These words are written before General Eisenhower has announced his decision as to what he will do in the case of Senator Nixon, his vice-presidential running mate. But in Cleveland Tuesday night he gave a hint of what his decision is likely to be.

He said to a packed and tumultuous audience there: "It happens to be one of those people who, when I get into a fight, would rather have a courageous and honest man at my side than a whole boxcar of pussyfoolers."

He added: "I have been a warrior and I like courage. Tonight I saw an example of courage."

He had just finished listening to Senator Nixon's dramatic and moving speech in which he told every financial detail of his life since he finished grade school—told it to at least 100 million people. That took courage. If you doubt it, put yourself in his place. It also took fighting faith in the righteousness of his motives in doing what he did.

Senator Nixon made a mistake. Immediately upon his acceptance of his \$18,000 fund, he should have made all of its details public. He went on to tell of another associate who made a mistake.

Everyone, I suppose, remembers the case of General George Patton who, for whatever reason, slapped a wounded enlisted man in a hospital in North Africa. It is said by responsible people that the man was suffering from emotional shock and General Patton slapped him smartly to bring him back to rationality.

At any rate, when the story got out, Patton's stock sank to near zero. All America was furious with him. Ike gave him a firm, some reprimand he can be grim and stern, as well as smiling, he GAVE HIM ANOTHER CHANCE. Patton went on to become one of the great military leaders of all time. He is a legend in Germany, as Stonewall Jackson is still a legend in our own North. He served his country outstandingly.

Senator Nixon, like General Patton, made a mistake. But if he is handled right (as General Patton was handled) I think it is likely he will go on and serve his country well and make a great name for himself. It often happens that a man with a great name and a great name is able to PROFIT by his mistakes and go on to new heights of patriotic achievement.

Governor Stevenson, explaining to reporters his Illinois fund which seemed to have been more or less identical in principle with Nixon's, says he chose that method of raising the income of key state employees because the positions were filled by men who not only took the jobs at less money than they had been receiving but "gave up security for the hazards of government."

He added: "This loyalty and devotion is very hard to attract, and once attracted, it is very hard to treat lightly."

He maintained that adequate compensation for public officials is one of our most pressing needs for good government. "I think that is probably true. But I'd like to point out that if we quit concentrating so much of our government in Washington and put more of it back into the statehouses, the courthouses and the city halls, where it belongs in America, our senators and representatives wouldn't have to have such expensive staffs of offices to HANDLE IN WASHINGTON the business of their constituents which now HAS to be handled in Washington."

They might then be able to get along on their salaries and allowances, I think it is probable that if the state of Illinois would put more government back into the courthouses and the city halls it would need spend less money contributed by private citizens to compensate its officials.

I have great respect for Governor Stevenson. I think he is a honorable gentleman and I decline to believe he has misused the special funds that have been placed in his care for state use.

But he is the candidate of the New Deal Democratic party and in general he is committed to the philosophy of the party—including concentration of government in Washington. So, while I respect him, I shall not vote for him.

Community-Wide Service To Introduce New Bible

A community-wide service next Tuesday, 8 p.m., at the Congregational Church will introduce to this area the new revised standard version of the Holy Bible.

On the same evening interchurch services are to be held in some 3,000 other communities throughout the United States and Canada.

Rev. Don Cassidy, host pastor, is assembling a Bible display of

many other earlier translations and the program is to include some readings from portions of the new revised edition along with similar readings from the Hebrew, Greek and Latin.

The following local pastors will make presentations on the assigned themes of:

Rev. David Barnett, "The Story of the English Bible."

Rev. Edwin Landers, "The Need for the Revision of the English Bible."

Rev. Dwayne Proett, "The Problems of Translations and the Age of Discoveries."

Rev. Lloyd Holloway, "The Work of the Standard Bible Committee."

Completion of the new version of the Bible, Rev. Cassidy said, marks an epoch in the religious life of English-speaking people comparable to that marked by the King James Version in 1611.

Recognizing the need for a new version, the International Council of Religious Education, representing 40 major denominations in the United States and Canada, appointed a committee of 32 Bible scholars authorized to study all past versions and available manuscripts in order to prepare a revision of the King James and American revised editions. The purpose was to present the Bible in good English for 20th Century readers.

