Owls Outlast Comets, 35-28

Oretech Finds Punch After Spotting Score

Oregon Tech found its punch before the home football patrons last night on Modoc Field—and the Owls needed all the wallop they could muster to snuff by the Contra Costa Junior College Comets 35-28 in a touchdown-trading donnybrook before some 2000 customers.

The two teams together traveled 770 yards on the field and in the air to give the fans thrills in every department as the Owls bounced back after a 19-0 loss to Santa Rosa last week to bring their current grid record to two wins and one loss.

With Elmo Bradley, a string-bean Negro quarterback, throwing strikes for the Comets and Halbrook Don Foreman running like clockwork for the Owls, defense went by the boards as dazzling offensive attacks took over in perfect football weather.

Bradley's magic throwing arm accounted for 11 of 19 completions and the majority of 222 air yards for the victory, as against 144 overhauled yards for the Owls.

SHADE VISITORS

Foreman traveled 117 of Oregon Tech's 210 yards on the ground as

the Owls shaded Contra Costa in that department by a 210 to 194 margin.

That gave the invaders 416 total net yards to 354 for the victorious mile-high kids.

In the opening moments of play, the Owls made like they'd continue their fumbling binge that cost them the Santa Rosa game.

The first time Oregon Tech touched the ball after Contra Costa denied the Owls' 45 before losing the ball, Jim McIntosh fumbled the ball on the 22 where Odie Canada returned Sam Brown's punt.

Contra Costa's Ivory Jones sprawled on the ball and on the first play Bradley fired to End John Sullivan for the first score. Just two minutes, 43 seconds had gone by.

TIE SCORE

But after that Santa Claus turn, the Owls started to roll and in a few minutes had tied the score.

Traveling 76 yards in seven plays—29 on a scamper by Foreman—Dancin' Don circled end, was trapped by a swarm of Comets tacklers on the 15 but started out of harm's way on an outstanding play. The play covered 31 yards. Len Genetlin, who kicked four for four plus one in the opening game 7-6 victory over Humboldt State, split the uprights on placement and the score was tied 7-7.

Ralph Perkins, making his debut at a defensive halfback spot, put the Owls ahead to stay just 3:50 from the end of the first quarter. Bradley threw in the first and Perkins raced in to intercept the ball on his 45. Not a defender came close to tackling the ex-Banks high school boy as he scooted unimpeded to the goal line. Genetlin came through again.

RECOVERIES FUMBLE

It was Perkins again who started Oretech's third touchdown march when he recovered a fumble on the 40. Sixty yards and seven plays later Foreman circled end from the nine-yard line. Gail and Dick Flannigan teamed up on a pass play for 18 and Foreman threw to Lelli for 23 to spark the tally to March, Lelli and Flannigan liked the play as well, they used it for the extra point and Oregon Tech led 21-7 with just 1:26 to go in the second chapter.

Contra Costa roared back to close the gap to 14-21 with Sam Brown, Doug Peters and Charley Green putting together a lateral-forward play that gained 43 yards. Bradley found Sullivan for another touchdown heave four plays later on a 17-yard jump pass. Brown's kick was good.

Canada, Portland prep from Washington High, lit the fuse under Oretech's fourth touchdown when he caught the kick on the 18 and whizzed back to Contra Costa's 44, after a penalty put the ball back on the Owls' 47. Lelli hit Flannigan with another pass that covered 36 yards and ended on the 15. Lelli kicked on the 15 and the Richland eleven's line for 13 yards in two plays. Foreman fell short from the two, and Lelli sneaked over for the score from his T-formation quarterback spot. Genetlin's kick sent the Owls into the dressing room at halftime with a 28-14 lead.

FAIL TO SCORE

It looked like it would be more when the Oretech defensive line ripped through to partially block Brown's punt and the Owls were 20 yards away from paydirt. Four plays netted just five yards.

The Comets spanned 89 yards and added up five first downs in a third-quarter touchdown march that ended when Peters swirled around end from the one-yard line. Bradley found Sullivan with a pass that put Contra Costa back in the game on the 50 at a 21-28 score.

Jack Brown saw just brief action early in the fourth quarter but it paid off.

Leaving the usual T-formation quarterback position behind center, Brown got the ball direct from center 10 yards back on a pass spread formation made famous by Southern Methodist. From near midfield, Brown wound up and connected with John Henslee who cut in fast on the 12-yard line. The Pilot Rocker and rammed the rest of the way and OTI led, 35-21, after Genetlin kicked good again.

WARN UP

Bradley warmed up his flinging arm again to gas the Comets in a 67-yard march that blossomed when Brown bounced off tackle from the five yard line, then kicked the extra point to put Contra Costa back in the ball on the 37 with six minutes left.

The Owls whittled away the time on ground plays but ran out of gas on CC's 42 and Genetlin punted the entire end zone.

Bradley threw scare into the partisan crowd when he hit Brown for five yards. Peters in the flats on a 36-yard play that put the Comets on OTI's 39 with some 25 seconds left. Foreman knocked down a pass on the 12. Harry Thompson did the same or, the three and Canada intercepted a pass and fell on the 27 when the game ended.

Yanks Cinch Title

World Series foes, for the first time in five years, will be well rested when the 1952 classic opens in Brooklyn next Wednesday.

