Two Injured In Accidents

Two men were injured in auto accidents last night, one on S. 8th and the other out on Oregon 70, a mile east of Dairy. Nelson S. Robertson, 50, deaf mute living at 1522 Martin, was hit by a car as he was crossing S. 8th in front of the Lee Hendricks drug store, and suffered a leg injury. The car was driven by Ervin Searles, 5440 Independence. City Police said Robertson was some distance outside the pedestrian crosswalk. Robertson was taken to Klamath Valley Hospital by Kaler's ambulance. Also hospitalized was Lester Jones of Klamath Falls, driver of a pickup truck which was involved in a head-on collision with a loaded spud truck a mile east of Dairy. He is not believed seriously injured, and was brought to the hospital by ambulance. State Police said Jones' pickup collided with a heavy truck operated by Saves Loya, a Mexican, near the John Toftel ranch. The truck went into the ditch and spuds littered the highway. Loya was cited for having no operator's license. The truck was registered to Ben Gutierrez, spud contractor working at Dairy, and was hauling for Jake Warner. A man hurt in a motorcycle accident north of Sand Creek Monday afternoon was reported conscious and improving at the hospital today. He is Melvin Lyle Allyn, 33, of Ionia, Ore. He was injured when his motorcycle struck a band of sheep crossing US 97 and skidded.
