Senators Urge USDA Repairs

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two senators said Wednesday that mistakes in the government's vast farm price support programs—estimated to have cost the taxpayers millions of dollars—can be corrected without legislation.

Sen. Clinton Anderson (D-NM), former secretary of agriculture, told a reporter that "there is plenty of authority now to correct errors and deficiencies."

"All that is needed is more and tighter supervision at the top," he said.

Sen. Milton Young (R-ND) agreed with Anderson in a separate interview.

"All this could be straightened out by administrative action in the Department of Agriculture," Young said. "If officials there don't correct it, Congress may

have to step in."

A highly critical, 43-page report on the situation was approved by the Senate Agriculture Committee Tuesday.

Both Anderson and Young, members of the committee, said they regarded the report and its recommendations as fair.

The report estimated that more than 10 million dollars worth of government-owned grain, acquired under price support operations, had been embezzled or taken by "criminal conversion."

The report agreed with Secretary Brannan that no Agriculture Department officials or employees had personally profited from these actions or been involved criminally in the grain shortages.

Guards Quell Cons Riot

CHESTER, Ill. (AP) — A two-hour tear gas barrage by state policemen and prison guards Tuesday night quelled a 27-hour rebellion by 300 convicts at Menard State prison.

Three inmates were injured in the riot which began at supper time Monday as prison authorities awaited the arrival this week of a legislative committee to inspect the institution.

One policeman was injured slightly when a tear gas gun backfired. Warden Jerome Munie estimated damage to the prison at \$5,000.

Munie said authorities rejected the prisoners' 18 demands, involving food, heat, immunity for rioters and equal prison rights for Negro inmates. But he said an investigation of their complaints will be made.

U.S. Oilman Visits Iran

WASHINGTON (AP) — A top Iranian political leader said Wednesday he is talking with an American business man who says he can form a 140 million dollar company to transport and sell Iranian oil to Europe and Asia.

Hussein Makki, visiting Iranian deputy, told a reporter his discussions thus far are in the preliminary stage and that it is impossible to predict whether they will succeed. He did not name the American.

Makki, who is secretary general of Premier Mossadegh's National Front Party, indicated the American company might be prepared to run the British blockade and buy Iranian oil even before Iran settles its nationalization fight with Britain.

White Girl, Barnes to Wed

PORTLAND (AP) — A Portland white girl Tuesday announced plans to marry Emory Barnes, Negro football star from the University of Oregon.

Miss LaVerne Parton said the wedding will take place Sunday in the First Unitarian Church in downtown Portland.

Barnes, an end who won the praise of UCLA Coach Red Sanders for his performance in last Saturday's game at Los Angeles, will remain in school. He will be in the Oregon lineup for Saturday night's game here with Nebraska.

Adlai Refuses to Reveal Names of Contributors

BALTIMORE (AP) — Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson said Wednesday he will not reveal the names of those who contributed to or received money from a special cash fund he set up to supplement the pay of some Illinois state officials.

"There is no point in revealing any names," the Democratic presidential nominee said.

"It would be publicly they do not deserve and a breach of good faith on my part, too."

Sen. Richard Nixon, the Republican vice-presidential nominee, and several other Republicans have demanded Stevenson reveal details of the fund. Nixon talked about it in his report to the nation Tuesday night on his own \$18,000 fund for political expenses.

The governor discussed his fund at a breakfast of 550 volunteers for Stevenson which wound up a week's campaigning in the east.

He said he chose the method of raising the income of "key state employees" because the positions were filled by men who not only took the jobs at less money than they had been receiving, but gave up security for the hazards of government.

He said one official had at least three times turned down offers from private enterprises at more than three times his public salary.

"This loyalty and devotion is very hard to attract, and once attracted it is very hard to treat lightly," Stevenson said.

"The Illinois governor said he hoped 'this discussion will focus attention to this problem on a all levels of government.'"

He maintained adequate compensation for public officials is "one of the most pressing needs for good government."

He said he knew of "no method except to pay higher salaries."

The governor also said uniform salary scales adopted by most states for their employees are not as "satisfactory or practical as flexible scales paid by private business."

The governor explained that after his inauguration in 1948 he had found it "difficult getting men for public service with real competence, not just the garden variety, to take key positions."

Some that he did take on, he said, suffered financial losses.

Stevenson said he first considered a plan whereby public spirited citizens would make gifts to the state itself or a foundation established for the state.

This was rejected as impractical. Then he hit on the idea of "gifts, usually around Christmas time to

a small number of key employees making sacrifices for the state."

The money came from a balance left from his campaign funds and later contributions.

He insisted there was no connection between the contributor and the recipient. Neither has ever known who the other was, Stevenson said, nor have other state officials known who has been receiving what.

