

GAVILAN KEEPS CROWN

Graham Drubbed By Kid

HAVANA, Cuba (AP) — Cuba's Kid Gavilan outboxed and outsmarted New York's Billy Graham in their second battle for the welterweight boxing championship of the world.

Gavilan Sunday night took at least 11 of the 15 rounds, and left no doubt about the decision this time. There are still many who say Graham should have had the decision in their New York title bout Aug. 19, 1951.

Gavilan this time was the master of the situation nearly all the way. He forced Graham to fight a left fist into the openings. In the 15th round, Graham fought savagely. He realized he was far behind on point score, hoped for a lucky knockout punch. But he had neither the timing nor the power. And he was slow most of the fight. Graham's face was cut considerably by Gavilan's short jabs. The New Yorker's right eye was almost swollen shut. There was a cut under that eye, another under the left one, and on his nose.

Baylor, Heat Beats WSC

54-0 Rout of Portland State Gives Owls Lead in OCC Race

The Oregon Tech Owls sit atop the Oregon Collegiate Conference throne today after a last-quarter blitz Saturday night that buried Portland State, 54-0, but there's no rest ahead.

The Owls have two weeks to get ready for their next game—and they'll need all of that because Oct. 17 they'll be in far-off Ogden, Utah, to meet a tough king-of-X foe, the Weber College Wildcats.

Saturday night was a reversal of last year when the Owls lost three games, at least two of them due to a last-quarter foid.

But against the Vikings of Portland State, the mile-high kids chose the last frame to open the touchdown valve, five of the evening's eight with Len Genetin's trusty toe supplying four extra points. That's 34 of the 54 in the last 15 minutes after the Owls' rather indifferently scored twice in the first quarter, bogged down in the scoreless second frame and managed to pour score the goal once in the third period.

The Vikings were never really in the ball game. The nearest they got to scoring against the Owls was late in the third period when

they blocked one of Genetin's punts and took over on the Orectech 41. Joe Siri skipped 4 to the 37. But that's the chummiest Joe Holland's eleven ever got with Orectech's goal.

The Owls actually scored eleven touchdowns but sparking punt returns by Foreman for 60 yards and Odie Canada for 75 yards and a 10 yard sprint by Canada again late in the fourth were nullified by penalties against the Owls.

Foreman, End Dick Flamingam and Jim McIntosh scored two each. Quarterback Jack Brown one and Linebacker Chimp Prayso one on an interception. Genetin booted six conversion points.

The score by score account went like this:
First quarter—Foreman dashed around right end for 15 behind perfect interference just 3:50 into the ball game on the fourth play after Leroy Wilding recovered a State fumble on Portland's 27; the Owls traveled 56 yards in 11 plays late in the first period with Foreman and Flamingam covering the last 18 yards on a pass play.

Third quarter—It didn't take the Owls long to bulge their 15-0 halftime lead to 20-0 in the third quarter. Portland State Quarterback Jack Reverman fumbled on the

first play from scrimmage and Orectech had possession 22 yards away from touchdown territory. Genetin scooted to the 7 and Foreman went over standing up for the score.

Fourth quarter—This period was just seconds old when Prayso roared in to intercept one of Reverman's tosses on Portland's 12 and cross the goal line. Laverne Sievert blocked one of Don Koepke's punts and the Owls were eight yards away. McIntosh bulled over on the third play. Harry Thompson intercepted Reverman's jump pass deep in Portland territory and was downed on the 17. On an optional run-pass play, Foreman rifled to Flamingam. The big end, with no defenders near him, caught the ball on the goal line and stepped over. Brown skirted right end on a bootleg play and romped 47 yards to Tech's seventh touchdown to bring the count to 47-0 after Genetin missed his kick. Thompson set up the last play with a 46-yard gallop that ended on Portland's 24. McIntosh put his head down and crashed over from there, knocking down the Vikings like tenpins.

The victory put Oregon Tech all alone atop the OCC standings. Eastern Oregon and Oregon College have had no league games thus far.
