Judge Eyes Wager Suit

SALEM—Circuit Judge Rex Kimmell will announce his decision Sunday in the suit to put a "race tag" on the bill to prohibit pari-mutuel betting in Oregon.

Judge Kimmell heard arguments Friday in the suit. His decision is expected to be appealed to the State Supreme Court.

The suit was filed by Dr. Frank Meunier, chairman of the State Racing Commission, and Henry W. Collins, also of Portland and a former state racing commissioner who heads the drive against the bill.

The defendants are Secretary of State Earl T. Newby, State Treasurer Walter J. Pearson and State Finance Director Harry S. Dorman, all of whom were directed by the 1951 Legislature to attach estimates to revenue measures on the ballot.

They refused to put an estimate on the anti-betting bill after Attorney General George Neuner advised them that the 1951 law applied only to measures which would increase taxes.

Collins had "Menne argued that the anti-betting bill, sponsored by the Oregon Council of Churches, would cause the state to lose one million dollars a year, which is the state's share of bets made on the horse and dog races.

They contended the 1951 law provides for the price tags for measures which would deprive the state of revenue, as well as to increase revenue.

The same question was raised Thursday when opponents of the truckers' bill to abolish weight-mile taxes on trucks filed suit in Kimmell's court for a price tag. These opponents claim the truck bill would deprive the state of \$16,200,000 a year in revenue to build and maintain roads.

Kimmell will hear arguments in this suit next Thursday.

Klamath Men On Board Carrier

Two Klamath Falls brothers have aided the aircraft carrier USS Princeton's in setting U. S. Navy record, according to an Associated Press dispatch from Tokyo today.

A check of the Princeton's complement has revealed that the big carrier has the largest number of brothers serving aboard of any U. S. war vessel. There are 31 sets of brothers in the Princeton's crew. One of the sets is comprised of L. L. and L. C. Smith, seamen apprentices, 2215 Elma Street, Klamath Falls.

Car Shortage Testimony Heard

PORTLAND—Final testimony was taken here Friday in an Interstate Commerce Commission hearing on Oregon's freight car shortage.

Shippers testified during the three-day hearing that the Southern Pacific Company had failed to provide enough cars during 1950. The railroad contended the car shortage was nationwide and that it did the best it could.

Examiner O. L. Mohundro asked both sides to file written briefs. He will announce a decision later.

KC Candidates Give Address

CHLOQUIN—A discussion of measures on the Nov. 4 ballot was the highlight of a public meeting held on Thursday evening at the Chiloquin grade school cafeteria and sponsored by the Wood River Union Oregon council of Republican women. Several candidates attended who spoke about the coming election.

Bob Kent of the Grater Lake Dairy spoke on the milk production and marketing act bill, urging a "No" vote. He presented a film strip, recorded comments on the bill, and made a short talk. Considerable discussion arose concerning the bill.

Joseph Mercer, local school superintendent, spoke on the four measures which concern the state school system and reminded listeners that the school redistribution bill will probably not effect Klamath county schools greatly as this county has the unit system of consolidation of small districts. He quoted statistics about growth of Oregon schools, rise of cost of operation of the system, and where the money now comes from, state, county or local.

Mrs. Cyril Cook, Klamath Falls spoke about the two highway bills and Keith O'Hair, candidate for corner, added other comments concerning those measures.

Mrs. A. H. Dickson, candidates for county assessor, and Charles DeLap, who is running for reelection as county clerk, spoke briefly. Mrs. Cook told of riding the Nixon train, meeting both Nixon and his wife. Conn for Congress was the theme of a short talk made by Walter Zimmerman, justice of the peace.
