Norblad Plans Tax Bill

SALEM 29 — Rep. Walter Norblad (R-Ore) said Monday he would introduce a bill in Congress to stop or limit the compromising of income tax payments. He is particularly critical of the settlement of the \$1,300,000 tax claim against Violinist Fritz Kreisler for a quarter of that amount. "The excuse that he only knows how to fiddle and doesn't know how to keep books is very unsatisfactory to me and, I am sure, equally unsatisfactory to the American taxpayer," Norblad said. He said these settlements "simply place a heavier tax burden on the rest of us and certainly don't make the task of paying our own income taxes any more pleasant."

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
