A young Klamath girl, Dorthella Rose, has been sent to Sacred Heart Hospital in Eugene, with a tentative case of polio, the county health office has reported.

Dorthella is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Orville Rose, 2316 California Ave.

Earlier this week, two members of the Boys Town Choir were sent to Eugene with the same diagnosis, but the condition is reported without paralysis. The choir made an appearance here at the Tower Theater.

Dr. Seth Kerron, county health officer, said the two boys should not be considered as Klamath victims since they had just come here. The year's total polio victims stands at eight at present, about the same as in past years.

Meanwhile, 20-year-old George Adler Jr., in Sacred Heart Hospital, Eugene, is still reported on the critical list.

## 2 More Days For X-Rays

So far there have been 10,948 X-rays taken since the survey began, and Dr. Seth Kerron, city and county health officer, has set the new goal at 21,000. The old goal was 24,000 or 80 per cent of the

adult population of Klamath County. "If we attain the 21,000 goal," Dr. Kerron said, "We will be doing something no other county has. That is about 10 per cent of the adult population."

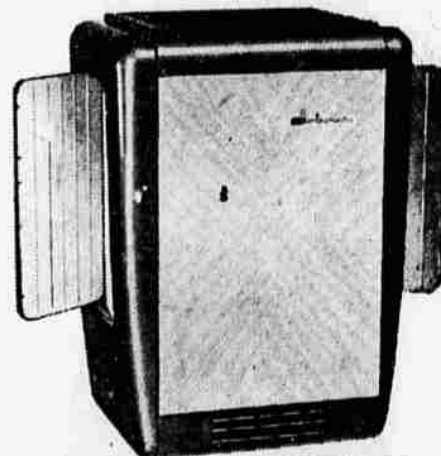
