Banks Reveal Finance Figure

Statement of condition figures were released today for the three branches of the First National Bank of Portland in this area in keeping with the bank's policy of reporting figures quarterly.

Vice president and manager R.H. Tisdale of the Klamath Falls branch of First National reported that, on Sept. 30, 1952, deposits at the branch were \$16,632,109 and loans were \$12,229,056. A year ago, Sept. 30, 1951, deposits at the branch totaled \$14,768,680 and loans totaled \$11,898,789.

Myron Shannon, manager of the bank's South Sixth street branch, announced that on Sept. 30, 1952 deposits were \$1,848,246 and loans \$1,349,590. At the same time he reported that on Sept. 30, 1951, deposits stood at \$1,504,154 and loans \$1,181,972.

At First National's Merrill branch manager Riley DeLap stated that deposits there totaled \$3,238,749 and loans \$1,853,147 on Sept. 30, 1952. Last year, on Sept. 30, deposits were \$2,207,599 and loans \$1,809,929.

On Sept. 30, 1952 deposits at First National bank of Portland, with its 48 statewide banking offices, were \$575,475,827, loans totaled \$303,315,135, and resources amounted to \$630,109,215.

All three figures represent substantial increases over the quarterly report of Sept. 30, 1952. First National Bank president F. N. Belgrano Jr., said. The figures represent an increase over Sept. 30, 1952 of \$4,801,115 in deposits, \$29,982,658 in loans and \$3,585,990 in resources.

High marks in deposits, loans and resources were also set by the First National Bank group consisting of First National Bank of Portland and its 48 statewide banking offices and 15 affiliated banks with 18 offices. On Sept. 30, 1952, deposits were \$712,517,516, loans were \$359,766,736 and resources were \$778,202,562.

Over Sept. 30, 1951, First National Bank group deposits increased \$62,445,335, loans were up \$41,083,872 and resources moved up \$73,925,289.

Commenting on these figures, the bank's president said the increase in bank savings deposits was especially significant. This strong up trend in bank savings deposits, he added, points to the reviving and healthy attitude toward saving and demonstrates the fine characteristic of thrift by the people of Oregon.
