## Movie Censor In India Even Bans Kissing Scene

 HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Producers in Hollywood who think they are throttled by censorship should listen to the Indians.  
 Visiting here is Merboob Kahn, one of the most successful producer-directors of India's film industry, which is the second largest in the world. He is the maker of "Aan," the first Indian film to get a major release outside of the Orient. It is currently enjoying its 11th week of success in London, and Kahn is currently talking a deal for a major company to release it in the U. S.  
 Kahn discussed movie-making in India, and I gathered that it is much different from Hollywood methods. With one exception—censorship.  
 "Ah, yes, we have censorship, too," he sighed. "But ours is even more strict. We cannot even show a man and woman kissing. Isn't that silly? Indians can see all the kissing they want in American pictures made in India."  
 "Nor can we depict gangsters, even though American gangster pictures play Indian theaters."  
 I asked him how much of the female form he could display. "Up to here," he demonstrated, pointing to the upper ankle. But he added that films could display the bare midriff, since that is the custom of women in parts of India.  
 "I think it is a mistake to try to keep sex out of movies," he observed. "Sex is what has made the American film industry so great, and the lack of it has hurt the English picture business. Ninety per cent of the foreign pictures shown in India are American. The rest of English, with a few Italian and French."  
 Kahn reported that the Indian film industry makes between 200 and 250 pictures a year. They are about the only films seen in rural India, but foreign pictures, particularly American, get a play in the big cities.  
 "What kind of Hollywood pictures do Indians like best?"  
 "Musicals and more musicals," he replied.

## Teacher Plan Backfires
