In Moscow, the communist party is holding a "congress" of its leaders from all over the globe. Russian Deputy Premier Bulganin tells these choice characters that if "warmongering American aggressors kindle the flame of a new world war it will be their last one."

In such an event, he says, might and unbeatable Russia will lead the boom, and that will be that.

Do you reckon he could be getting scared? He sounds faintly like the small boy who tells another small boy: "My pop can lick your pop."

I suppose you must have noticed that such small - boy exchanges SELDOM END IN A FIGHT. I hope it's that way in this case.

This one's from Germany: "Public opinion polls showed today that Chancellor Konrad Adenauer's popularity is RISING as he pushes his program for BINDING WEST GERMANY TO THE WEST."

Why is that important? Well, we NEED the Germans to help lick the Russians if the Moscow communists get cagey and start shooting.

This is from Tokyo: "Japan may soon be supplying the United States with ships, aircraft, tanks and machine guns. That is interesting, because WE NEEDED THE JAPS to help us handle both the RUSSIAN communists and the CHINESE communists in Asia."

That is to say, Russia, our former ally, is now the ENEMY against whom we are straining every nerve to ARM OURSELVES.

We're having a tough time convincing our Western European allies that they ought to prepare to DEFEND THEMSELVES if Russia starts shooting. They want US to do their fighting if there is another war.

Our former enemies, Germany and Japan, are now our chief reliance for the future.

It's a screwball world, isn't it?

One note of hope: South Korean infantrymen have fought their way to within 20 yards of strategic White Horse Hill. This is a gain of 50 yards in about four and a half hours - an indication of the terrific savagery of the fighting. The ROKs are battling hand to hand, using bayonets, rifles and rocks.

Little South Korea is beginning to face up to the job of FIGHTING FOR ITS OWN LIBERTY.

Now -

Here we go again - into politics.

Give-'em-Hell Harry is giving 'em hell today in Indiana. In Indianapolis this morning, he says: "The Republicans have been squealing like stuck pigs as a result of my campaigning."

He goes on: "Eisenhower has moaned and groaned about high prices . . . If the Republicans win in November, they plan to murder what's left of price controls . . . To say the Republicans are the party of low price is like saying the shark is man's best friend or that tigers make nice household pets."

He's a sassy little rascal when he gets started throwing language around, isn't he?

By the way, what has become of this man Stevenson, who used to be running for President on the Democratic ticket?

One seldom hears of him any more.

ALLIES HALT COMMIE DRIVE

Red Predicts War Would Finish U.S.

MOSCOW (U) - Soviet Deputy Premier Nikolai Bulganin told the big 19th All-Union Communist Party Congress Wednesday night that a third World War would finish the United States as a fighting power.

Bulganin and British Communist Chief Harry Pollitt joined the parade of speakers to the podium of the Congress - apparently the largest meeting of Communist leaders in history - after Maxim Z. Saburov, chairman of the State Planning Commission, outlined objectives of the current five year plan.

Emphasizing the strength of the Soviet Union, Bulganin predicted that if "American aggressors" kindle the flame of a new world war, it will be their last one. The deputy premier however, appealed for still further strengthening of the Soviet state.

SIGNIFICANCE
Pollitt stressed principally the significance of the Congress for workers of the world. The British Red leader is one of at least 112 delegates here from Communist parties of 45 foreign countries. Observers recall no previous Communist gathering that included so many leaders, or such a number from so many different countries.

Moscow newspapers disclosed Thursday that Deputy Premier Lavrenty P. Beria (head of the Soviet police organization), has called for vigilance against American spies, which he said were being sent incessantly into Russia.

In his speech to the Congress Tuesday - published in full only Thursday - Beria declared:

"The vigilance of the Soviet people is the keystone of the struggle against enemy infiltrators and there is no doubt that by heightening and sharpening their vigilance, the Soviet people will be able to render harmless agents of the imperialist warmongers, no matter how many they send to us and no matter how they disguise them."

TRUTH
Beria also confidently predicted the Soviets would triumph in any future war.

"If any enemy dares to come at us with war, then the Soviet people, standing at the head of the camp of peace and democracy, will be able crushingly to repulse any grouping of aggressive imperialist states and be able to defeat and tame the rampant aggressors and warmongers."

