## Brooklyn Names Loes, Yanks Go With Raschi

 BROOKLYN (AP)—The official World Series program says on page 25 that if Duke Snider gets hit he can break this series wide open.

They can write that again. Yesterday, the Duke, along with Andy Pafko, hit a torrid pace in Brooklyn's 11-inning, 6-5 victory over the New York Yankees.

If the series isn't broken wide open, at least it's severely bent. Now the Dodgers will try to clinch the world title in six games as the series moves back to Ebbets Field today. Brooklyn has won three games, the Yankees two.

Manager Charlie Dressen has tapped Billy Loes to try to wrap it up. He's told the youngster to rear back and fire the ball instead of trying to out-think the Yank batter as he did in a disastrous relief stint in the second game.

**RASCHI TODAY**

Vic Raschi will go to the mound for the American League champion.

The job the Dodgers did yesterday on a couple of second-line members throwers, Ewell Blackwell and Johnny Sain, was a beauty. Snider won it with his three timely blasts—home run, double, single—and Furillo and Pafko saved it for Carl Erskine with two magnificent catches.

That was all Casey Stengel could talk about—Pafko and Furillo going up in the stands and promptly mingling with the crowd in right field to rob his team of two home runs.

## Oregons Face Big Cal Bears

 SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Pacific Coast Conference football teams out their championship scramble in a couple of league games this week-end.

California, the team they have to beat for the title, comes off its rousing 49-13 win over Minnesota, to take on somewhat lightly regarded Oregon at Portland.

The latter outscored Idaho 20-14 in a league contest last Saturday.

It will be the first conference game for California.

Stanford, which snatched at the breaks to defeat Michigan 14-7 last week, entertains Oregon State in a circumspect engagement Saturday at Palo Alto.

**NO TROUBLE**

The Indians outpointed Washington State in an earlier conference game and until last Saturday figured to handle Oregon State without too much trouble.

But Oregon State's line stand in losing only 17-14 to Michigan State, the Associated Press' pre-season poll choice to lead the nation, now puts a different outlook on the encounter with Stanford.

**DESPERATE**

Michigan State had to kick a desperation last second field goal to beat Oregon State, Stanford followers, nevertheless, think they will be backing the winner this week-end.

The rough-riding UCLA Bruins provide the interconference show at Los Angeles with Rice Institute as the opposition. The Bruins already have whipped one Southwest Conference foe, Texas Christian, 14-0 and hardly figure to have much difficulty with a Rice team that was soundly trounced by Louisiana State last week, 27-7.

**TOUGHEST**

Other Coast Conference teams which have yet to face UCLA now tab it as the toughest on their schedules following the Bruins' 27-7 smasher over Washington last Saturday.

The Southern California Trojans, main title contenders along with California and UCLA, blanked Army 22-0 last week and take on San Diego Naval Training Station Friday night in Los Angeles.

## Big Tenners Get Come-uppance From Pacific Coast Grid Teams

NEW YORK (AP)—Things may be different at Rose Bowl time but right now football fans in the Far West are very happy about the way Pacific Coast teams have been walloping the Big Ten this year.

Stanford's thrilling 14-7 victory over Michigan and California's 49-13 trouncing of Minnesota made it four straight for coast teams against the Big Ten. This sort of thing could mean the end of the Midwest's six-game winning streak at the Rose Bowl Jan. 1.

Bob Mathias balled over from the one-yard line for Stanford's winning touchdown.

Big man for California ranked fourth nationally in the Associated Press football poll, was halfback Don Johnson with four touchdowns, one of them an 84-yard dash.

**BUCKEYES NEXT**

Wisconsin was the Big Ten's leading contender for the Rose Bowl trip after Saturday's 20-6 victory over Illinois. They're saying the Badgers should sweep through the rest of their conference schedule if they get past Ohio State this week.

One Midwestern team, Michigan State, had a narrow squeak out west. The Spartans, led No. 1 in the nation, downed Oregon State 17-14 on a field goal by Eugene Lektenski in the last two seconds of play.

**GLUMY**

Texas teams had a gloomy time of it Saturday in interconference contests.

Notre Dame, looking like the powerhouse of a old-half surge that buried Texas, No. 5 nationally, 14-3.

Other Southwestern Conference scores: Georgia Tech 20, Southern Methodist 7, Kentucky 10, Texas A & M 7, Louisiana State 27, Rice 7, Baylor 31, Washington State 7. It was No. 17 in a row for Tech, the class of the Southeastern Conference, and it now appears that the Engineers' clash with Duke Nov. 1 will be for the championship of the Southland. Duke, Southern Conference kingpin, conquered Tennessee by holding the Volunteers heretofore mighty ground back to 25 yards while punching out a 7-0 victory.

