Illinois - Wisconsin Scramble May Decide Big Ten Champion

NEW YORK — The college football picture, which has been busy since the campaign got under way two weeks ago, should come into sharper focus when the smoke of battle clears Saturday.

Many of the early season results have been surprising—although not amazing—with many of the teams that the experts picked to cut a swath through their schedules instead barely staggering along.

Michigan State, for example, was accorded the No. 1 spot in the pre-season Associated Press poll to finish operations as the top-ranked team in the country. But the Spartans had to come from behind to whip Michigan, a favorite of the Big Ten these days.

BERKELEY, Calif. — Dick Savitt of Orange, N. J., used his booming all-court game to level sophomore Art Larsen of San Leandro, 10-8, 6-3, 6-4, to win the Pacific Coast Tennis title Sunday.

The rangy Easterner then teamed with Philadelphia's Vic Seixas, U. S. Davis Cup captain, to beat Larsen and Noel Brown of San Diego, 2-6, 6-4, 3-6, 6-2, 7-5, to win the men's doubles.

Favorite Shirley Fry of Akron, O., captured the women's singles crown in a tight match with Australian Champion Thelma Long. Miss Fry, ranked No. 3 nationally, fought from behind a 7-9, 6-2, 6-4 victory.

West Coast Teams Capture Four Of Six Intersectional Battles

SAN FRANCISCO — West Coast college football, flushed with a four out of six victory count over intersectional rivals last week, will have another whirl at cross-country opposition in principal games this week-end.

Southern California, which gave Big Ten prestige a setback by swamping Northwestern 31-0, entertains Army at Los Angeles, Saturday. The Trojans, on their home field, will be favorites to give the Cadets a fancy pasting. Army won from South Carolina, 28-7, last week.

TO PORTLAND

Michigan State outscored Michigan 27-13, Oregon State, which apparently does not stack up to one of the Coast Conference clubs this season, was idle last Saturday after beating Utah, 14-7, the week before.

Defending conference champion Stanford takes on invading Michigan Saturday after squeezing by Washington State 14-13 at Pullman last week. Stanford isn't favored with quite as much high class manpower as last year's team which took Michigan down the line 23-13 whereas the latter is seemingly on the upgrade. TO MINNEAPOLIS
California, 28-14 conqueror of Missouri, takes to the road for a clash with Minnesota at Minneapolis, 19-13, last week in Seattle. Washington and UCLA collide in an important league clash. Each has a non-conference win to its credit. UCLA got by Texas Christian 14-0 last week while Washington was coming through handsily against Minnesota.

Another conference test will pit Oregon against Idaho on the latter's Moscow field. Oregon took a dumping Saturday from Nebraska, 28-13. Idaho went to a 21-21 draw with Utah in its last out.

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Huskie Prove They Have More Than Arm

SEATTLE — Nobody suspected it before Saturday, but Washington's "one weapon" football team also has a fair amount of Stop and Go.

The weapon — Don Heinrich's passing arm — all but took the afternoon off as the Huskies hammered over three touchdowns and checked the vaunted Minnesota running attack to whip the Gophers, 19-13.

Minnesota tried T-Formations, single wing, double wing and spreads but never could catch up. Washington powered to two first-half touchdowns, calling on Bill Earley for most of the heavy work, and its Stop department threw back deep Minnesota thrusts.

FUMBLE
In the second quarter the Gophers drove to the Washington eight, but Paul Giel was hit so hard he fumbled and Milt Bohart recovered for Washington. Back came Minnesota again to the 11, but after three plays it was 40 yards from a first down.

A fractured nose put Washington Capt. Dick Sprague out of action temporarily in the second quarter. But he was back after the half wearing a nose guard and playing both offense and defense.

FIRST SCORE
Heinrich got the first touchdown, Earley the second and Jack Kylingstad, a free wheeling sophomore, the third as Washington led all the way. Minnesota marched 23 yards to a tally in the third period and 63 for a fourth-quarter touchdown.

WEISER, Idaho — The \$1,500 three-day Hells Canyon Open Golf Tournament here Oct. 3-5, has drawn entries from Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Utah and Montana, George Guy, pro at the host Rolling Hills Country Club, said Monday.
