Merton Lang is the new terminal manager at Klamath Falls, Oregon for Consolidated Freightways, replacing Glen Jewett who transferred to Salt Lake City in the same capacity.

Lang came to Klamath Falls from Idaho Falls, where he managed Consolidated's terminal since 1950. He started with the company in 1948 as a senior clerk at Oakland.

Consolidated is the West's largest motor freight system, and second largest in the nation. Employing 3,500, the firm operates almost 2,000 units of rolling stock on routes extending from Seattle, Portland, San Francisco and Los Angeles to Minneapolis and Chicago.

While in Europe he saw much of Spain, France, Switzerland, Italy, and some of Germany including the notorious Dachau concentration camp where a nephew of his was interned and liberated by the men of Gen. George Patton just before his turn came to be taken into the gas chambers.

Eicheverry found living conditions in France, Germany and Switzerland good, with plenty to eat. Hotel accommodations were short because of the heavy tourist travel from all parts of the world.

Poverty exists, he said in Italy and Spain. He left Paris by plane at 2:30 p.m. Sept. 12 and was in Klamath Falls at 7 p.m. the following day. Layovers at Shannon, Ireland; Chicago, Omaha and San Francisco took up five hours of that time.
