PORTLAND (AP)—Oregon Democrats will report their campaign expenditures three days before the November election, Howard Morgan, state chairman, reported Saturday.

He challenged Republicans to do the same but said the Democrats will publish their expenses Nov. 1, regardless.

"In 1948 the public was shocked to discover after the voting was finished, that while the Democratic State Central Committee was collecting and spending \$1,025, the Republican Central Committee had received and spent a huge slush fund amounting to more than \$210,000," Morgan said.

HOLLYWOOD (NEA)— Exclusively Yours: Eddie Cantor has made the big decision. Now that his life story is being filmed by Warner, Mr. Bantjo Eyes is writing him to his film career.

Couple Die In Hotel Blaze

NEW YORK (AP)—A socially prominent San Francisco banker and his woman companion died yesterday in a fire in the fashionable Hotel Warwick.

The two were identified as Lloyd Wiseman, 46, of Berkeley, Calif., a vice president of the Crocker First National Bank of San Francisco, and Mary Driscoll, 40, of West Newton, Mass.

Police said Wiseman checked into the hotel alone last Wednesday and registered for Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Wiseman.

Miss Driscoll arrived in New York Friday after telling her mother in Massachusetts she planned to meet some girl friends and look for a job here.

Wiseman, a grandfather, gave the fire alarm himself in a telephone call to the night clerk. Hotel employees then chopped through the door of their 30th-story room.

They found Wiseman and his companion nude and unconscious—the banker on the floor, she stretched across a window sill—police said. Their clothes may have been burned off.

Wiseman was dead when a doctor arrived. Miss Driscoll died 14 hours later.

Newsmen were barred from the room. A hotel employee said it was gutted and that several empty and one partly drained whiskey bottles were in the room.

The fire apparently started near the bed, possibly from a cigarette. It was confined to Wiseman's room.

Wiseman had come to New York after attending a bankers' convention in Atlantic City, N. J.

2nd Hunting Mishap Told

REDMOND, Ore. (AP)—J. M. Stalcup, 27, was seriously wounded in a hunting accident near Dugout Lake late Saturday.

State Police said Guy Lentz of Elk City told them he and his son, Harley, had been stalking a buck, and that he had seen the animal and fired.

Stalcup, apparently in the line of fire but unseen, was wounded in the right groin, the bullet passing through the left leg.

Lentz and his son applied tourniquets and gave first aid until other hunters arrived. They made a stretcher and carried Stalcup six miles to a road.

It was six hours before Stalcup got to a hospital. Loss of blood made his condition "very serious," attendants said.

Stalcup is the second Oregon hunter to be wounded since the season opened Saturday. Ralph Morton, Condon, was shot while hunting in Lost Valley, a few hours after the season began.

Epton Urges Morse Recall

PORTLAND (AP)—F. E. Epton, who headed the MacArthur-for-President campaign in Oregon last fall, said Saturday he will circulate petitions asking the U. S. Senate to remove Sen. Wayne Morse.

Epton, a Portland real estate broker, said earlier that he would circulate petitions asking the recall of the controversial Oregon senator. Later Epton found out senators are not subject to recall.

Epton's petitions will ask removal of Morse on grounds that signers are "disgusted" with him.

100th Birthday Evokes Comments

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Mrs. Annie Tobin celebrated her 100th birthday by singing "In a Little Spanish Town" and "Little Brown Jug" but said she'd rather fly to Halifax, where she lived in a light-house for 28 years.
