Native Dancer Favored

NEW YORK (AP)—Native Dancer can just about sew up the 1952 2-year-old championship Saturday in the rich Futurity Stakes, but the main business at hand is the \$25,000-added Lawrence Realization tomorrow at Belmont Park.

The Lawrence is expected to help settle the 3-year-old title chase between the two leading contenders of the moment, Calumet Farm's Mark-Ye-Well and Mrs. Walter M. Jeffords' One Count.

While Native Dancer was thumping the juvenile rivals in the \$5,000 Anticipation purse yesterday, Calumet's trainer, Plain Ben Jones, won a protest over Belmont's stewards.

EIGHT POUNDS
Jones claimed Mark-Ye-Well was entitled to an eight-pound allowance under conditions of the Lawrence. The stewards said not. The conditions state non-winners of a 3-year-old weight for age race valued at \$25,000 get eight pounds off the top weight of 126 pounds.

Mark-Ye-Well had won two \$100,000 jobs in Chicago during the summer, the Arlington Classic and American Derby, and stewards ruled he had to pack 126. Jones appealed to the State Racing Commission and was upheld for the two Chicago races were not weight for age.

One Count, winner of the \$100,000 Belmont and the Travers Stakes, will have to carry 126, if he starts. The Belmont is weight for age, 126 pounds.

Native Dancer, unbeaten now in seven straight races, took charge in the final three-sixteenths of a mile of the six-furlong Anticipation Purse. The grey son of Polynesian, from the stable of Alfred Gwynne Vanderbilt and ridden by Eric Guerin, beat Ben Whitaker's Tahitian King by a length and a quarter. Hal Price Headley's Reprimand was third.

The Vanderbilt colt was the \$2.80 for \$2.00 favorite.

Diver May Try Mile Mark

ABOARD THE YACHT MON-SOON (AP)—Deep sea diver Otis Barton has decided to try to break his own diving record.

Setting forth today on an under-seas photographic expedition, he announced that he might as well attempt a mark for future divers to ponder: one mile.

This headquarters yacht and the barge Cherry Picker, which carries the two-ton diving bell called the benthoscope, will meet today near Santa Catalina Island off the Southern California coast. There the equipment will be tested in water a mere 2,000 feet deep. Tomorrow, Barton will scramble into his six-foot steel sphere, along with oxygen tanks, a telephone, lights and cameras supplied by Life magazine, to try for rare under-seas pictures.

To be tested chiefly is a new steel cable which is 5,500 feet long. It has a breaking strength of 42,000 pounds. When Barton went down 4,500 feet in 1949, he used a 3/4-inch cable which would support 28,000 pounds.

Barton's deep dives will be made

sometime this week south of San Clemente Island, where the water is nearly 7,000 feet deep.

Pictures of fiery dragons—fish with luminous spots on their sides—death's head fish and other grotesque creatures will be Barton's objectives on this expedition. Plus the new mark.

"Some of these fish may be down a mile or so," Barton said, "so I might as well go after them—and a new record, too. After all, when you're locked up in the benthoscope and in the water you might as well be down a mile as 50 feet. It's just as safe."

Most of us aboard would not even get into the benthoscope if it were safely anchored on dry land. It has an opening about 14 inches in diameter. Barton goes into the ball through this hole feet

Pressure On Fain, Musial

NEW YORK (AP)—Outfielders Frankie Baumholtz of the Chicago Cubs and Dale Mitchell of the Cleveland Indians are making belated bids to wrest the major league batting titles from Stan Musial and Ferris Fain.

Baumholtz, hitting .330, is only four points behind Musial, who tops the National League with .324. Mitchell is batting .321 and trails the American League pace-setter, Fain, a .328 hitter, by seven points. Averages include games through Monday.

Musial, aiming for his sixth National league batting crown and his third in a row, lost ground over the past week. The St. Louis stalwart went five for 18, suffering a two-point decline.

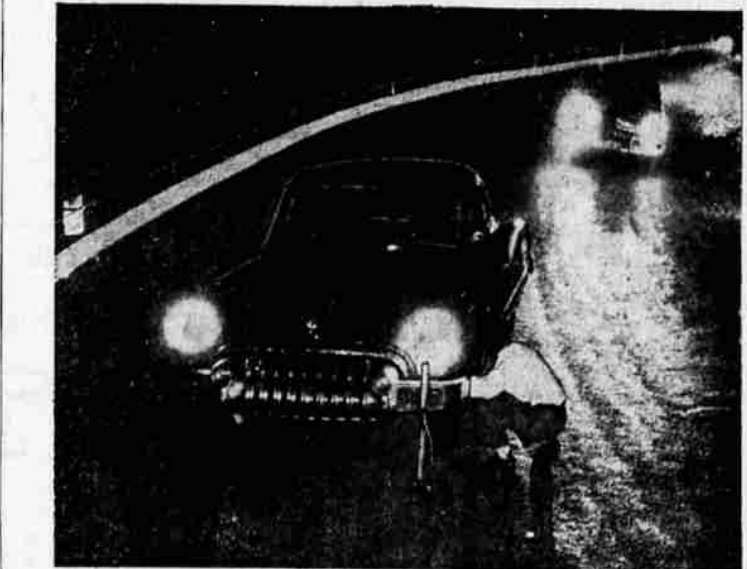

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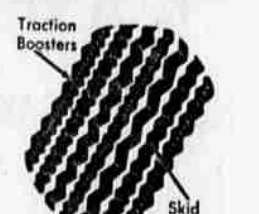
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
