Moments later, the amazing halfback set up the third by returning Backen's punt 71 yards. He was robbed of the score by a shoestring tackle from behind by Safetyman Larry Fitzgerald. A Salt-to-Dougherty screen pass was good from the Roseburg 18.

The spectacular Young had more bad luck just before the half ended when he caught a Salt pass far behind the nearest defender. He romped into the end zone completing a play which covered 61 yards.

But it was called back on a penalty. On the next play, however, Salt connected with George Hanson who was stopped on the three. With just eight seconds left in the half, Dougherty scored, raising the score to 26-6.

FINAL SCORE
Dougherty got his last touchdown midway in the third quarter when he gathered a 14-yard pass from Larry Yarnell. Second-stringer Louie Taucher scored the final touchdown in the fourth quarter.

The Klamath defense stopped Roseburg's only other major drive at the three-yard line.

The Pelicans gained 248 yards on the ground and 151 in the air for a net total of 374 yards. They completed nine of 13 passes. Roseburg had 138 on the ground and 92 in the air for a net total of 214. First downs were 15 to 13 for the Pels.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — (NEA) — Perhaps the best pre-fight story was the so-called experts not being quite so certain about Rocky Marciano after taking a peek at Jersey Joe Walcott.

The last of the red-hot papers presented his own case best. He had nothing but the utmost contempt for Marciano as a fighter. This after seeing the challenger four times in the flesh — against Roland LaStarza, Layne, Louis and Matthews—and on television in the triumphant affair with Savold.

"If I don't lick Marciano, I want them to take my name out of the record books and forget that I was heavyweight champion," said Walcott, perspiration pouring off his remarkable 38-year-old body in the stuffy dressing room beneath the stand at Atlantic City's Bader Field.

"I was a working man myself, so with Christmas coming up, I hope the working people in my home town of Brockton won't be deceived by all they've read, and bet their life's savings on Marciano."

Suds Cinch Third Spot

The Seattle Rainiers, defending champions of the Pacific Coast League, nailed down third place for 1952 Friday night by splitting a doubleheader with the Hollywood Stars while the pursuing Portland Beavers were losing to San Francisco.
