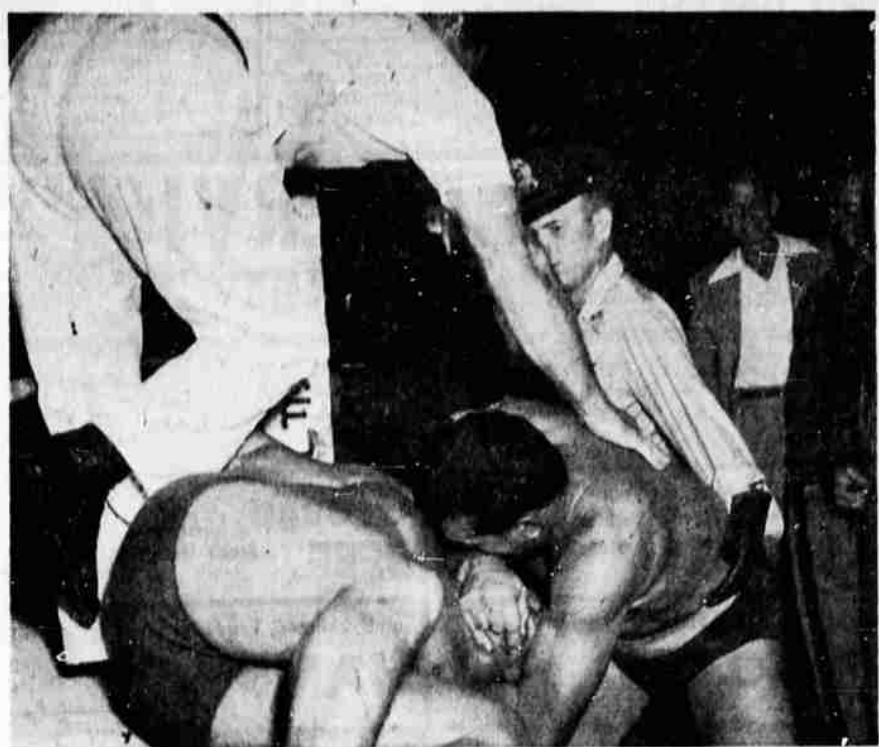

Cops, Fans in Act as Yamato Chops Down Tough Tony Ross

Wrestling opened at the Armory last night on high C—for Confusion. Cops and spectators got in the act at the end of the main event that saw Terrible Toi Yamato, the Japanese Sandman, whip Tough Tony Ross two out of three falls.

But Ross got in the last word when he handed the Jap a faceful of knuckles after Referee Buck Davidson had awarded the deciding fall to the sleeper expert.

Yamato didn't need his sleeper hold last night—although he tried it in the first go-round but Ross scrambled to the ropes.

Ross asked for his lumps when he shifted the scene of action from the ring to the laps of the ring-aiders.

Ross hauled Yamato outside the ropes—but he came out second best. In between swings at a cop who came up to intervene and a

fan who wanted in the act, Yamato methodically battered Ross' head on the ring apron. When Ross finally did stagger back in the ring, he was wearing a huge gash on his forehead that covered his face with blood.

Yamato was waiting for him with Sumatra chops—rabbit punches, if you will—and flopped the Salem Slaughterer with a body first fall.

FIRST FALL

A hack to Ross' Adam's Apple cut Ross down for the first fall. But Tony came back to show Toi how in the second round, climaxing the scene of action from the ring to the laps of the ring-aiders, he (Ross) boomeranged off the ropes. Then Ross dropped the Nip with another right for good measure after being awarded the fall that ended the count.

Art Capitan, a curly-haired

Greek, managed to win the first fall from Georges Dusette with the Boston Crab in the semi-windup but fell victim to Dusette's full Nelson after the second bell.

The big Greek checked out for the evening.

Jack Terry, an ex-Army judo instructor with a toothy left, made short work of Danny O'Rourke in the opener.

SLEEPER

Oddly enough, it was Terry—not Yamato—who showed the fans the sleeper hold. After unhooking O'Rourke, a pretty boy with muscles and blond hair, with hatchet-like sidehand blows, Terry applied the sleeper and it was all over in 14 minutes.

The kickoff wrestling card didn't last long but it carried plenty of action.

Dusette's win over Capitan took just 26 minutes, 45 seconds, while Yamato ended things in 20 minutes.

McKown Is Top Gainer

NEW YORK (AP)—Ray McKown of Texas Christian's Horned Frogs, seventh in total offense among the nation's major college football teams a week ago, has taken over the No. 1 spot, the NCAA Service Bureau disclosed today.

McKown has accounted for 607 yards, 547 by passing, in three games to supplant last week's leader, Dick Shinnott of Texas Western. Shinnott has 550 yards, 612 via the air lanes. Despite McKown's all-out offense, TCU has scored only two touchdowns in three games.

Don Heinrich of the University of Washington, champion passer of two years ago who missed action last fall due to injuries, has moved into the No. 1 passing role. Second a week ago, he replacing Boston U's Harry Agganis, who slipped to sixth.

Heinrich has completed 47 of 84 attempts for 539 yards and an average of 56 per cent in three games. Five have been intercepted, and three have gone for touchdowns. The leader is based on a complicated combination of all passing factors.

McKown, third last week in passing, is second now with a record of 53.3 per cent complete. He has had five intercepted.

The rushing leader is Villanova's Gene Filipiak, dismissed from West Point a year ago with others in the cribbing scandal.

Filipek, sixth in rushing a week ago as Bill Weisel of Syracuse led the pack, has ticked off 397 yards in three games. Weisel slipped to seventh with a total of 311 yards. Arizona's Bill Brasher moved from eighth to second, with 258 yards. Remaining third is Bill Sultz of San Jose State, with 249 yards.

