Mustang Victory Costly

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YANKS 8-5 OVER BROOKS

Managers Mum On Pitchers

NEW YORK (AP)—The American League Champion New York Yankees today ruled a solid 8-5 favorite to overcome the National League Champion Brooklyn Dodgers in the 49th production of the modern World Series which gets under way Wednesday.

Neither manager—Casey Stengel of the Yankees or Chuck Dressen of the Dodgers—has officially named his opening day pitcher, but indications were that Allie Reynolds and Brooklyn's Joe Black would open festivities at 1 p.m. EST in Ebbets Field.

Although it marks the eighth time the Yankees have participated in a fall series in the past dozen years, and the fourth time for the Dodgers, the 1952 classic will hold special interest. The Yankees, for the second time in history, will be gunning for their fourth successive world championship. The Dodgers will be seeking their first triumph after five reversals in as many attempts.

RESTED

The National League entry for the first time since 1948 will go to the post reasonably well rested as compared to their rivals. The Dodgers clinched the flag last Tuesday while the Yankees had to wait until Friday, two days before the close of the campaign. For three years, the National League survivors were sorely pressed right down to the wire.

BLACK TO START

Manager Charlie Dressen named Joe Black, the brilliant relief ace, to pitch the opener for Brooklyn at Ebbets Field. He said Carl Erskine will pitch the second game and Preacher Roe the third. Casey Stengel named Allie Reynolds for the Yankees.

RECORDS

The records, of course, substantiate the Yankee backers eloquently enough. The vaunted Bronx Bombers move into their 19th series with 14 triumphs, 12 in the last 13. Three of their triumphs have come over the Dodgers, in 1941, '47 and '49.

Both clubs have good power, a tight defense and a strong bench. The Yankees, however, boast the stronger and better balanced pitching staff. Pitching scarcely can be regarded as the Dodgers' forte this year.

Al Matthews, San Jose State halfback gained 2,964 yards in two years of junior college football at Monterey, Calif.

Major Loops Show Drop

NEW YORK (AP)—Only four clubs, two in each league, showed an increase during 1952 as major league baseball attendance dropped nearly one and one-half million in comparison with 1951.

The increases in the American League were reported by the Philadelphia Athletics and the St. Louis Browns.

The Chicago Cubs, only club which doesn't play under the lights at home, and the lowly Cincinnati Reds were up over 1951 in the National League.

The turnstile count in both leagues was 14,646,836—8,295,114 in the American and 6,351,722 in the National. A year ago the 16 clubs drew 16,126,676 with 8,882,674 in the American and 7,244,002 in the National.

Although the New York Yankees had the biggest drop, they still were the top drawing card, a 312,847 decline left them with 1,637,260. Cleveland, Chicago, Boston and the last place Detroit Tigers also passed the million mark in the American League.

The champion Brooklyn Dodgers paced the National with 1,088,600, a decline of almost 200,000. The Cubs were the only other senior circuit club to draw more than a million.

Hurlers Rule Roost In 1952 Campaigns

The 1952 major league baseball season will be best remembered as a pitchers' year, something rare in this so called lively ball era.

A glance at the final batting averages shows only eight regulars in both leagues hit .300 or better. Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals won the National League title with a .336 mark, the lowest figure to top the league since Ernie Lombardi led the circuit in 1942 with a .330 average. Ferris Fain of Philadelphia won the American League crown with a .327 mark, the poorest since George Stinewell finished in front in 1945 with a .309 record.

Although there were only six 20-game winners, as contrasted to 13 in 1951, there were 98 shutouts pitched in the American League and 94 in the National.

SEASON ENDS

The regular season came to an end yesterday with the interest centering on individual batting and pitching honors although fourth, fifth and sixth place were decided in the American League.

