Give-Em-Hell Harry speaking at Havre, Montana, one of the first of his Western whistle stops. If he's foresight says Harry at Havre had been as good back in 1945 as his hindsight is now, it would have been better for his country. In the fall of 1945, Harry continued, General Eisenhower had advised about Russia's intentions.

General Eisenhower then, Harry goes on to say, informed a congressional committee that Russia's policy in late 1945 was guided by a desire to keep friendship with the United States and he added that he told the committee he saw no reason why Russia and the United States should not remain the closest possible friends.

Back in the fall of 1945, Harry told his Havre hearers, General Eisenhower was the commanding general of our victorious forces in Europe and was in close contact with the Russians.

Harry said: "His advice carried great weight and it therefore did a great deal of harm."

Let's forget, for the moment, the fact of 1945 and go back to the SPRING of 1945.

At that critical moment in history, when Hitler's power was crumbling and the end was near, Ike got a couple of armored divisions over the Elbe and they were heading hell-for-leather for Berlin. They were meeting Germans by the hundreds of thousands, all streaming westward and begging to surrender to the Americans.

Those two divisions could have taken Berlin.

But they were CALLED BACK BY POLITICAL ORDERS FROM WASHINGTON.

At about the same time, Hell-for-Leather General George Patton was heading hell-for-leather for Prague, the capital of Czechoslovakia. His idea was to save Czechoslovakia from the Russians. He was almost to the outskirts of Prague.

Then he too was CALLED BACK BY POLITICAL ORDERS FROM WASHINGTON.

Why? Well, it never has been told in clear and plain words, because it was a secret agreement made at Yalta, but by the process of putting two and two together we can get almost as positively as if it had been told in words that the Western boundary of Russia was established by the Yalta agreement at the ELBE RIVER.

So, when our Generals in the field (unaware of the secret agreement) crossed the Elbe and were heading for Berlin and Prague and a victory that would have left us in a SECURE POSITION in Europe, they were called back on POLITICAL ORDERS.

We know now, in the clear and sharp light of hindsight, that it would have been VASTLY better for America and the Western world to go on and establish our line where it SHOULD have been established.

That, Harry, is the hindsight that really counts.

Sure General Eisenhower was our commander in Europe. But suppose he had disregarded his orders and had gone on to Berlin and Prague. Suppose he had led our congressional committee that our political leadership was all wrong in its attitude (including the Yalta agreement) toward Russia?

What would have happened?

Well, General MACARTHUR told us in rather plain words that our political policy in Korea was all wrong.

We all know what happened to him. He was HUSTLED and brought home in disgrace.

The same thing would have happened to Eisenhower if he had rebelled against his political orders.

Give-Em-Hell Harry wound up with this tirade: "Ike is a great general . . . but he doesn't know the first principle about keeping this country running . . . He has got a lot to learn and I don't think we can use his judgment unhampered by secret political agreements."

Stevenson Backs Up Truman Foreign Policy

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP) — Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson, defending the administration's action in Korea, declared last night that when the Communists crossed the 38th Parallel that was the testing point for freedom throughout the world.

The Democratic presidential nominee asserted in a nation-wide television and radio broadcast that when the Reds were stopped in Korea the action "was received with enthusiastic shouts of approval by the overwhelming majority of the American people, and even by the Republican leadership."

But now, he added, the Republicans "attempt to make you believe that it was almost an act of treason."

"But what do you think they would be saying now if we had not stopped the enemy in Korea, if Asia was falling bit by bit to the enemy?" he asked. "Would they not now be saying that Harry Truman and Joseph Stalin were boyhood friends in Outer Mongolia?"

He said that "the Republican leadership is now telling us that 'the danger to this nation is from within, not from without. The danger lies not in Moscow, but in Washington. Your enemy is not Joseph Stalin, but Harry Truman, or even possibly Adlai Stevenson.'"

"This country," he declared, "must play the principal part in saving ourselves, our friends and our civilization from 'this monster tyranny' of communism."

Communists Infiltrate US Security

WASHINGTON (AP) — The head of America's super-secret intelligence service says he believes Communists have infiltrated every U. S. security organization, including his own Central Intelligence Agency.

At the same time Gen. Walter Bedell Smith implied yesterday this might be working both ways when he added:

"We have to assume that our enemies are as clever as we are and that they will succeed from time to time."

Smith said that to his knowledge no Communists ever have been actually found in CIA, that he does not know the identity of any there — and he said he would get rid of them if he did — but he added:

"In our meetings we keep telling each other that somewhere along the line we must be penetrated so we try to keep our mouths shut and watch our step . . ."