Ace Linemen Mix Saturday

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Four candidates for "Lineman of the Week" honors, and possible later All-America recognition, will be on display here Saturday when Rice Institute plays UCLA in Memorial Coliseum.

The four, all linemen, are Terry DeRay and Hugu Donn Moomaw of UCLA, and Don Rhoden and Leo Ruckus of Rice.

The UCLA's alert, hard hitting DeRay, a comparative wisp of a little guy at 5-foot-10, 187 pounds and Moomaw, who towers 6-4 and weighs a good 220, may have an edge off the teams' records this season.

UCLA in turn has beaten Oregon, Texas Christian via a shut-out, and Washington, holding the trio to a mere 13 points.

In each game Coach Red Sanders' linemen have been standouts, particularly last week in mauling Washington's crack 1950 All-America quarterback, Don Heinrich.

Charles Chills Reynolds

CINCINNATI (AP)—Ezzard Charles, former world's heavyweight champion, wants a crack at the present title-holder, Rocky Marciano—but he wants to take on Rex Layne first.

Charles, 189, needed less than two rounds last night to hang a knockout on Bernie Reynolds, 187, of Fairfield, Conn., in a nationally televised bout which drew a slim crowd of 3,132 to the Cincinnati Garden.

When it was over, the 31-year-old Charles said, "I'd really like to fight Rex Layne. After that, I want to do what everyone else wants to do—fight Marciano."

The soft-spoken Cincinnati Negro heavyweight said that he felt he must lick Layne in order to get a shot at Marciano. Layne won a referee's decision—given by former heavyweight champ Jack Dempsey—in a bout with Charles in Utah a couple of months ago.

There never was much doubt about the outcome of last night's scrap. Hard lefts to the body hurt Reynolds in the opening round.

In the second, Charles hung a terrific left to the body and followed it up with a right to the chin that sent Reynolds tottling to the canvas at Reynolds' opening, 40 seconds of the round.

Spartans Protect Win Skein Against Texans

EAST LANSING, Mich. (AP)—A lot of people who don't know one end of a plow from the other will be contrasting on the antics of the undergraduates of a pair of agriculture colleges come Saturday.

The colleges—Michigan State and the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas, popularly known as Texas A&M—specialize in football as well as the education of experts in animal feeds and fertilizers.

The game will be televised nationally so a country of critics will be peering into their sets to see if the young collegians have been neglecting their football for higher education.

Michigan State was ranked the best in the nation in the Associated Press poll until this week. Then because the MSC Spartans had to win last week from Oregon State by a last second field goal they were demoted to second behind Wisconsin.

Texas A&M is a hungry team

that hasn't cracked the national ratings yet but will if the Texas Aggies take this one.

Michigan State has won 17 in a row. The last time MSC was beaten—way back in 1950—it was by Maryland, a team that used the T formation. Texas A&M uses the T and this worries Coach Biggie Munn, one of the best warriors in the coaching business.

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Hockey League Goes Into Action Tonight

NEW YORK (AP)—The National Hockey League swings into its 35th season tonight with the defending champion Detroit Red Wings playing host to the injury-riddled New York Rangers while the veteran-studded Montreal Canadiens are entertaining the rejuvenated Chicago Black Hawks.

Seeking their fifth straight league title, the Red Wings will take the ice without Sid Abel. The reliable center, who played for Detroit for 12 years, is now coach of the Black Hawks. Also missing from the Red Wings' lineup is rugged defenseman Leo Reisel, traded to the Rangers in a deal which sent Reggie Sinclair to Detroit.

SEASONED

Sinclair, a forward last season, will center the Wings' famed "production line" that has seasoned performers Gordie Howe and Ted Lindsay at the forwards.

The Rangers, hoping to better last season's fifth place finish, are plagued by the injury jinx. Goalie Chuck Rayner is sheathed with a leg injury and forward Don Raleigh is sidelined with a broken wrist, sustained in a pre-season exhibition game.

A trio of seasoned stalwarts, Elmer Lach, Bert Olinstead and Maurice (The Rocket) Richard, comprise the Canadiens' first line.

Sophomores Boom—Boom Geoffrion, Dick Gamble and Paul Meier were rookie sensations last season and will "around again to haunt the opposition."

REVISIONS

The Black Hawks, after finishing in the cellar for the past three seasons, have undergone several revisions that should bolster them for the coming campaign.

Abel, who is expected to be a playing coach, has been impressed with the way Chicago has looked in the pre-season exhibitions.

Toronto inaugurates its season at home Saturday night against Montreal, while Detroit visits Montreal. The Boston Bruins take the ice for their lid-lifter on Sunday night when they play host to Montreal.

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Casey Talks Salary

Stengel May Get \$100,000

NEW YORK (AP)—All thoughts of retirement cast aside, Casey Stengel, who managed the New York Yankees to the fourth straight world championship, is ready to sign a new contract, reportedly for \$100,000 per year.

This would make him far and away the highest paid manager in baseball, almost twice the salary reportedly paid Leo Durocher of the New York Giants.

ONLY STAN

Among active ballplayers, only Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals is supposed to be in that class.

The only other manager to win four consecutive World Series championships was Joe McCarthy also of the Yankees.

Hugh Bradley, writing in the

New York Journal-American, said Stengel "is sure to return as manager for a two year period at \$100,000 per season if he feels his income tax statement can stand this extra burden."

CONFERENCE

Stengel is due to confer with

George Weiss, general manager of the Yankees, before he leaves New York with his wife Edna for a South American vacation.

Stengel's present salary has never been revealed but it is probably over \$75,000.

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
