

Ken Young to Run Tonight

Brockton Wild When Rocky Comes Home

Pelicans Host To Axemen

Ken Young will run tonight. These are the glad tidings from the football front today as the Pelicans wait for tonight's 8 o'clock kickoff against the unbeaten Eugene Axemen on Modoc Field.

The doctor's stamp of approval went on Young's left hand yesterday on the eve of Klamath Falls' clash with its foes to the north.

Young sprained his hipper against Redding last week when the Pelis suffered their first defeat of the season (28-0) after whipping Grant and Roseburg.

But Quarterback Bill Salt, who was counted on to match Eugene's Jack Henkel in the pitching department, wasn't as lucky. The Battle Ground, Wash., transfer broke his business hand and his earliest return to the line-up will be against Grants Pass, a conference coumer, Oct. 31.

TO START

But Larry Yarnell, full - pen thrower behind Salt, did some fancy flinging in the second half of Klamath's 38-6 win over Roseburg and will get the starting assignment tonight.

If Young's hand bothers him too much, Jimmy Bevans is ready to run from the left halfback post.

Cal Gilmore will be at his familiar right halfback position with Jim Dougherty at fullback.

Otherwise, the Pelis are healthy with Jack Horton and George Hanson at ends, Doug Campbell and Vernon Pryor at tackles, Matt Del Fatti and Dick Lundsten at guards and George Maskell at center.

NUMBER 2

Eugene, rated No. 2 in the Associated Press poll, builds its attack on the throwing arm of Jack Henkel, who has pitched the Axemen to three straight wins this season — over Roseburg, Springfield and Cottage Grove.

On the ground, Fullback Bob Moran supplies the power. Halfbacks Jerry Wick and Arden Christanson the breakaway running.

End Don Smith has been Henkel's pet target this year.

Tackle Roland Medel and Center Winston Maxwell leads the Eugene line.

FAST BACKS

But Merrill, boasting a fast backfield and a machine-gun attack, has other ideas.

A win for Merrill could throw the league into a three-way race.

Chiloquin is still to be reckoned with. Although losing 6-0 to Malin, the Panthers showed in that game they're not through yet.

BROKEN ARM

Malin goes into tonight's game without Andy Travis, backfield ace. Travis broke his arm in the Chiloquin game. Ron Bunnell, a veteran tackle, may see action but he probably won't be at full strength.

Bunnell came out of the Chiloquin game with a slight concussion.

Either Sacred Heart or Henley can stay in the chase. These two teams meet tomorrow, 1:30 p.m., at Henley in the other league game on the weekend agenda.

BROCKTON, Mass. (AP) — It was a homecoming few conquering heroes in history could match—the return of new heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano to his friends and neighbors in this usually placid industrial city.

A crowd estimated by police to number 60,000 to 100,000 roared down the advance warnings of a fast-gathering thunderstorm Thursday as Rocky, foremost citizen in Brockton's history, modestly accepted its homage while his motor cavalcade inched over a three-mile parade route.

"I never saw anything like this here before," an awed police official gaped. "Brockton never before honored anybody, not even the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt or President Truman, as much as Rocky."

Speakers were six deep on both sides of the parade route and every window along it was jammed with heads when Marciano reached the business section.

It took more than an hour to cover the three miles to Keith Park, where Marciano was presented with the key of his native city, along with a huge paper crown, by Mayor Gerald Lucey.

"This is the highlight of my boxing career," Marciano told his audience. "I promise to defend my title honorably and often, and always in a manner that will reflect credit on you wonderful people and the city of my birth."

OSC Ticket Sales Slump

CORVALLIS (AP) — Despite the promise of good weather, advance ticket sales for Saturday's Michigan State-Oregon State football game in Portland were reported dropping off, and attendance estimates were revised downward Friday from 30,000 to 20,000.

The only explanation appeared to be that few OSC boosters gave the Beavers much chance against the nation's No. 1 team.

The Michigan State squad set up camp Thursday night at Salem after their arrival by plane.

Coach Kip Taylor, whose Beavers upset MSC in 1947, said his manpower was so thin he could not field two platoons of top flight regulars. To add to his worries, right half Jack Pinton remained a doubtful starter. He has been suffering from a sprained back.

Dressen Optimistic

NEW YORK (AP) — "If we play 500 ball we're in," Manager Charles Dressen of the Brooklyn Dodgers said Friday as the World Series shifted to Yankee Stadium for the third game.

"We won the first game and lost the second. All we've got to do now is take each odd game."

Reminded that his National League champions had not played 500 ball (the World Series excluded) since before they held a 10 1/2 game lead back on August 27, Dressen replied:

"That's right. But I expect some hitting from our boys."

Of their last 34 regular season games the Dodgers played only 45 ball, winning 15, losing 18 and tying one. From August 27 until they had clinched the pennant on Sept. 22 they won 14 of 29 for a .483 pace.

Congdon In Golf Lead

VANCOUVER, B. C. (AP) — A field of 125 amateurs and pros took out in pursuit Friday of Tacoma's Chuck Congdon, whose sub-par 69 gave him the first round lead Thursday in the British Columbia Open Golf Tournament.

Congdon, a member of the play-for-pay ranks, fired a 38-34 over the tricky Shaughnessy par 72 course despite shifting winds that sent many scores skyrocketing.

Right behind Congdon was the leader of the amateur ranks, Tom Ross of Vancouver, who posted a 70.

In the pro brigade, Dick Haskell, Seattle, and Harold West, Pendleton, Ore., were bracketed at 71.

The 36-hole finals Saturday will be limited to the top 36 pros and 18 amateurs.
