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Indian Celebrity Visits Chiloquin

CHILOQUIN—And another he has made clear down to his waist and had only one arm. Thus my children aroused interest in the stranger, an Indian man in town.
"Lefty" Wilder, a Klamath River Indian, and his wife, a member of a Montana tribe, operate the Wild Eagle Indian museum and a gift shop a mile north of Depoe Bay on Highway 101. They were in town over the weekend to make arrangements to buy deer hides during hunting season.
Mrs. Wilder does buckskin and work with the tanned hides. Lefty does commercial sign painting and draws Indian life pictures. He also records Indian songs in all his travels, learns and teaches tribal dancer, and then takes a professional Indian group to fairs or public gatherings to present the dances.
As the Wilders travel around they frequently camp out in a colorful teepee they have made.
Wilder is a member of Kiwanis, of an Oregon art center group, and his annual trips to the Oregon State Fair or to the Pendleton Round-Up he likes to wear a feather. He says children flock around with awe and admiration and he knows he will have a crowd at his appearances even if the adults stay away.
The Wilders have three young sons aged 5, 6, and 7 just to keep things humming around home.

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