The Congress has been told repeatedly that the Soviet Union is a bulwark of peace and, with the Communist world rallied around it, can save off war. No speaker has made the suggestion that the world actually is on the brink of war.

The impression has been given that the chief task for the Soviets is to proceed with the new five year plan, which already has been in operation for 18 months. The 1,192 voting delegates also are taking up a proposed reorganization of the party administration.

WASHINGTON (U) - The record outbreak of infantile paralysis is apparently on the wane, Public Health Service figures indicated Thursday.

Eden Sees Red Power Weakening

SCARBOROUGH, Eng. (U) - Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden said Thursday Russia shows signs of wavering in face of growing western military might.

And he made what appeared to be another bid for Big Four talks with Moscow, as long as they can be "constructive."

Eden told a convention of the British Conservative party he thinks the "Soviets are beginning to doubt whether we can be divided and destroyed by direct methods."

Eden said: "Instead, the Soviets are counting on economic problems, on internal rivalries or differences between the western powers."

Eden explained he based his belief in Soviet wavering on "a certain shift of emphasis in Communist propaganda."

"They are now relying on their old theory that the capitalist world would tear itself to pieces if left to its own devices."

Eden addressed a cheering convention in debate on a resolution which attacked anti-Americanism on the part of the Socialist party.

Eden said the best course for the west was to build its defensive powers even greater and stand ready to open negotiations with the Reds if they seek them.

Eden said the explosion of Britain's new atomic weapon in the Monte Bello islands is "also a deterrent to war."

Eden's plea for a bigger western buildup was backed by Defense Minister Field Marshal Lord Alexander, who said Britain will not cut back her national service period from two years to one as urged by Laborite former Defense Minister Emmanuel Shinwell.

Petition Asks No Doe Season

Petitions bearing 800 signatures urging revocation of the scheduled doe deer season Oct. 18-19-20 have been forwarded to the State Game Commission by Elmer Balsiger, local member of the commission.

The petitions were circulated locally.

Balsiger said that "in the Commission's opinion, it is now too late to change the hunter's choice of doe kill provisions of the law for this year. But I do want to emphasize that I personally oppose the doe kill idea and always have."

The game commissioner indicated that the problem is especially grave because of the unusually large numbers of hunters in Eastern Oregon due to western area closures.

Around 80,000 hunters are estimated to have been in the open deer areas already.

If Western Oregon forests remain closed and the country on this side of the mountains has to absorb the entire influx of hunters through the three days of the scheduled hunter's choice season, the doe kill could be dangerously high, far in excess of the originally contemplated herd reduction, Balsiger indicated.

Airman Sees Jet Travel

WASHINGTON (U) - Emory S. Land, president of the Air Transport Association, predicted Thursday that within five years U. S. airlines will be using "some" jet transports on their trans-oceanic and overseas operations.

Land, a retired vice admiral, added that he believes it will be 1950 before jet airliners "exert a strong influence on the domestic rail-air travel market."

In an article in the Aircraft Industries Association publication "Planes," Land forecast that by 1960 the U. S. scheduled airlines would be carrying more than 35-million passengers a year - an 8 per cent increase over the 1951 total.

Firms Accept Payroll Plan

Five more of the larger Klamath County firms and employees have accepted the payroll deduction plan for welfare contributions.

These new joiners push the total number of firms now in various stages of setting up the plan to 33.

The new plan means that wage earners may take care of all welfare contributions by having a few cents deducted from their pay periodically.

The Community Chest Campaign Committee, headed by Elton Smith, is responsible for the widening interest in the plan here. A special Wage Earners' Club division is headed by Ernie Taylor, Palmerton Lumber Company treasurer and office manager, and Charlie Mack operator of the Klamath Flower Shop.

Taylor pioneered the plan here last year. Palmerton Lumber employees contribute 50 cents monthly to a special welfare fund and the firm's management contributes a proportionate share. The fund is administered by a committee of employees. The committee decides which fund requests to honor and how much to give.

Taylor and Mack say there are 85 firms in the county with 15 or more employees and they are anxious to see the plan introduced throughout the county.