"I believe they are so adroit and adept they have infiltrated every security agency of the government."

COMMENTS

Gen. Smith's comments came while he was testifying at a deposition hearing in Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy's two million dollar libel-suit against Sen. William Benton.

There was swift reaction from the Republican National Committee. It announced a nationwide radio-television broadcast tonight centering around the Communists in government issue.

GOP National Chairman Arthur E. Summerfield said Mrs. Clare Boothe Luce, former Republican congresswoman from Connecticut, will speak over a network of 65 TV and 169 radio stations.

After the deposition hearing ended, Gen. Smith first asked that all his remarks be kept off the record. When told they already had been made public, he issued a statement which said in part:

"Any intelligence agency that did not act on the assumption that it had been penetrated somewhere along the line from charwomen to its executive level would be criminally negligent and we would not act on that assumption."

"This is, of course, no reflection on the loyalty of the overwhelming number of persons employed in our security agencies."

PRECAUTIONS

"That is why we take so many precautions to guard against penetration at every point . . ."

"One of the elementary precautions taken by intelligence agencies the world over, of course, is the elaborate compartmentalization of work so that individuals below the very top level are unable to obtain the whole picture even though they do work their way in and get a part of it."

Gen. Smith was summoned to the deposition hearing by Sen. Benton (D-Conn.) who wanted him to testify about a speech Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) made in the Senate last year attacking the record of Gen. George C. Marshall, wartime Army chief of staff and later secretary of state.

McCarthy said in that speech Marshall was "steeped in falsehood" and described him as a "mysterious, powerful figure" who sided with Russia in historic decisions which "lost the peace for America."

WASHINGTON (AP) — United Airlines asked a Civil Aeronautics Board examiner Tuesday to recommend lifting of restriction which prevents it from serving Klamath Falls and Medford, Ore., on the same flight.

Paul J. Hebard, route development manager for United, said one reason prompting the request is United's plan to serve Klamath Falls on its north-south coastal service with Convairs shortly after the first of the year. Because new planes are more than twice the size of the three Convairs now operating between San Francisco and Medford and West Coast between Medford and Seattle.

Examiner Barron Fredricks also heard statements by Sen. Cordon (R-Ore.) and Glenn L. Jackson of Medford. Neither expressed preference for any of the three applicants but urged some service between the communities be provided, Jackson represented the chambers of commerce of Klamath, Jackson and Josephine Counties.

West Coast and Southwest were to present their testimony Tuesday afternoon.

Will This Solve Community Chest Problem?

After several years of failing to reach its goal, there is a very heartening likelihood the Klamath County Community Chest will make the grade this year. Reason: something new has been added.

This new element is a plan for widespread use this year of the payroll deduction plan.

In a nutshell, this means that rather than approach a wage earner and ask him to fork over \$5, \$10 or more dollars at one crack, the worker will be asked to pledge to the Community Chest and pay off the pledge by having a few cents deducted from his pay weekly, semi-monthly or monthly.

Key to the success of this plan is heavy participation. There are approximately 85 firms in the county employing 15 or more persons. If more than 75 per cent of those employees agree to this payroll deduction plan, success of the Community Chest this year would be almost certain.

This assertion is based, however, on the assumption that loyal Chest supporters of past years will lend the same support this year.

A special meeting of all management and wage earner and labor union groups or representatives is scheduled for tonight at 7:30 in room 308, Klamath Union High School, to further explore this payroll deduction plan.

Quite a few problems confront the plan. First, management must agree to the extra bookkeeping in connection with payroll deductions. Thus far, in preliminary talks on the matter, several firms approached have reacted favorably. This same favorable reaction has come from some wage earner groups.

In some categories of wage earners, it might be advisable to handle deductions through the labor unions if that can be arranged. Many culinary workers, cooks and waitresses, for instance, frequently change jobs. Thus, trying to handle their payroll deductions would be a formidable task. But if they do work their way in and get a part of it.

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Mess Said 'Too Much' For Adlai

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower ripped into President Truman's regime Tuesday as a "scandal-a-day administration" that was too heavy a millstone for the Democratic presidential candidate, Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson.

Eisenhower, the GOP nominee, said Stevenson knew this and that the Illinois governor was attempting to shift the blame for the "Washington mess" to the people.

The general, making his third campaign tour to the South, was introduced on the state house steps by Democratic Gov. James F. Byrnes, of South Carolina. Byrnes placed loyalty to country above party loyalty.

Eisenhower predicted a Republican victory on Nov. 4.

He said that "when we have won this election for America—as
