There was a very gratifying attendance of parents and teachers at the YMCA in Klamath Falls, Thursday Sept. 18 for the PTA school of instruction under the auspices of the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers.

The 1st vice-president of the State Congress of Parents and Teachers, Mrs. Helmer Lindstrom, conducting the school of instruction, made the electrifying statement, "We must fight to save our schools." She pointed out that there are organized critical groups with fancy names, among which were "National Council for American Education" and "The Church League of America," who are working undercover to destroy our public schools. They use various methods to publicize their propaganda such as news items, radio, pamphlets and other ways. The basis of their attack is carried out against school taxes, textbooks used, and present day methods of teaching. Many people, not understanding our school program, believe these criticisms. Mrs. Lindstrom emphasized the need for parents and teachers to interpret the school program to all who criticize it adversely and stated that constructive criticism is always welcome but all adverse criticism must be traced to its origin and discouraged.

A question and answer session followed this introductory message. Mrs. Lindstrom answered many questions about the school reorganization bill that will be on the November ballot. She explained that if the bill is passed it is not mandatory that schools accept it. The schools only accept it if they vote later to do so. Throughout the State of Oregon there are many school districts that are financially unable to furnish adequate buildings, teachers, equipment, and materials for the school children, and through reorganization these problems will be solved.

Medford is to be host to the State Convention in April at which time Mrs. Lindstrom urged that there be a large group of Mother Singers from the Klamath County PTA associations.