The five firms which joined the growing list last night were Emil's Klamath Valley Hospital, LaPointe's, J. C. Penney Store, and Juckeland Truck Sales and Service. Great Northern Railway employees are interested in the plan but have a problem concerning the company's policy of not allowing payroll deductions for such things as a welfare fund.

ROK Troops Hold Vital Korea Post

SEOUL, Friday, Oct. 10 (U) - South Korean troops early today stormed through a hail of Red fire and drove Chinese forces from atop White Horse hill, focal point of battle in the big Communist drive north of Seoul.

A front line officer reported the weary South Koreans seized the summit at 12:30 a.m. with four quick stabs after inching "foot by foot" up the slope, scarred and pitted by violent artillery barrages.

Allied and Communist tanks duelled in the valleys surrounding the hill as the conflict roared on with unabated fury.

Associated Press Correspondent Mila Farnet at the front said the vital peak was being pounded by both sides with a tremendous artillery barrage.

An American officer at White Horse said the Koreans are engaged in a "terrific hand to hand battle" using bayonets, rifles and rocks. He said Red losses "must be staggering."

There was no estimate of the number of tanks dueling but the American officer said several exchanges between Russian - built T-36 and American tanks had taken place.

JET PILOTS
U. S. Sabre jet pilots reported they shot down two Communist MIG 15s and damaged three others in air battles in MIG alley over Northwest Korea.

The American officer said the Koreans were fighting a "bloody pace" against the Chinese who "have used up one division in the battle and are starting on their second."

He estimated the Reds had lost 3,000 killed and wounded in three days of fighting around White Horse. A Chinese division usually numbers about 10,000.

The U. S. Eighth Army said about 6,000 Chinese were clogging in on the crest and northern ridge of the peak dominates the Chobwon Valley and the ancient invasion route to Seoul.

Up to 15,000 Reds attacked across the Western and Central Fronts Monday night in the biggest Communist offensive since May, 1951.

Heavy fighting has continued in other sectors, but the main Red effort now is directed at White Horse.

The initial onslaught denied the Allies lines, but failed to breach any vital defensive position.

WARPLANES
Allied warplanes today plastered Chinese positions behind White Horse with searing jetted gasoline, fragmentation bombs and machine gun fire. Allied artillery hammered Red strongholds.

Ten U. S. B-29 Superforts and 132 carrier-based Navy planes teamed up yesterday in a mass daylight raid against Kowon in Northeast Korea. Pilots said their bombs were "right on the target" and caused countless explosions.

Kowon is vital Communist supply and communications center 25 miles north of Wonsan.

The battered force of South Koreans on White Horse is battling an estimated two Chinese regiments.

His car allegedly was involved in an accident early last Sunday morning on Klamath Avenue with a vehicle owned by William Riebold, who signed the hit-and-run complaint.

