Mize Clouts Homer; NY Wins, 2-0

NEW YORK (AP) — A tremendous homer by 39-year-old Johnny Mize and equally tremendous pitching by 34-year-old Allie Reynolds paced the Yankees to a 2-0 victory over the Dodgers Saturday in the fourth game of the World Series. The Yanks thus evened the series at two games each.

Mize's homer into the right field stands in the fourth inning was the only score as long as Reynolds and Joe Black waged a pitching duel for seven innings. The game was a thriller from start to finish with great pitching on both sides and runners on base nearly every inning. The Yankees also were held to four hits, two of them by Mize, who was just a bench warmer until Friday when he came in as a pinch hitter and contributed a home run to a losing cause. After driving his homer deep into the right field stands in the fourth inning, the big cat of the Yankees hit another down the right field line in the sixth and saw it bounce into the stands for a double.

For Reynolds, it was the fifth World Series pitching victory of a long and distinguished career and it took some of the sting out of his loss to Black in the opening game of this series. Black, the reformed relief hurler, was almost as effective in stopping the Yankee hitters.

Mrs. Cornett Protests GOP Bypass

Decision of three U.S. senators to bypass Klamath Falls after scheduling a visit here this evening, stirred Mrs. Olive Cornett, national Republican committeewoman of Klamath Falls, to send the trio's leader a strongly worded telegram. Mrs. Cornett's wire to Sen. Bourke Hickenlooper, Iowa senator and major donor of the "truth squad", said the cancelling of the Klamath Falls visit had "everybody up in arms. No amount of beatnik will help the black eye now except announcement that Eisenhower will make rear platform appearance here." Mrs. Cornett said the Republican National Committee had ordered the three senators to pass up Klamath Falls. Eisenhower's special train is tentatively scheduled to go through here some time late Tuesday night. GOP leaders here, including Mrs. Cornett and Wyatt Padgett, chairman of the county Republican Central Committee, were hard at work today trying to get the Eisenhower special to stop here. The train is scheduled to stop here briefly for servicing but Eisenhower plans no appearance.

The "truth squad", comprised of Sen. Hickenlooper, Francis Case, South Dakota, and Homer Ferguson, Michigan, was to have arrived here late this afternoon for an early evening conference with GOP leaders and the press. Late yesterday, the senators announced a change in plans whereby they would fly directly from Seattle to San Francisco, bypassing Klamath Falls.

TRAILING TRUMAN is trailing Truman across the country in an attempt to discredit the President's claims made in his stump speeches. The "truth squad" planned visit here was undoubtedly occasioned by Truman's address here yesterday morning. Klamath Republican leaders had arranged a press conference here for the three senators and a later dinner rally at the Winema Hotel. Both events have, of course, been canceled.

Sen. Hickenlooper said the three "truth" senators hit the Pacific Northwest yesterday with vigorous denunciation of remarks Truman made in the Seattle area.

In answer to a Truman assertion that the Republicans were opposed to power development, the senators said it was a Democrat, Paul Douglas of Illinois, who wanted to cut the Hurney Horse Dam appropriations.

Sen. Ferguson said "Just a year ago, when the 'truth' was wooed like in the hope that he might rescind to run for president on the Democratic ticket, Mr. Truman couldn't say enough nice things about the general."

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Nation Pauses To Honor Newspaper Carrier Boys

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The Nation's great paused today to pay tribute to the kid next door—the boy who delivers your newspaper.

The youthful champions of free enterprise get special recognition today when the U. S. postoffice places on sale a three-cent stamp honoring their service to community and country.

In a special ceremony at Postmaster General Jesse M. Donaldson will present the first stamp to a newspaperboy. The Franklin Institute was chosen. Donaldson said, because Franklin was "probably the first newspaperboy."

The stamp will be sold exclusively in Philadelphia for a short time and then will be placed on sale throughout the nation. It depicts a newspaperboy carrying papers in an average American community. On the boy's bag is the legend "busy boys—better boys." The stamp, printed in three shades of purple, was adopted from a sketch made by the Philadelphia Evening Bulletin's editorial cartoonist, F. O. Alexander.

The paper carriers were honored by the Bulletin at a banquet last night attended by such prominent former newspaperboys as Secretary Harold Stassen, president of the University of Pennsylvania; former U. S. Sen. Francis J. Myers; and Horace A. Hildreth, president of Bucknell University and

former governor of Maine. Speaking at the banquet Snyder said, "Newspaperboys exemplify the vigor of American free enterprise." The secretary praised the boys' contribution to national defense and pointed out that the carriers sold nearly two million 10-cent war savings stamps during World War II and are currently distributing door-to-door pamphlets urging their customers to continue their purchase of defense bonds.

Similar ceremonies were held throughout the country in conjunction with National Newspaper Week.

At today's ceremony, Donaldson said: "Countless public figures, including presidents, justices of the Supreme Court, governors, members of Congress, statesmen, military leaders, entertainers, inventors and heads of great industries rose from the ranks of newspaperboys."

"Where else but in our beloved America could a lad, through his own efforts, climb from his newspaper route to the highest job in the land," he added.

More than 30 of the county's larger firms and employees are launching the plan and many more groups are expected to join the movement.

Deputy Sheriff Dick Finnell said that the two men were in room at the hotel where they had no right to be, and when Tomlin went to get them, they took after him with a straight razor.

Tomlin wasn't hurt, but he signed the complaint against Reule and Ennis.

Bail was set at \$25,000 each.

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Chest Kickoff Set Tuesday

An Earlybird Breakfast, Tuesday morning, is to be the kickoff for the Advance Gifts section of the Klamath County Community Chest. Kickoff for the rest of the chest, three other divisions, is slated for Oct. 14.

Tuesday's Advance Gifts event is scheduled for 8 a.m., at the Winema Hotel. H. O. Juckland, Advance Gifts chairman, has invited 50 men for the breakfast.

Harold Shearer is Juckland's chief aid.

This optimism is based on a new drive policy this year. This new drive is widespread use of the payroll deduction plan, whereby wage earners can contribute to the chest and have their donations taken out of their pay in small periodic deductions.

Lawrence King Phelps, resident of Klamath Falls for 35 years died Oct. 4 at the family home, 1957 Auburn. Death was attributed to a heart condition. He had been in failing health for the past three years.

Phelps was manager of the Pelican Bay (Car-Ad-Co) store for 24 years and more recently was employed as a custodian at OIT.

He was a native of Oakland, Calif., and was 60 years old at the time of death.

Phelps was Worshipful Master of Klamath Lodge No. 77 AFAM in 1941. Past Grand Lodge Deputy and Past Grand Senior Steward of the Grand Lodge of Oregon, Klamath Chapter No. 35, Royal Arch Masons, Past Worthy Patron of Alpha Chapter No. 62, Order of the Eastern Star. He has been an active member of the First Methodist Church here, serving for the past 20 years as Superintendent of the Sunday School.

Survivors include the widow Mrs. Alpha Phelps and two sons, Donald and Lester N. Phelps, San Leandro, Calif.; three sisters, Mrs. Arch Proctor, Yreka, Calif.; Mrs. Blanche Christensen, Alameda, Calif.; and Mrs. Grace Van Gorken, Campbell, Calif.
