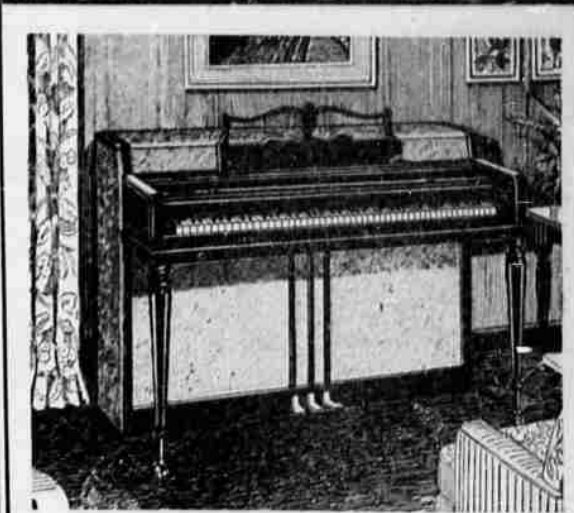
MT. LAKE GARDEN CLUB
