**Springfield Plant Closes**  
 SPRINGFIELD (AP) - Another chapter in the unsuccessful history of the Springfield Alcohol Plant was closed Tuesday when the U.S. Government again took custody of it from the Oregon Wood Chemical Co.  
 The company for the past three years had attempted to manufacture wax and other products from wood wastes. It was operated by Charles B. Hudson Jr. and William S. Hudson, brothers from Americus, Ga.  
 The plant was originally designed to manufacture ethyl alcohol from wood to supplement short supplies during World War II. It has never proved economically feasible and has been in the hands of the Reconstruction Finance Corp. and other federal agencies much of the time.

**PHS Reports Polio Down**  
 WASHINGTON (AP) - The Public Health Service said Thursday there was a drop of 16 per cent in new cases of infantile paralysis reported last week and said this probably marked the turning point in the record outbreak.  
 There were 3,538 new cases listed for the week ended Sept. 27, compared with a corrected total of 4,191 for the week ended Sept. 20.  
 New Records were set for five straight weeks up to Sept. 20. They pushed the total cases for the "disease year"-which started in 1949, the previous record year.  
 Through last week the total for this "disease year" was 37,826, compared with 32,106 for the similar 1949 period and 19,207 for the same span last year.

## Guitar Starts New Career For Preston Foster

 HOLLYWOOD (AP) - Here I am carrying out an entirely new career in middle age. And all because my wife gave me a guitar for Christmas.  
 Preston Foster talking. The same guy who has been playing heroes and heavies in movies for two decades. He now confesses to being on the "shady side of my 40s" (okay, so he's 50), and he's doing a great business as a live performer.  
 "Four years ago, my wife gave me a guitar for Christmas," he explained. "I had fun learning to play it and would sing along to accompany myself. I always thought

my wife (actress Sheila Darcy) had a good voice when she sang in the car, so I got her to sing with me.  
 "We started collecting folk songs by listening to the records of Burl Ives, Susan Reed, Leadbelly and others. We sang them at parties and people seemed to like it. Then I made a picture for Bob Lippert called 'I Shot Jesse James' and was going to San Francisco for the premiere.  
 "I didn't want to do the usual spiel of 'I hope you enjoy the picture as much as we enjoyed making it.' So my wife and I sang some folk songs. An agent happened to catch our act and offered

to book us around the country. It all started as a lark, but has turned into a highly profitable enterprise for the Fosters. They have just returned from playing such dates as the Wisconsin State Fair and the Portland, Ore., Auto Show.  
 "We play anything, from concerts to night clubs," the actor remarked. "Sometimes the audience amaze us. We played a date in Atkinson, Neb., where the population is listed at 1,500. There were 3,500 in our audience."  
 Foster thanks his movie reputation for the amazing draw. "Even when you stop at a gas station out in the middle of nowhere, you'll find people know you from pictures," he remarked.  
 "And it's surprising what they remember. One fellow said he'd never forget a scene I did with Paul Muni in 'I Was a Fugitive From a Chain Gang.' I did 1 1/2 days' work in that picture, which was made in 1931!"  
 It's one of those quirks of Hollywood life that Foster began his career as a singer but never got a chance to sing in the movies.  
 "I guess I started studying singing from the time my voice changed," he said. "I sang in opera in Chicago. Then I went to New York to find a singing job. After almost starving, I got a job as an actor. My first role on the stage was as a deaf mute Chinese. I decided it was a lot easier being an actor."

## Networks End First Heat In New TV Building Race

 HOLLYWOOD (AP) - NBC and CBS wind up the first heat of a spectacular television building race this week end with buxom Marie Wilson out in front for CBS.  
 The two biggest networks are spending more than 100 million dollars to make Hollywood the television capital of the world, a title now held by New York.  
 CBS unveils a 12-million-dollar initial unit of its television city tomorrow with the fall return of

Marie Wilson in "My Friend Irma." On Saturday, CBS will microwave a special "All-Star Revue" with Red Skelton, Milton Berle, Jimmy Durante, Dinah Shore, Phil Harris, Harry Marx and George Jessel. Berle, an NBC standby from New York, is flying out for the opening show, which will be broadcast from a new 3 1/2 million dollar studio, the first in an eventual 50-million-dollar project.  
 The NBC studio was rushed to completion with the fast fit-up method construction. Walls, pillars and other big parts of the building were made horizontally and then lifted into position by giant cranes. Ground was broken only last July 7.

The NBC studio has two sound stages in its 9,000 square feet. It occupies an acre and a half of a 48-acre tract next to Warner Brothers movie studio in Burbank. The network claims it to be the world's largest audience studio.  
 The CBS unit, in Hollywood proper, will open Studio 31, the first of four mammoth studios, each measuring 12,000 square feet. A 13-story administration building is also to be built.  
 This first CBS unit covers 15 acres in what the network calls the world's first community designed exclusively for television.  
 It boasts the world's largest stage-lighting control installation, all electronic. The system can control 5 1/2 million watts and can create a brilliant sunset.

## August Sees Death Record

CHICAGO (AP) - The National Safety Council reported Tuesday that traffic accidents killed more persons in August than in any month since 1941.  
 The August toll of 3,776 was the third highest of record. It bulged the total for the first eight months of 1952 to 23,770, a 3 per cent gain over the corresponding 1951 figure.  
 Only in December, 1938, when 4,217 persons lost their lives in traffic accidents, and December, 1941, when 4,140 were killed, were higher monthly totals recorded. The Safety Council began assembling nationwide figures in 1934.  
 The council said that, in general, the increase was due mostly to accidents occurring on open highways. Most cities, a statement reported, had fewer deaths within their limits than in the eight-month 1951 period.  
 Of 441 reporting cities, 307 had no motor vehicle deaths in August. Among them was Klamath Falls, Ore.

BALTIMORE (AP) - George A. Meyers, Communist party chairman in Maryland and Washington, has filed as a write-in candidate for U. S. senator.  
 Meyers, who is free on bond pending an appeal verdict on his conviction for conspiracy to advocate or teach violent overthrow of the government, said his campaign manager would be Mrs. Dorothy Rose Blumberg, Baltimore Communist. She also is appealing a Smith Act conviction.

 J. W. Kipper, president of the Eugene Chamber of Commerce, presented a summary of the survey at the chamber's annual meeting here this week. The study was prepared by Industrial Survey Associates of California.  
 He said business is being turned away from Lane County because of the lack of reasonable sites.
