Tito May Visit Britain

BLAD, Yugoslavia (AP)—Premier Marshal Tito tentatively has accepted Prime Minister Winston Churchill's invitation to visit Britain.

This was disclosed today by British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden at a brief news conference concluding the Briton's five-day visit to Yugoslavia, where he has held a busy round of talks with the leaders of the West's Communist ally.

Eden gave no expected date for the visit. However, the Yugoslav Communist Party Congress, originally scheduled to be held Oct. 19, was postponed suddenly last week until Nov. 2 and there has been speculation Tito might make the trip before that latter date.

The visit would be Tito's first departure from his country since the break between his government and the Cominform early in 1948.

I vote for the man," he said.

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Nixon Office Said Mixed In Tax Case

ST. LOUIS (AP)—The Post-Dispatch reported Tuesday the trustee of an \$18,000 expense fund for Sen. Richard M. Nixon, the Republican vice presidential nominee, enlisted the aid of Nixon's Washington office in connection with a tax refund claim of between \$500,000 to \$600,000.

The newspaper, in a copyrighted dispatch from Los Angeles by James A. Kearns Jr., quoted the trustee, Dana C. Smith, as saying "some progress" has been made on the tax case since then.

The claim, still pending in the Court of Claims, was filed by the Red River Lumber Co., of Northern California. The Post-Dispatch said the firm is owned by Smith's family and that Smith is a stockholder and attorney for the company.

Smith, a Pasadena attorney who also contributed \$300 to the fund, was quoted by the Post-Dispatch as saying he was introduced to an attorney in the Justice Department's tax division by John J. Irwin, then an administrative assistant to Nixon.

In Pasadena, Smith confirmed that he made a "routine request" to Sen. Nixon's office "more than a year ago to inquire as to what was holding up the case. Smith added:

"This was an ordinary courtesy such as any senator's office would perform for any constituent. Sen. Nixon was not himself involved, and I don't even know that he was consulted. I have never discussed the merits of the case with Sen. Nixon."

Smith said in reply to a question: "The case is still pending. Some progress has been made, as it would be in a year, but it is still crawling along."

Nixon was not immediately available for comment.

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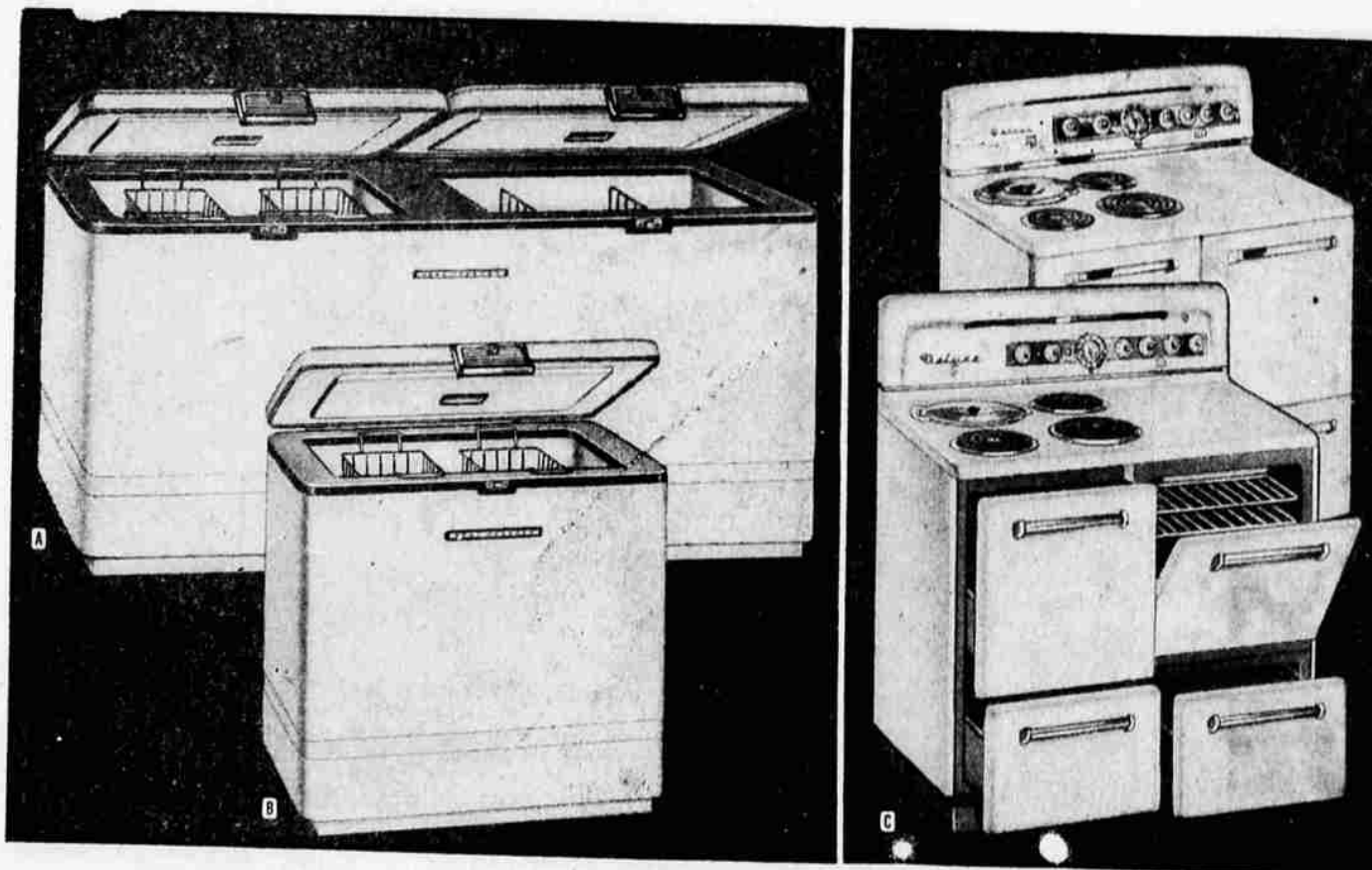
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