**NON-LEAGUE TITLE**

The non-conference championship of the Southern Conference has been settled, by the way, by Maryland's thoroughgoing 29-0 shellacking of Clemson, Maryland, ranked third in the AP poll, was suspended from the conference, along with Clemson, for playing in bowl games last New Year's.

After Navy's 21-7 inopping of Cornell, however, the Terrapins may have trouble winning the championship of their own state. They meet the Middles Oct. 28.

Princeton, preparing for its key Ivy League clash with Penn next Saturday, rolled to a 61-19 victory over Rutgers their 24th in a row, while Penn had to struggle to down

## Heinrich Passes Backfire

 SEATTLE (AP)—The hard working Huskies of Washington were sadly studying an old football truism Monday that goes about like this: You can spend a whole afternoon piling up first downs but the team with the touchdowns winds up in the chips.

It happened Saturday as Washington ground out 19 first downs against a mere 8 for UCLA and still finished on the sour side of a 32-7 score.

Don Heinrich, even so, Pacific Coast Conference passing record with 21 completions—yet only on their 80-yard scoring push in the final quarter to the Huskies even closer to touchdown country.

**FIVE INTERCEPTIONS**

In spite of all those completions, Heinrich was not the deadly riddleman of the past. He wasn't leading his receivers with that old bullseye targeting and UCLA picked off five of his tosses, the most any team ever stole from Washington's human egg gun.

The UCLA Bruins gave Washington a rather thorough cutting.

In the first quarter they blasted holes in the Husky defense for 40 yards and a score in six straight plays. In the third they stole Washington's own thunder, Ted Stalwick for a 56-yard touchdown play.

**HALFTIME 13-0**

And in between the three-entire UCLA defense swiped three Heinrich passes to score or set up counters. Pete Dalley plucked one in the second period and ran it 25 yards to the Washington 2. Cappy Smith punched over for the second of his three tallies, and the halftime count was 13-0.

Mil Davis, who snagged two Heinrich passes for UCLA, got one in the third quarter and was knocked out of bounds on the 2 after a 15 yard run. Again Smith hit for the six. In the final period Tackles Jack Ellisa slugged a Washington pass into the air, caught it on the 22 and ran to the goal.

**GAMBLE**

Heinrich gambled six times with running on fourth down. Twice he got away with it in the second quarter, but all the other attempts backfired.

Stalwick, a UCLA import from Wallace, Idaho, was the Bruin ground gaining star and Sophomore Linebacker Terry DeWay spearheaded the tough UCLA defense.

## Alturas Defeats Jayvees

 Alturas' Modoc Union High Wolves handed the Klamath Junior Varsity its first defeat of the season to the tune of 27-13 on Modoc Field Saturday.

The Modoc Braves were ahead all the way.

Alturas started its scoring early in the game as Klamath was forced to punt after attempting three plays with little success. In nine plays the Braves placed the ball on the Klamath 3 yard line, then on the next play fullback Dick DeLassgues plowed through tough defense for the first of the Modoc touchdowns. The Braves passed for the conversation with quarterback Pete Stanford hitting left end Don Streiff in the end zone to put the Alturas boys ahead 7 to 0 at the end of the initial period of play.

Alturas' second tally, the second quarter, resulted from a JV fumble on the Klamath 8 yard stripe. Little Hach Yamagata plunged through the line to strike pay dirt. Quarterback Stanford kicked the extra point this time, putting the Alturas lead to 14 points at the halfway mark.

Dean Gordy kicked off to the Braves to open the second half of the contest and in just 13 plays the Braves had the ball on the Klamath 1-foot mark. Yank Yamagata, the right halfback swept around right end on a hand off from the quarterback, Stanford, who again passed to Streiff for the extra point.

Later in the third period the Alturas boys made their last tally of the game when the second string quarterback, Billy Golden, intercepted a JV pass on the KU 20 and streaked over for the score. The kick was blocked.

All the scoring in the fourth quarter was done by the Junior Varsity. Louie Taucher opened the Klamath scoring festivities by streaking through the line to score from the Alturas 10. Taucher topped off his tally by drop kicking the extra point.

Later Boyd Sprague scored on the longest run of the game when he ran 65 yards for a touchdown on a pitchout from Taucher on the Klamath 35 yard line. Taucher's kick was blocked.