The new version is to be on sale at the church and at downtown book stores. The public is invited to attend the Tuesday night observance.

HST Declines Comment On Nixon Fund

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Truman said Thursday that all congressmen should be required to make an annual accounting of all their income, public and private.

He said all top government officials should do the same. But the President declined to comment at his news conference on the Republican party's "indication" of Sen. Nixon of any wrongdoing in connection with the use of a private expense fund of \$18,335.

And he refused comment also on the special fund used by Gov. Stevenson to supplement salaries of certain state employees.

Truman did say, in answer to a question, that he himself never had such a fund.

Truman's plea for an accounting was not new. Last Sept. 27, he sent a message to Congress asking that legislation be enacted requiring an accounting of income for all top public officials.

Legislation along that line, he said then, would help prevent "improper conduct" and "unfounded suspicions."

He told his news conference Thursday that his message of last September is just as necessary now as it was then.

No action ever was taken on that message.

On other subjects raised by reporters, Truman said:

1—Like Sen. Barkman, Democratic vice presidential candidate, he put his wife on his senate staff.

The President said his employment of Mrs. Truman helped to pay his board when he was a senator.

2—He has never been sorry for firing Assistant Attorney General T. Lamar Caudle for outside activities. Caudle testified he was assured by Rep. Boykin (D-Ala.) that the President now believed he had "let Caudle a grave injustice."

NEVER HEARD

Truman said he had never heard of the "White House clique" mentioned in the Caudle testimony Wednesday before a House committee.

3—No comment but he was glad to hear of differences of opinion, as a reporter had described it, between Eisenhower and Sen. Taft on the Taft-Hartley Act.

4—The American Medical Association now admits it has been wrong in opposing his national health insurance plan. Asked about the AMA's action in disbanding its group fighting the plan, the President said he believes the battle is won.

5—A quotation from the Bible would cover Republican criticism of Stevenson for mixing what the President called good humor in the discussion of issues.

He referred reporters to Chapter Six of the Gospel According to St. Matthew, which he said advised: "Be not as the hypocrites, sad of countenance."

6—He will not make a prediction on the election outcome because he is not a pollster or a prophet.

Grand Juries Indict 18 Red Leaders

WASHINGTON (AP) — Eighteen second-string Communist party leaders, rounded up by the FBI last week, have been indicted on charges of conspiring to advocate the overthrow of the United States government by force.

Federal grand juries yesterday returned indictments against seven in Seattle, Wash., and five in St. Louis, Mo. The six others were indicted in Detroit last Monday.

The action, announced by the Justice Department, charge violations of the Smith Act. This law prohibits the advocacy or teaching of the violent overthrow of the federal government. It provides penalties up to \$10,000 fine, 10 years imprisonment, or both.

FBI ARRESTS

The 18 party functionaries were picked up Sept. 17 by the FBI in Midwest cities and on the West Coast. They are alleged to have inherited party leadership after the convictions two years ago of the highest Communist officials in this country.

Since it began moving against the party under the Smith Act in 1948, the government has obtained more than 80 indictments and has convicted more than a score of party leaders.

The Seattle indictment charged the seven defendants with 16 specific overt conspiracy actions. The St. Louis indictment charged the five there with 15 specific overt acts. The six indicted in Detroit were charged with 17 specific overt actions.

The 18 named in the indictments, the Justice Department said, include:

All but one of the 18 are being held in lieu of bail, set variously at from \$10,000 to \$40,000 each. Pennock is at liberty after posting a \$10,000 bail.

Convict Search Near Klamath

MEDFORD (AP) — The search for two escaped convicts from the Oregon prison continued on both sides of the Oregon-California boundary Thursday.

On the Oregon side state patrolmen were patrolling the rugged Applegate Valley under direction of Lt. Paul Morgan. On the California side six deputies from Siskiyou County were on the search.

The convicts are Gerald Macomber and Charles Crozier, who fled the prison last week, then brushed against California police Saturday night, but escaped in a hall of bullets.

All residents were warned not to leave keys in their cars. Cars that travel the Redwood Highway are being checked.

