Parish Hall Work Speeds

LAKEVIEW—Work is progressing rapidly on the new St. Patrick's parish hall on G. Street. South and the building is expected to be finished by about Dec. 10. It was reported by Father James O'Connor, pastor of St. Patrick's parish.

The building will be used for Sunday School classes and as a meeting place and recreation hall for the various youth and adult organizations of the Catholic Church.

Cost of construction will be about \$40,000 and the work is being done by Riverman and Sons, Portland contractors. The building is located on two lots, totaling 108 by 100 feet in size, which were bought from Ike Kent and Claude Graham.

The building will have a 75-foot front and will be 60 feet deep. On a concrete slab with basement for the furnace, the building will be one story high and will be finished in variegated tapestry brick veneer.

Features of the building will be meetings and recreation, three classrooms, a meeting room for the Knights of Columbus, a kitchen with facilities for serving meals into any of the meeting rooms or the recreation hall.

Construction of this hall is the result of a funds drive conducted by the church membership.

Manhunt Near Klamath Area

YREKA, Calif., (AP) — A manhunt was on Monday in the Siskiyou Mountains north of here for two escapees from the Oregon State Penitentiary.

The pair, Gerald T. Macomber, 27, and Charles P. Grozier, 24—vanished after exchanging shots with officers Saturday night on the Elliott Creek Road, just south of the California-Oregon border.

Sheriff's officers said no one—officers or fugitives—was believed hurt in the shooting.

Macomber, sentenced to life in prison for murder, and Grozier, going 10 years for grand theft, escaped Sept. 15 from the penitentiary at Salem.