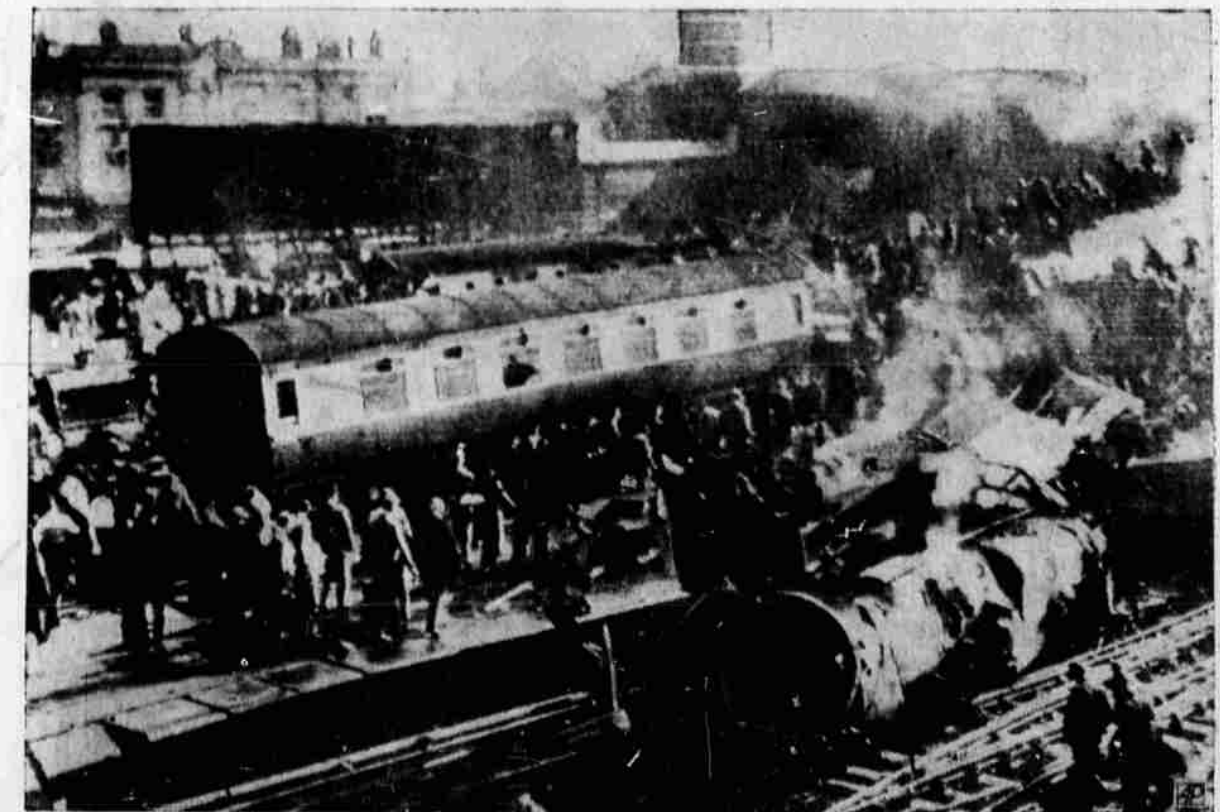
A witness to the mishap got the license number of the car which failed to stop and it was traced to Wald.

'93 Now Reported Dead After British Train Collision

HARROW, Eng. (U) - At least 13 bodies were dug Thursday from deep in the debris of a triple train crash, bringing the death toll of the second worst rail disaster in British history to at least 93.

All of the victims were found inside two splintered coaches at the bottom of a 50-foot mound of debris piled up by Wednesday's fantastic collision of two expresses and a suburban train in the Harrow rail station.

Meanwhile, one of the many injured died in a hospital.

Rescue workers, some of whom had been on duty since soon after the crash Wednesday morning, reached the center of the wreckage mound shortly before noon.

Doctors said the first basket of mangled remains taken from one coach were those of at least three and possibly five persons.

A locomotive from one of the three trains sheared straight through the coach, reducing most of its wooden structure to splinters.

A government investigation already was underway to discover the cause of the accident - Britain's worst train disaster in 37 years - in which two fast expresses piled into a jam-packed commuter train in front of the railroad station in this suburban town.

At least three Americans possibly were among the dead.

The three trains involved in the crash carried more than 1,000 persons - many of them school children.

Some 600 were jammed into the local commuter train when a Scotland-to-London express thundered at 70 miles an hour into its rear coaches as it stood in Harrow station.

Registration Near Record

A total of 21,965 persons are registered in Klamath County to vote in the Nov. 4 general election, County Clerk Charlie Delap announced today.

The figure is 1,109 higher than the registration prior to the May primary, but slightly over 200 short of the all-time high registration figure of 22,181 before the 1950 primary election.

The breakdown shows 11,969 Democrats, 9,750 Republicans, and 246 persons registered as independents or with minor parties.

The Republicans showed a numerical gain over the Democrats in registrations since the May primary. Of the 1,109 total increase, the Republicans got 595, the Democrats 445 and miscellaneous registrations totaled 69.

Klamath Falls' 32 precincts have 4,865 Democrats, 4,195 Republicans and 125 in the miscellaneous category. The 45 county precincts have 7,104 registered Democrats, 5,535 registered Republicans and 121 miscellaneous.

The city precincts picked up 96 Democrats and 124 Republicans more than were registered last May; the county precincts gained 349 Democrats and 471 Republicans.