Deer Decision Due Today

SALEM (AP) — Gov. Douglas McKay said he would try to give deer hunters an idea by late Thursday as to whether they will be allowed to enter the forests when the hunting season opens next Wednesday.

The governor said state and federal foresters were holding all-day conferences Thursday to try to determine if the fire hazard will be reduced before the season opens.

"If it looks like there might be rain before next Wednesday, we might take a chance and tell the hunters they can go into the woods," the governor said.

The governor has authority to close the woods to entry, but he can't change the dates of a hunt. He can, however, bring enough pressure on the game commission to force it to change the dates.

The weather situation improved enough that the ban on logging was lifted at midnight Wednesday except for the Tillamook Burn area.

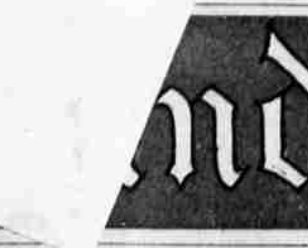

RR Officers Seek Clues In Sabotage

A sabotaged switch on the Southern Pacific's main line north of Chemult is being investigated today by railroad officers.

The switch lock was broken and the switch thrown sometime Tuesday night, apparently with the intent of derailing and wrecking a train. However, the throwing of the switch caused the block lights to flash red and the first train through—a freight—stopped before hitting the open switch.

Southern Pacific officials last night confirmed information obtained by the Herald and News that the switch had apparently been intentionally tampered with and that the sabotage could only have been with the idea of wrecking the first train along.

The switch, which was opened with a Paulina, out in the open spaces four miles north of Chemult.

A train hitting the open switch at normal speed for that part of the line would have been "thrown right into the sagerush," one railroad official commented.

RED SIGNALS

Martin Tasmady, Southern Pacific engineer, 12th Division, was pulling a freight into the Paulina area when he saw the red signals and approached the open switch very slowly.

State Police from Gilchrist were called to the scene to start an investigation, and reported to Southern Pacific officials here yesterday that they had found no clues leading toward a suspect in the switch tampering.

Southern Pacific officers were at Paulina today for further checking.

The open switch at Paulina was almost a parallel of a sabotaged switch at Malone, two miles south of Merrill, which derailed a freight May 8, 1951, and which has never been solved.

The opening of the Malone switch was termed by railroad investigators as a "professional" job, while the Paulina tampering was termed amateurish.

Target signals had been reversed at Malone after the switch lock had been broken and the switch opened. The signals indicated a clear line.

Parachutists Fight Fire

CAVE JUNCTION (AP) — Smoke jumping parachute crews were called out from the Illinois Valley ranger station near here Wednesday to fight a rash of lightning-set forest fires in Northern California.

So many men were sent to fight the California blazes, mostly in the Klamath National Forest, that an emergency call went out for replacements from another smoke-jumping station at Chelan, Wash. Crews were sent from there and now are on stand-by duty at the Illinois Valley station in case of fires in this area.

A mop-up crew Thursday morning was cleaning up a 150-acre fire in the lower Illinois Valley. It was trailed late Wednesday.

No other fires were reported in Oregon.

Court To Hear Commie Plea

SEATTLE (AP) — A Federal Court hearing was scheduled late Thursday on motions for lower bail for five of seven persons described by the Federal Bureau of Investigation as Washington's top Communists.

The seven, arrested by FBI agents in a four-state roundup last week, were indicted by a federal grand jury here Wednesday on charges the conspirators to overthrow the U. S. government by force.

U. S. District Judge John C. Bowen ordered a 2 p. m. hearing on the applications of Henry P. Huff, Harry Larsen, Barbara Hartle, William J. Pennock, and John D. Daschbach for bail reduction.

Pennock, president of the Washington Pension Union, and Daschbach, chairman of the State Civil Rights Congress, won a reduction of bail to \$10,000 last week. They are seeking further reduction.

Attorneys for Huff, state chairman of the Communist Party, Larsen, Western Washington vice president of the International Woodworkers of America, and Barbara Hartle, 44, Eugene, Ore., are asking the bond be reduced from \$25,000 on which all three now are held in King County Jail.
