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The victory boosted Brooklyn's lead over the miracle men of 1951 to six games. Both teams have six games left to play and one Brooklyn triumph or Giant defeat will pull down Brooklyn's first pennant since 1949.

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Meanwhile, Allie Reynolds kept the Yankees in the driver's seat in the American League race. The Chief, gunning for his first 20-victory season, pitched the Yanks to a 4-0 decision over Harry Byrd and the peppy Philadelphia Athletics.

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ORDER
Behind Hollywood the clubs finished in this order: Oakland, Seattle, Portland, San Diego, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Sacramento.

Seattle officials reported that on the basis of unofficial figures the Rainiers' first baseman Bob Boyd won the Pacific Coast League batting crown with .320, noosing out teammate Artie Wilson who had .318.

Portland's Beavers and San Francisco's Seals romped through a doubleheader, as Portland clinched fourth place in the final standings by taking the first, 3-2. The Beavers returned after the intermission and repeated, 6-8.

GET STARTED
The end of the PCL season saw the Los Angeles Angels just getting started. They overcame the San Diego Padres, 2-1, in the first game of a doubleheader. Their engine spent, the Angels barely walked off with the second game, 2-1.

Oakland and Sacramento wound up their efforts for the season in an affair more like a clambake than a series game of baseball. The Seals, a mere 4½ games behind Hollywood, won the first game, 3-1, and Oakland took the nightcap, 4-1.

DOUBLE FOR LASSWELL
ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. (AP) — Day double addicts will be more careful in the future when Glen Lasswell is aboard a long shot. Lasswell recently won the first two races here for a \$1,220.80 double.

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In the seventh and ninth innings, Cass Michaels tripled to begin the seventh but died on third. The A's loaded the bases with one out in the ninth but couldn't pierce Reynolds' armor.

Byrd surrendered only five hits but the Yankees bunched two of them along with a pair of walks in the sixth inning to score the game's only run. Yogi Berra singled Joe Collins across from second base with the payoff marker.

Lemon turned back the Tigers on four hits in gaining his 21st conquest of the campaign. Al Rosen was the big wheel for Cleveland, batting in four runs on his 27th homer and a double.

The Dodgers and Braves were locked in a 2-2 duel until the eighth when the Brooks scored six runs after two were out to lock it up. Roy Campanella singled home the tie-breaking run.

Black limited Boston to three hits and deserved a shoutout as Carl Furillo's error in the fourth led to both Brave runs.

EVENS RECORD
Veteran Russ Meyer paraded out nine hits in besting the Giants and equalling his record at 13-13. The Phils clinched matters in the fourth when Bill Nicholson rocked Jimmy Hearn for a three-run homer.

Home runs were the deciding factors in other National League games.

Ted Klusgrass and rookie Jim Greengrass clouted homers to account for all of Cincinnati's runs in a 4-3 triumph over Pittsburgh. Bill Serota smashed a two-run homer in the seventh to lead Chicago to a 3-2 decision over St. Louis.

Stan Musial accounted for both Card runs off Bob Rush with a barrier blow in the first inning. In other American League games, Billy Pierce pitched Chicago to a 4-1 victory over St. Louis and the Boston Red Sox scored five runs in the ninth inning to vanquish Washington, 7-3.
