# 20 Injured In Bus Crash

**LOS ANGELES** (AP)—A big Pacific Electric bus and a busane tank truck collided Saturday and the bus plunged 40 feet into an excavation, injuring an estimated 20 passengers, one critically.

Police said an even worse disaster was averted when the truck, teetering on the brink of the excavation, failed to tumble in stop the bus.

Georgia Street Receiving Hospital reported 13 persons had been admitted with injuries, but said none of them were critically hurt.

Another five passengers, who suffered only minor injuries, remained at the scene.

The bus driver, Leland H. Wilson, was hurried through the windshield and taken to Santa Fe Hospital in critical condition.

The collision, at the downtown intersection of Alameda and Aliso, was adjacent to a deep excavation for a underground link connecting the Hollywood and Santa Ana freeways.

The driver of the truck, Charles Holmes, 46, who was not injured, told police he "didn't see anything" until the crash.

The bus, headed for nearby Monrovia, was only a few minutes away from its downtown terminal.

# Television Humor No Laughing Matter

**HOLLYWOOD** (AP)—Today let's talk about humor on television, which is apparently no laughing matter.

This week I had a chat with Milton Berle, the longtime (four major comic to find gold in TV years Mr. Television and first. He had some sage comments about the serious difficulties of being funny. But I think his most apt remark was: "You can't be boff every minute."

I am a lover of the titter, snicker, giggle, yock, guffaw, belly-laugh and boffo. What amazes me is the fact that I can sit through an hour-long TV comedy show and not crack a smile. Even shows making their fall debuts, there is little on TV that is really funny.

I think Brother Berle hit on the trouble. "You can't be boff every minute." Nor perhaps every week. And maybe not every month.

In the 19th century, humorists like Mark Twain could write a few words and live off them for the rest of their lives. Then the focus of humor shifted to the vaudeville stage. Comics could operate the same act for 10 or 20 years without wearing out their welcomes on the various circuits.

But the age of mechanized entertainment spelled trouble for humor.

Radio provided an almost insatiable appetite for comedy. Stars hired large numbers of writers. The end result was an impersonal, machine-age type of comedy that provided little laughter.

Now that the novelty is wearing off TV; it is experiencing the same death of real comedy. Comics are spreading themselves too thin.

Red Skelton is doing a weekly TV show, another on radio and shooting a movie for theaters at the same time. Bob Hope will be doing a daily radio show, a weekly one, plus occasional TV shows and movies. Milton Berle holds the TV screen for an hour three times a month.

It's impossible for them to be funny all of the time. Even the great Jimmy Durante doesn't al-
