**Tension High In Cheju Prison Camp**

 CHEJU ISLAND, Korea (AP)—Fortifying barbed wire enclosures near the beach of this rocky 40-mile island confine 5,800 Chinese Communists, ready to die at a word from their leaders.  
 The air of tension and cold hatred is apparent the minute you walk through the high double gates to the prisoner of war camp. The steely attitude of the United Nations camp guards is set by the repeated warning of the camp commander: "You must remember these people are fanatics."  
 There are 10 compounds, isolated by double barbed wire fences, in the big camp. Officers who patrol the camp daily say at least three other compounds are tougher than Number 7, where 56 Chinese were killed in a bloody fight with U. N. guards Oct. 1.  
 Camp authorities feel another bloody demonstration is almost a certainty—if the Chinese decide it would give them a favorable propaganda weapon. All it would take is a word from the Red leaders.  
 "The guards don't temporize with the prisoners in any way," says the camp commander, Col. Richard Boerem of Ontario, Calif. "They have been told when they are assaulted—shoot."  
 The prisoners have been told repeatedly that discipline will be maintained with force of arms. Camp officers want no repetition of the situation on Koje Island last summer where the Reds temporarily gained the upper hand.  
 The Chinese Reds are well clothed, well fed and housed in the same type tents U. S. soldiers use. Concrete and stone winter buildings are being built by the

prisoners. The high raised walls were used as barricades in the Oct. 1 fighting.  
 A search following the demonstration uncovered several hundred crude weapons.  
 Guards had conducted another shakedown of the entire camp just a few days earlier and cleaned it out. But the weapons used by the Chinese can be made quickly. A tent pole is easily sharpened into a spear. A piece of barbed wire wrenched from a fence quickly becomes a flail.  
 The Reds have only to dig into the soil for their primary weapon—rocks. Tin cans sent into the compounds now are scrupulously counted. They were being converted into crude knives.  
 Camp authorities believe orders are given from the inside. The camp is isolated from outside contacts but it would be a simple matter to flash messages at night from the hills.

When the Oct. 1 riot was brewing, Red banners went up simultaneously all over the camp. After it was over, the Reds burned their flags to keep them from being captured.

**Lewis Considers Strike If WSB Rejects Pay Hike**

CINCINNATI (AP)—John L. Lewis was reliably reported today to be considering a nation-wide coal strike unless the government Wage Stabilization Board approves the union's recently negotiated pay boost by next Wednesday.  
 Lewis sent his chief legal lieutenant, Welly Hopkins, flying from the United Mine Workers Union convention here to confer today with the wage board in Washington.  
 The problem, it was understood, may complicate the current political situation.  
 Lewis, who seemed to be on the verge of endorsing Democratic presidential nominee Adlai Stevenson after apparently favoring Republican nominees in the past three national elections, was holding up any flat endorsement until he sees how the Democratic administration handles his wage case.  
 The miners union president has just negotiated one of his fattest labor contracts in history—a pay boost of \$1.90 a day, boosting the basic daily wage for miners to \$18.25, plus a 10-cent increase in the tonnage royalty paid by coal mine owners to the union's welfare fund. The increase brings the royalty to 40 cents a ton, or better than 150 million dollars a year. Coal operators have taken the

position they can't pay the new contract terms until the WSB approves. It has generally been felt among people close to the situation that the board probably will give its approval, but perhaps later than the Oct. 15 pay day when first checks bearing the new pay rates become due.  
 Hopkins, senior counsel for the union, was reported to be due to tell the WSB, in a private conference in Washington today, that approval by Oct. 15, next Wednesday, must come or a coal strike will follow.  
 Although Lewis has seemingly leaned heavily toward Stevenson,
