

Acheson Says Ike Backed Korea-Shy Defense Lines

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Acheson said Friday that Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower as Army chief of staff prior to the Korean War, had supported an American defense line in the Far East which did not include Korea.

Eisenhower last Monday attacked an Acheson speech of January, 1950, as helping bring on the war five months later, Acheson replied today that Eisenhower "fortified the facts." He accused the Republican presidential candidate of misquoting him and misrepresenting his views.

At a news conference Acheson counter-attacked Eisenhower directly and by name and sought to drive home two points:

1. He said the Pacific defense line which he defined in his 1950 speech was "developed by our military authorities" and while it did not include Korea, Eisenhower's opinion as chief-of-staff (1945-1948) was "wholly in accordance with the statement I made."

The line was laid down as one America would man and "defend alone if necessary," and Acheson said he could not believe Eisenhower now means Korea should have been manned by American troops.

2. The defense of Korea, Acheson said, like that of other Asian countries was not a responsibility for the United States alone but for the whole United Nations. He said he warned in January, 1950, that should an attack occur on any of those areas beyond the American defense line the defense would rest upon the United Nations.

Acheson declared that Eisenhower in his speech at Cincinnati Monday "left out that warning" and was thus able to discuss the Korean situation as if the warning had not been given and "as if his own government rather than the aggressor bore the guilt for Korea's tragedy."

Eisenhower's Cincinnati talk was an attack on what he called Acheson's mistakes as an "incompetent" leaders and foreign policy.

2 Killed In Train Crash

OWOSSO, Mich. (AP) — Two crew members were killed and a third injured early Friday in the collision of two grand trunk Western mixed passenger-freight trains at a siding five miles west of here.

No passengers were injured in the accident.

State police identified the victims as:

Joseph Warren Beer, 56, of Detroit, engineer of a westbound Detroit to Muskegon train carrying one passenger.

Robert Morrison, 27, of Detroit, fireman on the westbound train.

J. R. Albertson, brakeman on the eastbound train, said his train had pulled on to the siding to await the passage of the westbound train.

"The westbound train," Albertson said, "approached the siding at an excessive speed. The engine started swaying and sideswiped the third car of my train."

Girl Killed In Home Fire

ESTACADA (AP) — Fire killed a napping 13-year-old girl in a South Estacada home Thursday night, but six younger children fled the flames safely.

Elizabeth Olins was trapped inside the house by flames that apparently started from a kitchen stove. Her sister, Juanita Olins, 10, explained she had started the stove, then left the house for a few minutes. Elizabeth was taking a nap inside. When Juanita returned, the place was in flames.

Five other children in the family escaped. The oldest boy, 8-year-old Robert, carried the youngest, a 10-month-old girl, to safety.

The parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Tovey, were away at the time. Elizabeth and Juanita were daughters of Mrs. Tovey by a previous marriage.

The house was destroyed.

Death Held Suicide

Death last night of Ernest L. (Red) Burkhardt, Jr., 22, was ruled a suicide by deputy coroner Clarence Ward, according to Sheriff Murray Britton.

Burkhardt's body was found by his wife in the utility room of their home at 1802 Laurel Street when she returned from a movie about 11 p.m. The young man had hung himself. His hands were loosely tied behind his back but in such manner, investigating officer said, that it was evident he had tied them himself.

Miners To Move Town

RUTH, Nev. (AP)—This little Eastern Nevada copper town is to be moved so miners can dig beneath it.

John C. Kinnear Jr., general manager for Kennecott Copper Corp., here, said half the town will be shifted to a new site not far away by next summer.

The other half will be moved the following year.

The town of "New Ruth" will be modern in every respect, he said, with wide streets, ample landscaping, a theater, hospital and other facilities.

Sixty-nine buildings are marked for immediate removal and several new buildings are to be constructed.

The company wants to go under the present townsite to dig a new shaft. This will subject most of Ruth to cave ins. The town has been on its present site for about 50 years.

He last was seen on a floating walkway near the company's mill at Bunker Hill.

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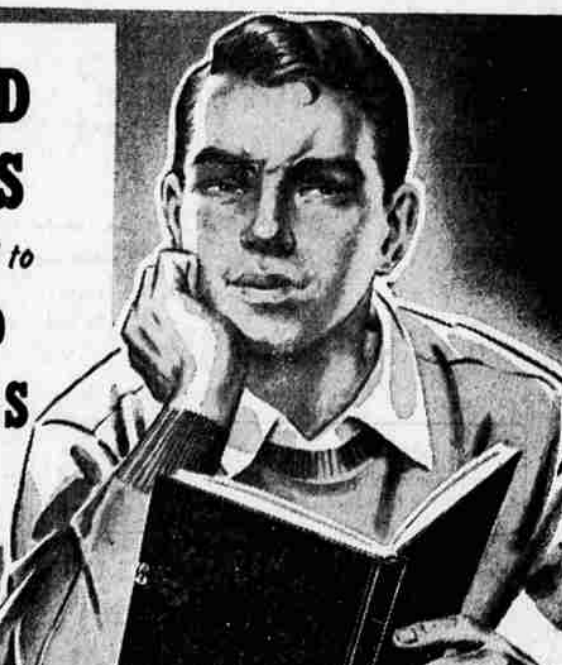


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Europe Council Wants Economic Union

STRASBOURG, France (AP) — The executive assembly of the council of Europe Thursday asked its member governments to create a vast new economic union.

The proposal was contained in an economic committee report adopted by the assembly. The vote was 14 to 0 with six abstentions. Assembly decisions are not binding on member states, however, and individual governments would have to implement the plan.

The plan also calls on member states to pool their resources for the development of European colonies, and dominions. All would share in the rewards from such development.

The report urged three immediate steps:

1. Setting up a European bank for the development of overseas

territories. The U.S. might be invited to head finance this project.

2. Long-term international contracts on basic products, covering both quantities and prices, to assure markets to colonial producers.

3. A system of preferential tariffs between Britain and the Commonwealth countries on the one hand, and other European nations and their dependent territories on the other.
