Livestock

CHICAGO LIVESTOCK—Hog prices sank in the livestock market this week after showing some strength in the first couple of sessions. Barrows and gilts ended 40 to 50 cents under a week ago while sows were 25 to 50 cents down.

The Agriculture Department said, "the decline was attributed mainly to a 15 per cent increase in receipts over last week at 12 markets and curtailed buying by local large packers."

In the cattle section supplies were slightly larger than in the preceding week and up a good 25 per cent from a year ago. Slaughter steers and yearlings ended steady to 50 cents higher. Cows fell 50 cents to \$1.50, reaching the lowest level since January, 1950. Bulls rated weak to 50 cents lower. Prices of virtually all lambs, as well as yearling and slaughter sheep, advanced during the week. Slaughter lambs gained \$1.00.

SAFE DRIVING PAYS OFF—BUFFALO 15—Thirty-two years of driving without a mark on his license paid off when the pinch came for a motorist who passed a red light. In court the motorist told the judge he was on the way to the hospital where his mother was to undergo an emergency operation. The judge dismissed the charge.



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Parking Brings Assault Charge

Charlie Ziegler, operator of Ziegler's auto repair shop, 27 Main, pleaded not guilty in District Court yesterday afternoon to a charge of assault and battery.

The complainant was Orville Sosinski, 2684 Radcliffe, truck driver for Kraft Foods.

Deputy Sheriff Dick Fennell, who arrested Ziegler on a warrant, said that the two men had become embroiled in an argument after Sosinski had parked his truck in front of Ziegler's place of business while he was getting an order and delivering merchandise to a store across the street.

He said Ziegler moved the truck some distance down the street, and that when Sosinski remonstrated, he was punched in the face.

Ziegler posted \$25 bail and his trial is due Monday.