Philadelphia's surprise Athletics nailed down fourth place by trouncing the American League's pennant-winning New York Yankees, 9-4. The Washington Senators nipped Boston, 3-2, to edge out the Red Sox for fifth place. In other American League games, the runner-up Cleveland Indians smothered Detroit, 8-2, and the St. Louis Browns drubbed Chicago's third-place White Sox, 12-1.

TUNE UP

The Brooklyn Dodgers tuned up for their World Series meeting with the Yankees by battling the Boston Braves to a 5-3 12-inning tie. In remaining games, Philadelphia battered the runner-up New York Yankees, 3-2, and Chicago turned back St. Louis, 3-0.

When the World Series ends the hot stove league will be kept active by debates regarding who should win the most valuable player, rookie of the year and manager of the year awards.

Pitchers Joe Black of Brooklyn, Hoyt Wilhelm of New York and third baseman Ed Matthews of Boston are the top candidates for the National's rookie of the year award. Catchers Clint Courtney of St. Louis and Sam White of Boston loom as the top prospects for the American League accolade.

IN RUNNING

Black and Wilhelm also are in the running for the National's most valuable player award. Roberto of the Philadelphia Phillies, Hank Sauer of Chicago and Stan Musial of St. Louis are among the top challengers. Bobby Shantz, the mighty mite of the Yankees, is also in the race.

Musial, Fain Repeat Bat Championships

NEW YORK (AP)—A 38-year-old major league batting mark was equalled when Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals and Ferris Fain of the Philadelphia Athletics repeated the hitting champions of the two circuits.

Not since 1914 when Brooklyn's Jake Daubert and Detroit's Ty Cobb won the titles for the second straight year have the two leagues had the same champions two successive years.

Musial, first baseman-outfielder, fought off a late-season rush by Chicago's Frankie Baumholtz to nail down his sixth National League crown, the last three straight, with a .336 mark. Baumholtz hit .325. Musial won in 1951 with .355.

Fain, Philadelphia's scrappy first sacker, wrestled with Cleveland's Dale Mitchell during the season, but always managed to stay one jump ahead to wind up on top of the American League with .327. He capped last year with .344. Mitchell finished this year with .323.

Hank Sauer of Chicago capped the National League runs batted in title with 121, but was foiled in his bid for the home run crown when Pittsburgh's Ralph Kiner hit No. 37 Saturday for a tie. It was the seventh straight time Kiner has either tied or won outright his league's homerun title, a major league record.

Cougars' Faint Rose Bowl Hopes Blasted

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP)—Washington State's last faint hope of a Jan. 1 date in the Rose Bowl was gone glimmering Monday.

The once vaunted Cougars dropped their second straight Pacific Coast Conference game Saturday in losing to Stanford by the margin of a blocked conversion, 14-13.

Dick Monteith, junior halfback, broke through the WSC forward wall to knock down Ed Barker's kick that would have tied the score in the third period.

Stanford, defending PCC champion, ran up a 14-0 halftime lead. Quarterback Bob Garrett flipped touchdown passes each time to

climax the marches—the first time for 15 yards and the second for nine. He kicked both extra points.

Then the Cougars showed a sharp reversal of form as they came back for the second half. Twice they capitalized on fumbles by Stanford's Bob Mathias to drive for touchdowns in the third period.

GETS FUMBLE

Halfback Al Charlton recovered Mathias' first fumble on the Stanford 31. Dwight Pool did most of the ball carrying in the go-ahead advance, skirting the final 11 yards to score. Barker split the uprights on the try for point.

Minutes later WSC's Wayne Berry pounced on another Mathias fumble 32 yards out, with Pool again going over after a series of plays. Monteith broke through on the attempted conversion, and the Cougars were sunk.

A WSC drive in the final period fizzled on the Stanford 14.

PASSES

The Indians drove 52 yards in nine plays to score midway in the first period, and then traveled 75 yards in 15 plays in the second quarter to hit pay dirt again. Quarterback Bob Garrett flipped touchdown passes each time to
