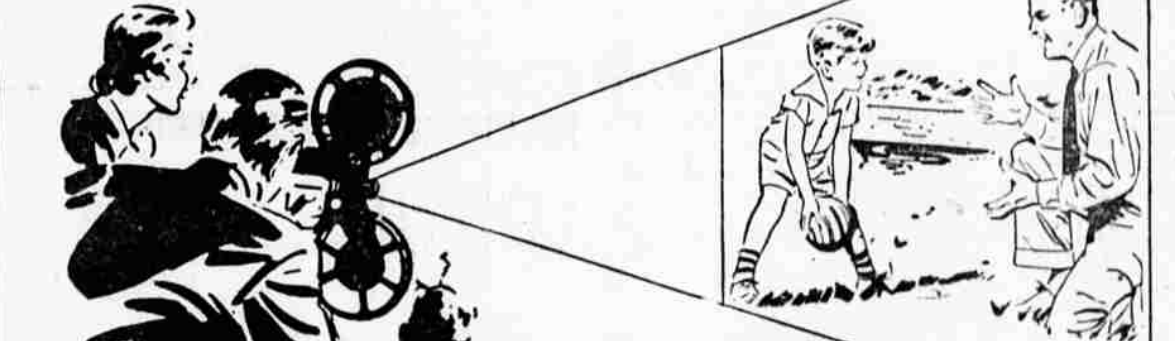
FUNERAL

Guilty Plea In Burglar Charge

Stanley Edward Mayfield, 22, of 1779 Arthur, pleaded guilty in Circuit Court this morning to a charge of burglary, not in a dwelling. He was picked up yesterday at his home in connection with several recent break-ins around town, and City Police said he admitted four. Specifically he is accused of breaking into the Roy Call Wrecking Company office, 1948 S. 6th, on the night of Sept. 22. About \$80 was taken in the burglary. The complaint to which Mayfield pleaded guilty was signed by Ray E. Womser, owner of the wrecking company. City Police said Mayfield also admitted participating in burglaries at the Tower Drive Inn three months ago, the Seeler Inc., office, Sept. 21, and O. K. Rubber Welding Company Sept. 29. City and state officers and Sheriff's deputies combined in the investigation which led to Mayfield's arrest. The young man waived grand jury indictment, and is held in the County Jail in lieu of \$2,000 bail. Also in Circuit Court this morning was Robert K. Hand, 21, who pleaded not guilty to a charge of forgery, and Robert B. Kral, 19, up for revocation of a probationary sentence on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor. Hand's trial was set for Oct. 27.
