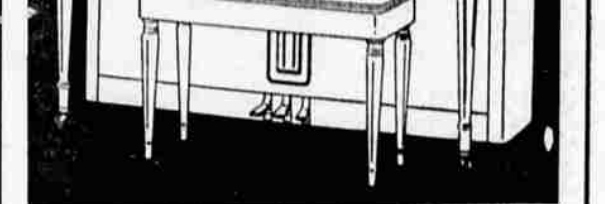
KLAMATH ART ASSOCIATION
