Brooklyn Nails Down Pennant

'Subway Series' Looms

The prospect of New York's 19th "subway" World Series since 1921 is extremely bright today with the Brooklyn Dodgers already "in" and the New York Yankees pounding on the door.

Brooklyn provided the long suffering fans of Flatbush their first real sleep in three years last night as they clinched the 1952 National League pennant, their ninth since 1890.

True, the Brooks won the hunting only three years ago but many a member of the faithful experienced countless nightmares the past two seasons. In 1950 the Brooks missed losing Philadelphia for the pennant by bowing to the Phils on the last day of the season. Last year the Dodgers blew a 13½ game lead and were beaten out for the blue ribbon by the New York Giants in a three-game playoff.

Dressen Says He Will Open With Joe Black

BROOKLYN (U.P.)—The pennant celebration over and done with, Charlie Dressen, victorious manager of the champion Brooklyn Dodgers, Wednesday began thinking ahead to the forthcoming World Series.

Chuck's biggest problem is to get his pitching alignment set for the annual October classic with the American League flag winners, be it the New York Yankees or the Cleveland Indians. The series starts Wednesday, Oct. 1, at Ebbets Field.

Brooklyn clinched the National League championship Tuesday night by winning the first game of a doubleheader with the Phils, 6-4. Philadelphia took the second, 1-0, in 12 innings.

"My present plans are to start Joe Black in the opening game of the World Series," Dressen stated. "Now that Joe has proved to me he can pitch nine innings, he is my No. 1 pitcher."

Except for one remark, Dressen was extremely careful not to speak disparagingly of the Dodgers' ancient enemy, the dehorned champion New York Giants and his personal rival, Manager Leo Durocher.

"Well, boys," he shouted soon after the players stormed into the clubhouse following their first game triumph that assured them of the pennant. "The magic number is zero. And if they (the Giants) want to win the pennant they gotta wait until next year."

SALAS STOPS YUNG

PHOENIX, Ariz. (U.P.)—Lauro Salas, world lightweight champion, exploded a sharp right cross in the fifth round to knock out Ramon (Chino) Yung of Los Angeles here Tuesday night in a fight that may have been a title bout despite its billing to the contrary.

The Mexican brawler put out the lights for his scrappy opponent after 1:32 of the round had expired. The fight was scheduled for a full 10.

The possibility that the fight may have been staged with the lightweight crown at stake cropped up when it was learned that Yung weighed in at 134 instead of the over the limit 136 or more he was supposed to scale.

This put him at legal weight over a legal distance against a world champion.

Pitch Breaks Shantz' Wrist

PHILADELPHIA (U.P.)—A pitch thrown by a hurler on a second division ball club to a batter with a handful of hits may have decided the 1952 American League pennant race.

The pitcher was the Washington Senators' Walt Masterson. The hitler was the Philadelphia Athletics' southpaw, Bobby Shantz.

The loss unleashed by Masterson Tuesday in the second inning of a Washington-A's game fractured Shantz' pitching wrist and sent the New York Yankees pennant hopes soaring.

As a result of Cleveland's 10-1 loss to the Chicago White Sox the Indians now trail the pennant-conscious Yankees by a game and a half.

Littler Medalist

Huskies, Trojans Top 'Stix'

LOS ANGELES (U.P.)—Washington's offense and Southern California's defense marked the opening games of the 1952 Pacific Coast Conference football campaign.

Washington's passing, handled mainly by quarterback Don Heinrich, netted 287 yards against weak Idaho. The Huskies added 31 yards on the ground for a total of 418 on offense.

Southern Cal led in defense. The Trojans surrendered only 38 yards to Washington State's vaunted passing game, and allowed the Cougars only 167 yards running and passing.

Best running attack was Oregon State's 290 against Utah, while UCLA took leading honors on rushing defense, holding Oregon to only 78 yards.

League statisticians reported top individual performances were turned in by Heinrich, Sam Baker of Oregon State, Johnny Olaszewski of California, and Dick Bower of Washington State.

Heinrich connected on 18 of 27 passes.

Baker led the conference in rushing offense, gaining 153 yards in 31 carries. Olaszewski was next with 122 in 20 carries followed by Bower, 91 in 20 tries.

Lorino Named On All-Stars

SPOKANE (U.P.)—Pennant-winning Victoria placed three players on the Western International League 1952 all-star team selected last week by the league's sportswriters and scorekeepers.

Cecil Garriott, Victoria playing-manager, was named an all-star outfielder and also was selected as manager-of-the-year. Wil. President Robert Abel said.