The New York Yankees made that certain last night when they defeated the Philadelphia Athletics 5-2 in 11 innings to clinch their fourth straight American League pennant.

The Dodgers have been taking things easy since Tuesday when they nailed down the National League pennant.

Not since 1947 when the Yanks and Dodgers battled home have pennant races in both leagues been decided before the final ball.

Last year the Dodgers and New York Giants topped up the regular season tied for top honors and the miracle Giants went on to cop a best out of three playoff series to win the pennant.

In 1949 both the Yanks and Dodgers won their pennants on the final day of the season, in 1948 Cleveland captured the American League pennant by beating Boston in a one game "sudden death" playoff for the title.

The Yanks tied a rare record in bagging their fourth straight championship. Only other teams to win four consecutive championships were John McGraw's Giants of 1921-24 and Joe McCarthy's Yanks of 1936-1939.

Billy Martin was the man of the hour for the Yanks. The scrappy infielder singled with the bases loaded and two out in the 11th to break a 2-2 tie that enabled the Yanks to take the marbles. A third run scored on an error.

Trailing 0-18, Hensley drove 60 yards in the third quarter and Bob Enman scrambled around end from 15 yards out for the Hornets' first score.

Bob Hill gathered in a Rogue punt in the fourth quarter and whizzed down the field 45 yards for Hensley's second score.

BLOCKED PUNT

Francis Roberts was responsible for Hensley's last touchdown that gave the Klamath County team the last-ditch triumph. Roberts blocked a Rogue River punt and End Don Anderson fell on the ball over the pay-off stripe.

Enman and Adam Hoffman accounted for Hensley's extra points on runs.

Rogue River scored first in the opening frame, climaxing a 50-yard drive with a quarterback sneak by Don Lehmann.

DESPERATION

The Rogues scored on a desperation pass play in the second quarter when the thrower, driven far back, let loose with a pass that connected for a 60-yard gain and the second score.

Lehmann intercepted a pass just before the halftime gun for Rogue River's third score.

The Hornets were hepped-up in the second half and dominated play to make up the huge deficit.

OTHER GAMES

In the other National League games, the Giants trounced Philadelphia, 8-0, Cincinnati downed Pittsburgh, 5-0, and St. Louis swamped Chicago, 10-3.

Sal Maglie gained his 18th victory for the Giants, although he was relieved by Hoyt Wilhelm in the eighth. Home runs by Al Dark, Don Mueller and Whitey Lockman featured the Giant attack.

Gerry Staley breezed to his 17th victory as the Cards clinched third place. Stan Musial belted a homer and single and increased his batting lead to seven points over the Cubs' Frank Baumholtz. Baumholtz collected one hit in four trips.

SEATTLE (AP)—Light showers that could put the skids on Washington's vaunted aerial attack were forecast for Saturday's football battle between Minnesota's Gophers and the West Coast Huskies.

Minnesota, gunning for its first victory over Washington since 1940, probably would be favored by a damp field although it now is a touchdown underdog. With Halfback Paul Gier as chief threat, the Gophers will bank on their running attack to outscore the Huskies.

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Merrill Wallops Trojans

Merrill sprang loose John O'Neil and Jerry Wolfram last night under their lights as the Huskies ran roughshod over Sacred Heart by a 42-13 score.

O'Neil and Wolfram each scored three times as the Huskies, starting slowly, led 14-0 at the half, then opened up in earnest in the second half.

The Trojans picked up their two touchdowns in the second half. Phil Collins passing to Tom Mulvey for the first score in the third quarter and Wayne Neubert hitting Jack Heiderer with a touchdown pass in the fourth quarter on a play that covered 50 yards.

TOO LATE

But the Trojan rally came too late. Wolfram opened the scoring in the first quarter with a five-yard touchdown run after O'Neil had set up the score with a 40-yard sprint.

Leroy Johnson set up Merrill's second touchdown with a pass interception in the second quarter and O'Neil scored on five yards.

Wolfram scored on scampers of 20 yards and 40 yards respectively in the third and fourth quarters for Merrill's fourth and fifth touchdowns.

O'Neil scored the third after the half on a 40-yard ramble of his own.

O'Neil pitched the End Dale McCulloch for the Huskie fourth quarter touchdown that covered 40 yards.

It was the first league game for both teams and put Merrill at least 24 hours in a three-way tie with Malheur and Chiloquin, the two teams that mixed this afternoon at Chiloquin.

Linfield Wins, 16-0

CHENEY, Wash. (AP)—Linfield shut out Eastern Washington College, 16-0, in a king-of-X football game here Friday night.

The Northwest Conference winners drove 53 yards for their opening touchdown in the second quarter, with Conrad Sproul going over from the six. Ad Rutschman scooted 30 yards down the middle for Linfield's second tally in the third quarter. The visitors got their final two points on a third period safety when the Eastern center made a bad pass that sailed 19 yards into the end zone.

Whitman Nosed In Last Quarter

WALLA WALLA, Wash. (AP)—Central Washington, of the Evergreen Conference, came from behind in the final 45 seconds to nose out Whitman, of the Northwest Conference, 20-14, in a non-league football game Friday night.

The Wildcats scored their winning touchdown on a 41-yard pass from Quarterback Bill Hashman to Halfback Bob Spearman. Halfback Tom Bratton counted both Whitman TD's.