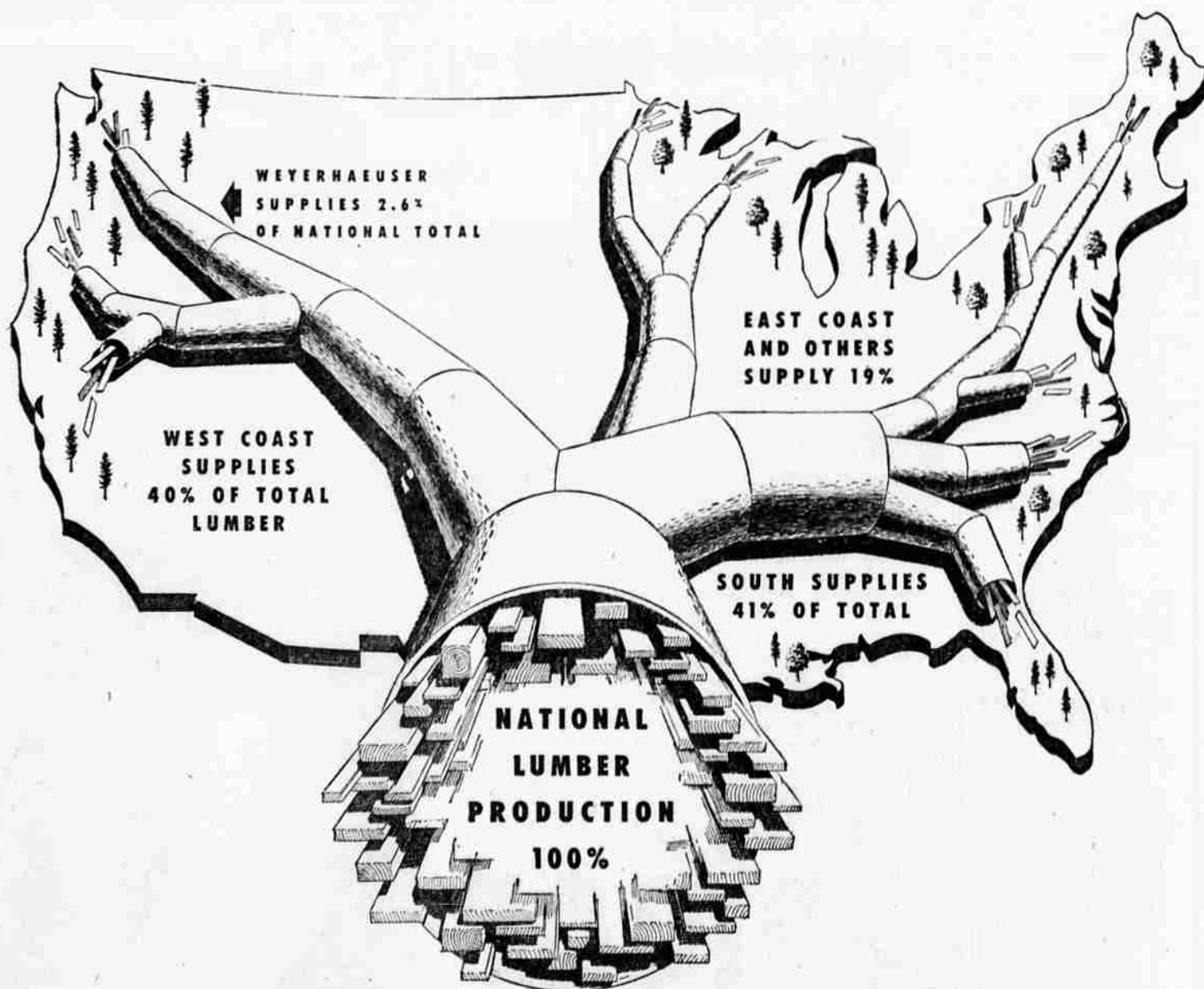

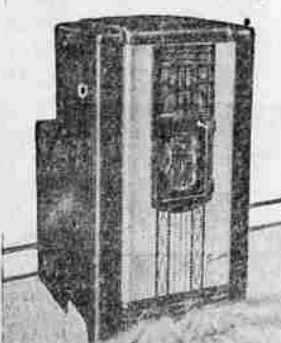

"Vote No on the Racing Bill"

"Here's why we can't afford to lose pari-mutuel revenues:
"(1) Taxes would go up.
Next year the State Treasury would lose roughly \$1,000,000 in pari-mutuel revenue. We taxpayers would have to make up the loss.

"(2) The fairs will suffer and may die. Our 36 county fairs depend to a large extent on pari-mutuel funds for existence. They'll each lose an estimated \$12,500 annually if racing is abolished.

"(3) Oregon and its 36 counties receive more than eight (8) times as much as the track stockholders are paid in dividends. That's not unreasonable. In addition, official records and audits show that over 98% of every wagered dollar that produces this revenue, remains here in Oregon.

"Joining me in this opposition are 37 responsible men representing every county in Oregon. Our Taxpayers' Committee to Retain Pari-Mutuel Revenues is composed of ranchers, businessmen, farmers and civic leaders who realize pari-mutuel funds make a yearly contribution to the tax and economic structure of our state."
